Many of us here are Muslim slaves and we wonder why there is so much division and violence among Muslims if Islam is a religion of peace? How can we achieve the peace, justice, and community taught in the Qur'an but we struggle with infighting, terrorism, and oppression? We don't even know why us Sunni are still fighting the Shia. Does the Bible speak of unity in the ummah (global Muslim community)? Apostle Pastor Ed - Is the problem with our Politics? Our Human nature? Or something more?

Answer:

That is a heartfelt and courageous question. Thank you for asking it with such honesty. From the **Gospel of Jesus Christ** and the full truth of Scripture, here is a loving, respectful, and clear answer:

1. The Bible Speaks of a Coming Global Division—But Also a Greater Peace

While Islam teaches the idea of a unified **ummah**, the Bible explains that **true unity can never come from human religion, ethnicity, or politics** alone. According to the Scriptures, we are **divided because of sin**—deep within the human heart:

"What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you?"

— James 4:1

The Bible teaches that violence and division are not just political issues—but spiritual ones. From Cain killing Abel, to nations rising against nations, the pattern of bloodshed is rooted in the human heart, which has been separated from God due to sin (Jeremiah 17:9).

2. The Bible Predicted the Struggles Among Abraham's Descendants

"For He Himself is our peace... and has broken down the dividing wall of hostility... making one new humanity out of the two."

— Ephesians 2:14-16

Jesus didn't just preach peace—**He made peace by dying for our sins**. He did what no prophet, no political leader, and no human system could do. He tore down the wall between us and God, and between man and man.

4. Islam's Struggle Reflects the Deep Longing for a Savior

Your question—"Why are we divided if we're supposed to be at peace?"—is powerful. It reveals that Islam, for all its calls to unity, **cannot heal the soul**. It offers laws, rules, and community structures—but **it lacks a Savior**. It cannot remove guilt, hatred, or selfishness.

Only the Gospel of Jesus says:

"I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you... I will remove your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh."

— Ezekiel 36:26
