VMCA Adult Mosquito ID Course

The VMCA is holding a FREE adult mosquito ID course on May 15th and 16th. It will be conducted by the combined efforts of local mosquito control biologists. This is not taxonomy or a refresher course but a more practical training geared toward seasonal interns, summer parttime biology positions or mosquito biologists new to the area. Class size is limited to 20 so please make every effort to send eligible participants. We will take other participants on a first come first serve basis. Please sign up early. Supplies and microscopes are limited but we will have a few extras on hand. If possible, please bring the following items: microscope with lamp, power strip, extension cord, forceps, Petri dishes, wipes, alcohol and notebook. The course will be held at Chesapeake Mosquito Control Commission, 900 Hollowell Lane, Chesapeake, Virginia 23320.

Lunch is on your own but there are plenty of places to eat within a short drive. An on-site refrigerator is available. We will provide coffee, donuts, sodas, and water for both days.


2013 Annual Meeting Recap

Be a "Skeeter Beater"

The best way to fight a mosquito bite is through awareness and prevention. In York County, seasonal fresh water and salt marsh o populations are controlled by an integrated program that focuses on reducing and treating larval breeding habitats and control of the adult mosquitoes. When mosquito populations increase, spraying is performed by either ground or air to reduce their number. In order to achieve the best coverage, spraying occurs in the early morning or late evening when most mosquitoes are active. However, even with all of these measures, it is important to be aware that there is no such thing as a mosquito free environment in our area. To protect yourself from the bite, wear long, loose, and light colored clothing and use a

Everyone can help control mosquito populations by emptying water laden receptacles in your yard at least once a week. Be proactive by taking the following additional preventative measures:

- Turn over pails, planters or flush out bird baths or anything else that can hold stagnant water at least once a week.
- Biologically treat, cover, or empty u swimming pools and use offered "mosquito fish" in omamental ponds.
- Remove litter that holds water such as toys, cans, bottles, tarps, animal dishes,

Mosquito Control update



Volunteers are needed in the Mosquito Monitor program to help fight the bite. No previous experience is required! Volunteers will be trained and provided with a light trap for monitoring the mosquitoes. As a volunteer mosquito monitor, you will play an important role in reporting mosquito counts, which will directly affect the ground and/or aerial spraying schedule.

This one-of-a-kind program involves citizen volunteers and has won national recognition as being unique in playing an important role in the mosquito control effort. volunteer, call 890-3791 no later than Friday, March 29. Leave your name, address and telephone number. You can also submit this information to gallagher@yorkcounty.gov. Volunteers will be notified of the scheduled two-hour training session in mid-April.

Mosquito dunks and mosquito fish are available to citizens for use in breeding situations such as unused swimming pools or ornamental ponds. The dunks are being offered again this season as long as limited supplies last. One two-dunk pack is available per household and must be picked up by the homeowner. Stop by the Waste Management Center at 145 Goodwin Neck Road. Additional mosquito dunks can be purchased at local hardware stores garden centers, and home improvement stores.

Free mosquito fish can be obtained by York County

residents by calling 890-3791 or via e-mail (shown above). Leave your name, address and telephone number along with the size dimensions of your unused swimming pool or backyard ornamental pond. Fish deliveries will not be made until June and residents will be notified several days prior to the delivery date.

Mosquito season usually begins in mid-May. The start of the season depends o the amount of rain we receive this spring, the amount of standing water, and the water's temperature in the woodland areas. The mosquito spray hotline will be activated on Monday, May 18 and will provide information on where and when spraying is being conducted (dependent on the need for spraying and weath conditions). The spray information is updated daily at www.yorkcounty.gov/mosquitocontrol



What's that? Answer


That is an engorged *Ixodes ricinus*, the most common vector for tick-borne encephalitis virus (TBEV), which was imported into Fairfax County in 2012 (see above). TBEV is a member of the Flaviviridae, which includes such vector-borne viruses as West Nile virus and the dengue viruses. TBEV causes over 10,000 cases of encephalitis annually over large swaths of northern Europe and Asia, especially in Russia; mortality rates may reach 20%. The virus may also infect a variety of animals. Dogs and horses may develop neurological disease, while goats, sheep, and cows may pass virus in the milk, including to humans.

FAIRFAX COUNTY OFFERS WEST NILE VIRUS TESTING

Effective April 2013, Fairfax County Health Department Laboratory will offer West Nile virus PCR testing of mosquito pools and RAMP test samples. RT-PCR is the gold standard for WNV testing and confirmation. Our target turnaround time will be 72 hours for mosquito pools or RAMP confirmation.
