## Southwest Monsoon 2026 Under El Niño Shadow: IMD Warns of Below-Normal Rainfall, 60% Kharif Farmers at Risk

**What happened:** The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has forecast below-normal Southwest Monsoon rainfall for 2026 — at 90% of the Long Period Average (LPA) — with a model error of  $\pm 4\%$ . The forecast is driven by rapidly developing El Niño conditions in the equatorial Pacific, with a 99.4% probability of strong El Niño conditions prevailing from July to December 2026. The monsoon arrived over Kerala on June 4 (three days late), and as of June 23, has advanced into Maharashtra, Telangana, Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand, and Bihar. An estimated 60% of India's farmers — dependent on monsoon rainfall for the kharif season — face significant agricultural risk.

**Why it matters for UPSC:** The Southwest Monsoon is a foundational GS1 Geography topic (mechanism, onset, variability) and links directly to GS3 (food security, kharif crops, agricultural risk, inflation). El Niño's impact on monsoon is a perennial exam topic. UPSC tests both the science (ENSO mechanism) and the policy response (crop insurance, MSP revision, contingency agricultural plans).

### ⚡ KEY FACTS

- IMD forecast: 90% of LPA = below normal (LPA = 87 cm for June–September)
- Monsoon onset Kerala: June 4, 2026 (normal: June 1; IMD forecast: May 26 — both missed)
- El Niño probability: 99.4% for July–December 2026; warming of central-eastern Pacific Ocean
- Historical pattern: 8 of the last 10 strong El Niño years saw deficient Indian monsoon
- Kharif vulnerability: Paddy, pulses, oilseeds and cotton most affected by rainfall deficit
- June 23 status: Monsoon covered Maharashtra, Telangana, Odisha, CG, JH, BR; rest of country pending

### 💡 TEACHING HOOK

**El Niño = "The Ocean Steals India's Rain":** Normally, warm water pools in the western Pacific (near India/Australia), driving moisture-laden winds toward India — this IS the monsoon. El Niño reverses this: warm water shifts to the central-eastern Pacific (near South America), pulling the winds away from India. Result: weaker monsoon for India. The mnemonic: **El Niño = Pacific warms = India cools (rainfall-wise)**. Contrast with La Niña (Pacific cools = India gets excess rain). UPSC asks this as a negative feedback loop

— El Niño reduces Indian monsoon, which reduces agricultural output, which raises food inflation, which pressures RBI to keep rates high despite slower growth.

## World Rainforest Day 2026: Lantana camara Now Covers 50% of India's Forests, Threatening Tiger Prey Base

**What happened:** On World Rainforest Day (June 22), reports highlighted that the invasive plant *Lantana camara* — originally from Central America, introduced by the British as an ornamental plant in the 18th century — now occupies approximately 50% of India's forest and scrubland areas. This mass occupation suppresses native grass growth, depletes prey availability for tigers, and is directly linked to increased human-tiger conflict across tiger reserves. India's tropical and subtropical rainforests (Western Ghats, Northeast, Andaman & Nicobar) face severe ecological stress, with global forest cover having dropped to 59% — against the 75% safe planetary boundary threshold.

**Why it matters for UPSC:** This covers invasive species (GS3), Project Tiger/NTCA (GS3), human-wildlife conflict (GS3/GS2), and Western Ghats as a biodiversity hotspot (GS1). UPSC frequently links *Lantana*'s ecological impact to trophic cascade disruption. India's tiger census data and the 2030 target of 5,000 tigers are examination staples.

#### KEY FACTS

- *Lantana camara*: Introduced by British (18th century); now covers ~50% of Indian forest scrublands
- Effect: Suppresses native grasses → deer population falls → tigers prey on cattle → human-tiger conflict
- India Tiger Census 2022: 3,682 tigers = 53% of global tiger population; target 5,000 by 2030
- Western Ghats: UNESCO World Heritage Site; one of India's two biodiversity hotspots (with Eastern Himalaya)
- World Rainforest Day: June 22; global forest cover 59% vs. 75% safe planetary boundary threshold
- NTCA: National Tiger Conservation Authority — nodal body for Project Tiger management

#### TEACHING HOOK

**The Trophic Cascade Chain:** *Lantana* invades → native grass disappears → deer have no food → deer numbers crash → tigers have no prey → tigers attack cattle → farmers retaliate → human-tiger conflict escalates. This is a *trophic cascade* triggered by a single invasive species. For UPSC: always connect invasive species → food web disruption → human-wildlife conflict → policy response (NTCA corridor protection + *Lantana* removal projects). The 3-step chain is exam-ready.

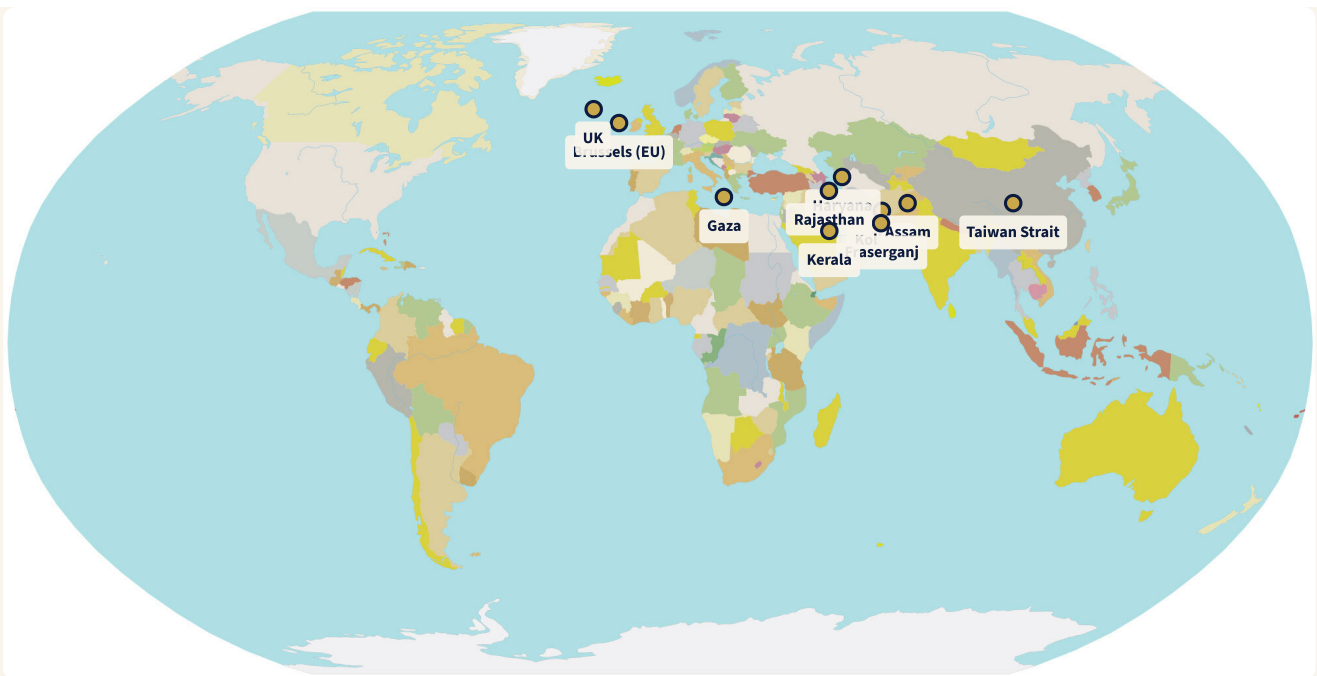

#### CASE STUDY 1 OF 4

Public Administration Ethics

#### The Digital Justice Dilemma: When AI Fails the Most Vulnerable

**Scenario:** Ravi Kumar is the District Legal Services Authority (DLSA) coordinator. The newly deployed Nyaya Setu AI chatbot (DISHA 2.0) handles 80% of queries efficiently, but the remaining 20% — involving PESA Act violations, tribal land rights, and domestic violence — are being handled incorrectly, leading vulnerable citizens to take wrong legal action. Reporting this will slow the scheme's rollout. What should Ravi do?

**Ethical Dimensions:** Accountability vs. efficiency; protecting vulnerable groups; whistleblowing vs. organisational loyalty; limits of technology in contextual judgment.

##### FRAMEWORK & APPROACH

Gandhi's Talisman: Does the AI error harm the weakest? Yes — tribal land-rights errors are irreversible. Ravi must: (1) Document specific failure cases with evidence; (2) Escalate to State Legal Services Authority / NALSA through proper channels; (3) Recommend mandatory human-lawyer routing for PESA/tribal cases; (4) Propose a "human-in-the-loop" override mechanism. Loyalty to the scheme's *spirit* (justice for all) demands reporting the flaw — not suppressing it.

#### CASE STUDY 2 OF 4

Defence Ethics / Dual-Use Technology

## The Missile Scientist's Dilemma: BMD Transfer vs. Proliferation Risk

**Scenario:** Dr. Priya Nair, senior DRDO scientist behind India's BMD system, learns that a democratic but regionally adventurist ally wants India to transfer specific BMD sub-systems. Her classified assessment shows the components could be reverse-engineered for offensive missile guidance. The MEA favours the transfer. The Defence Minister directly asks her recommendation.

**Ethical Dimensions:** National interest vs. global security; expert dissent vs. political authority; dual-use technology ethics; confidentiality vs. public interest.

### FRAMEWORK & APPROACH

Consequentialist analysis: If technology enables offensive use, harm exceeds benefit. Dr. Nair must: (1) Submit the full technical risk assessment in writing to the Defence Minister and NSA; (2) Propose a modified transfer excluding dual-use components; (3) Recommend strict end-use monitoring clauses if approved; (4) Formally record her dissent if overruled. Technical expertise creates a *moral responsibility* to advise accurately — regardless of political pressure.

## CASE STUDY 3 OF 4

### Environmental Ethics

## The Monsoon Crisis and the Collector's Choice: Drought Preparedness vs. Political Optics

**Scenario:** District Collector Meena Sharma's district in Vidarbha is facing a 30% rainfall deficit due to El Niño. IMD data predicts it will worsen through August. She wants to immediately invoke Drought Manual protocols — declaring drought early triggers crop insurance payouts, MGNREGS activation, and welfare camps. However, her superiors worry that an early drought declaration will embarrass the state government ahead of assembly elections and have asked her to wait for "official state-level assessment." Farmers are already distressed.

**Ethical Dimensions:** Duty of care to citizens vs. political obedience; early action vs. political risk; use of scientific data in administrative decisions; courage of conviction.

### FRAMEWORK & APPROACH

Kantian duty ethics: The duty to prevent foreseeable harm is non-negotiable — political timing does not override it. Meena should: (1) Put her IMD-based assessment in writing and formally communicate it to the Divisional Commissioner and Principal Secretary Relief; (2) Start pre-positioning relief materials within existing budget without formal declaration; (3) Engage civil society / farmers' groups to document distress for the record; (4) If overruled in writing, comply but ensure the written trail documents her timely warning. Bureaucratic courage = speaking truth in writing, not just in conscience.

## CASE STUDY 4 OF 4

### Economic Ethics / Trade Policy

## The Trade Negotiator's Silence: India-EU FTA and Dairy Farmer Welfare

**Scenario:** Arun Singh, India's lead negotiator for the India-EU FTA, possesses internal analysis showing that duty-free European dairy products entering from Year 3 will severely impact 80 million small dairy farmers in UP and Rajasthan. His minister wants an unqualified public endorsement. The press conference is in 2 hours. The safeguard mechanism in the deal is insufficient per Arun's expert judgment.

**Ethical Dimensions:** Loyalty to ministry vs. duty to truth; national interest vs. welfare of the most vulnerable; bureaucratic courage vs. career risk; ethics of public communication.

### FRAMEWORK & APPROACH

Rawls' Difference Principle: Inequalities are acceptable only if they benefit the least advantaged. Small dairy farmers are least advantaged here — so the deal's inequality is ethically problematic without safeguards. Arun should: (1) Immediately convey concerns in writing to the minister — last chance for internal escalation; (2) At the press conference, endorse the deal's positives honestly without actively misrepresenting the dairy safeguard gaps; (3) Request the ministry to commission a rapid dairy impact assessment; (4) Recommend triggering the FTA's safeguard clause in Year 3 if import surges materialise.

**QUESTION 6 | GS3 • SPACE**

All of the following about Chandrayaan-3's Vikram lander are correct EXCEPT:

- (a) It operated for approximately 14 Earth days on the Moon's surface
- (b) It was the world's first spacecraft to land near the lunar south pole

**Answer: (c)**

The 2026 Southwest Monsoon has arrived under the shadow of a developing El Niño. Examine the mechanism by which El Niño disrupts the Indian monsoon and analyse the socio-economic consequences of a below-normal monsoon year on India's agricultural and food security landscape. (250 words)

#### ANSWER FRAMEWORK
