Collapsed British-Era Railway Bridge Debris at Unnao Finally Cleared, Ganga's Environmental Flow Restored

Why in News: The District Magistrate, Unnao, reported to the National Green Tribunal on 4 August 2026 that debris from a collapsed British-era railway bridge across the Ganga has been fully removed and the river's environmental flow restored. A section of the disused bridge's right bank span, en route to Kanpur, had broken off into the river channel earlier in 2026, prompting the NGT to direct the National Mission for Clean Ganga (NMCG) on 20 April 2026 to assess whether the debris was obstructing river flow.

Background: The bridge belonged to the Railway Department and had been disused and non-operational for several years before its partial collapse, illustrating a recurring national pattern of ageing, decommissioned infrastructure becoming an unaddressed environmental liability long after its functional life ends — a pattern the NGT has separately flagged in a similar Bihar case involving debris threatening Gangetic dolphin habitat. The case sat with the NGT for over three months, moving from an April fact-finding direction to a fully verified August compliance report, illustrating both the Tribunal's sustained monitoring capacity and the real-world lag between an order and ground-level compliance.

Species in News: The Olive Ridley Sea Turtle — Odisha's Mass-Nesting Marine Marvel

Why in This Edition (Static Profile): With today's Places-in-News list carrying two pins on the Odisha coast — the missile-trial site at Chandipur and the BRICS Education venue at Bhubaneswar — the Olive Ridley Sea Turtle is the natural thematic pairing, since the same Odisha coastline hosts the world's largest mass-nesting site for this species at Gahirmatha, part of the Bhitarkanika complex.

§3 · ETHICS & INTEGRITY CASES (GS4)

Case 1 — The Trawler Captain's Nesting-Season Dilemma **Concept: Environmental Ethics vs. Livelihood Necessity**

A fishing trawler captain near Gahirmatha faces a mandatory fishing ban during Olive Ridley nesting season, yet his crew's monthly income depends entirely on this catch, and no alternative-livelihood support has reached his village yet.

Resolution Framework: A purely biocentric ethic would prioritise turtle survival absolutely; a purely anthropocentric one would prioritise the crew's immediate needs. The defensible middle path recognises intergenerational environmental justice — the rookery's survival benefits future fishing generations too — while holding the state, not the individual fisherman, primarily accountable for ensuring livelihood-transition support arrives before enforcement bites.

Case 2 — The Railway Engineer's Disclosure After the Fact **Concept: Retrospective Accountability vs. Institutional Face-Saving**

After the Unnao bridge's partial collapse, a retired railway engineer who had flagged the structure's poor condition years earlier privately wonders whether to publicly disclose his old, ignored warning now that the case has closed successfully with the NGT.

Resolution Framework: Even where an immediate crisis has been resolved, the utilitarian calculus favours disclosure — surfacing the ignored warning could prevent identical negligence at India's many other disused bridges, outweighing any institutional embarrassment. Silence here would prioritise short-term institutional comfort over long-term public safety, a clear ethical shortfall.

Case 3 — The Selection Committee Member's Procedural Doubt **Concept: Procedural Legitimacy vs. Substantive Outcome**

A member of a statutory selection committee constituted under a law whose own constitutional validity is being challenged in court must decide whether to proceed with an appointment now, or wait for the pending litigation to conclude.

Resolution Framework: Acting under a currently valid, unstruck law is procedurally legitimate — a public official cannot be expected to preempt a court's ruling. But prudence favours flagging the pending challenge transparently in the committee's own record, so that a substantively sound appointment is not later clouded by an appearance of having ignored a live constitutional question.

Case 4 — The BRICS Delegate's Drafting Compromise **Concept: Consensus-Building vs. National Positioning**

An Indian official drafting language for the BRICS Education Declaration must decide how strongly to push India's preferred formulation on Traditional Knowledge Systems when two other member states want softer, more generic language.

Resolution Framework: Multilateral diplomacy ethically requires genuine openness to compromise, not mere tactical concession — the test is whether the official is willing to actually change position on the merits of others' arguments, not just to extract the softest text that still lets India claim a symbolic win. A Declaration diluted purely for optics undermines the good-faith basis of future negotiations.

Case 5 — The RBI Analyst's Reserve-Adequacy Framing **Concept: Technical Accuracy vs. Market Confidence Signalling**

An RBI communications analyst must decide how to frame a forex-reserves press note — emphasising the reassuring headline dollar figure, or leading with the more technical (and slightly less flattering) import-cover and external-debt-cover ratios.

Resolution Framework: A central bank's communication carries unique market-moving weight, making truthful, complete framing a heightened duty, not an optional nicety. The ethical choice is to present both the headline figure and the adequacy ratios together, letting

markets form an accurate view rather than a merely reassuring one — since any perceived spin, once discovered, would cost far more in credibility than the short-term confidence gained.

Case 6 — The Panchayat Official's Feedstock Favouritism Temptation

Concept: Distributive Fairness vs. Administrative Convenience

A panchayat official implementing the new GOBARdhan scheme's feedstock-aggregation plan finds it administratively easier to contract with one large local dairy farmer than to organise collection from dozens of small, scattered households — but the scheme's rural-income intent was to benefit many small suppliers.

Resolution Framework: Rawls's difference principle would favour the arrangement that most benefits the least-advantaged small suppliers, even at higher administrative cost — efficiency for its own sake cannot override the scheme's explicit distributive purpose. The official's duty is to design (or advocate for) an aggregation mechanism, such as a cooperative collection point, that preserves broad-based rural benefit rather than defaulting to the administratively convenient but narrower option.
