PMFBY Now Covers Crop Losses from Wild Animal Attacks — Farmers Near Forests Get Historic Protection

What happened: The revised Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana (PMFBY) framework includes crop losses from wild animal attacks as the 5th sub-category under Localised Risks, effective Kharif 2026. This directly addresses the growing human–wildlife conflict crisis: tigers killed 40 people in the first half of 2025 alone; elephant attacks rose in 10 states. Farmers must upload geotagged photographs within 72 hours of damage via the crop insurance app. State governments identify vulnerable districts and listed species (elephants, nilgai, wild boar, monkeys, deer). This marks the first systemic policy response connecting wildlife protection law and agricultural insurance architecture.

Why it matters for UPSC: This is a nexus issue — linking Wildlife Protection Act, 1972 (Schedule I species causing crop damage but legally protected), PMFBY (GS3 agriculture), and human–wildlife conflict (GS3 Environment). UPSC Mains frequently tests policy interventions at such intersections. The 72-hour geotagging requirement also tests digital agriculture (GS3) and governance technology.

⚡ KEY FACTS

- Human–Wildlife Conflict (HWC): India reports 500+ human deaths annually from elephant attacks; crop damage runs to thousands of crores per year in border forest states.
- Wildlife Protection Act, 1972: Schedule I species (elephants, tigers, leopards) fully protected — farmers cannot legally kill them even to protect crops; insurance is the only legal recourse.
- PMFBY Localised Risks (before 2026): Hailstorm, landslide, inundation, natural fire, lightning — now adding wild animal attack & paddy inundation.

Gharial (*Gavialis gangeticus*) — India's Critically Endangered River Sentinel in the Chambal & Ganga

What happened: The gharial remains one of India's most critically endangered reptiles, with conservation efforts gaining momentum through the WII's 2026 Ganga-basin survey recording 3,000+ total individuals (including sub-adults and juveniles), reflecting partial recovery from the historic low of fewer than 250 mature individuals in 2006. However, the species still occupies only 2% of its historic range. Conservation breeding programmes at Kukrail (Lucknow) and Chitwan (Nepal) have supported wild releases. The Chambal River remains the species' primary stronghold, hosting ~90% of global wild population.

Why it matters for UPSC: Gharial appears in UPSC questions on biodiversity conservation, IUCN Red List categories, India's crocodilian species (3 species — Gharial, Mugger, Saltwater), and river ecology. The Chambal River's ecological health is a proxy for clean-river policy success and is directly linked to Project Gharial (now part of broader crocodile conservation programme).

⚡ KEY FACTS

- **Scientific name:** *Gavialis gangeticus* | **Family:** Gavialidae (monotypic — only living species)
- **IUCN Status:** Critically Endangered (CR) — since 2007; listed in Schedule I of Wildlife Protection Act, 1972

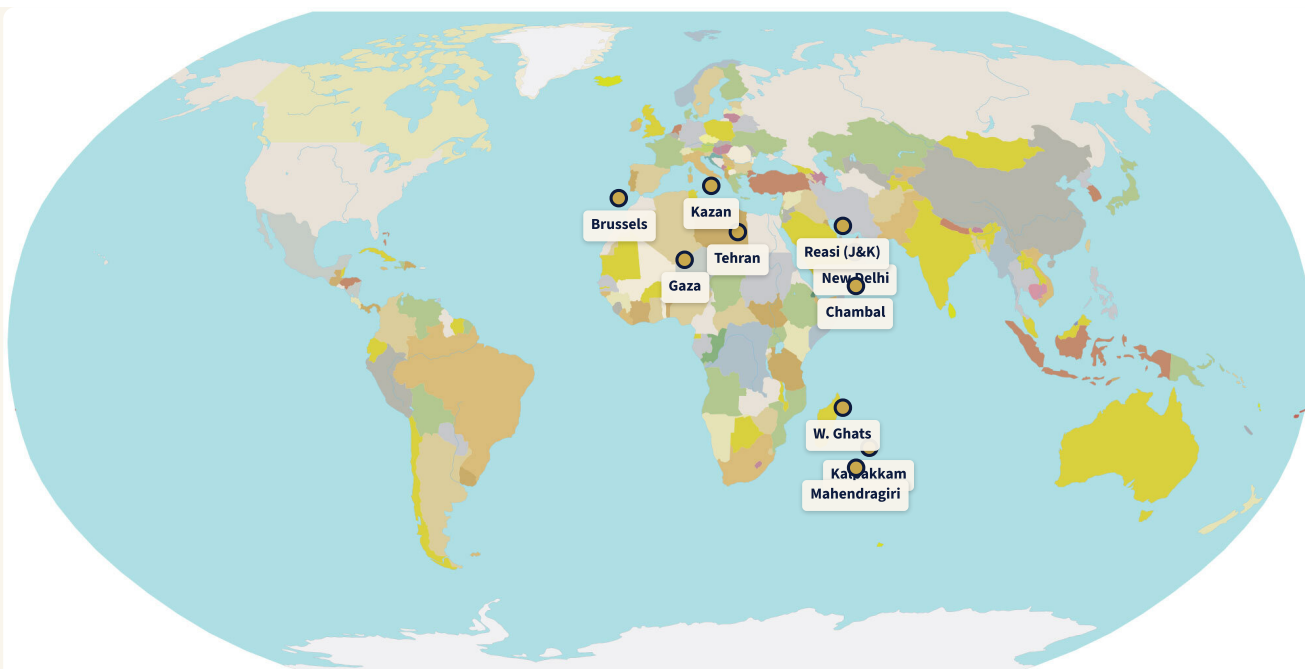

"GMC" for India's 3 Crocodilians: Gharial (long snout, fish-eater, CR, Chambal/Ganga) → Mugger (broad snout, omnivore, VU, freshwater lakes & rivers) → Crocodile Saltwater (largest, LC, coastal/mangrove, Sundarbans/Andamans). The gharial's ghara = nasal boss = MALE only. UPSC frequently asks to distinguish these species. Remember: Gharial = Ganga plains rivers; Mugger = wetlands (Crocodile Conservation Centre, Madras Crocodile Bank); Saltwater = mangroves. Project Crocodile (1975): India launched this with UNDP support — one of the world's first crocodilian recovery programmes.

The Ordinance Dilemma: When Executive Action Meets Judicial Independence

Scenario: You are a senior officer in the Ministry of Law & Justice. The Chief Justice of India has written to the Law Minister expressing grave concern that the Presidential Ordinance increasing SC judge strength — promulgated while Parliament is in recess — may compromise the independence of judiciary because the newly appointed judges would owe their very posts to an executive-made law. The CJI requests the government to convert the ordinance into a proper Act through an emergency Parliamentary session. Your Minister asks your assessment.

Values in Conflict: Institutional independence (judiciary) vs. Urgency (93,000 pending cases) vs. Constitutional propriety (Article 123 vs. regular legislation) vs. Judicial access for citizens.

Framework: Apply the *Constitutional Morality* principle (Dr. B.R. Ambedkar) — constitutional forms must be respected even when outcomes seem positive. An ordinance has the same force as legislation but is NOT legislation; judges sitting on posts created by ordinance may face legitimacy challenges if Parliament rejects it. The IIPE test: Is it Institutional? Proportionate? Procedurally correct? Effective?

Blocking Telegram: When State Security and Citizen Privacy Collide

Scenario: You are a District Magistrate in a city with a large student population. The Central Government has blocked Telegram under Section 69A, citing exam paper leak concerns. You receive complaints from: (a) students who use Telegram for legitimate study groups, (b) small businesses whose customer communication relied entirely on Telegram, (c) a human rights lawyer citing Puttaswamy (Right to Privacy), and (d) a national security officer who shows you evidence of Telegram-facilitated exam fraud. How do you navigate these competing claims and what do you advise your higher authorities?

Values in Conflict: Public interest (exam integrity, national security) vs. Individual liberty (Article 19 speech/expression) vs. Economic harm (businesses) vs. Proportionality (targeted action vs. platform-wide ban).

Framework: Proportionality doctrine (from Puttaswamy 2017) — any restriction must be (1) legally sanctioned, (2) necessary for a legitimate state aim, (3) proportionate to the harm. A full platform block fails proportionality if targeted content removal was feasible. Apply the Chandrachud doctrine: competing rights require balancing, not obliteration of one over the other.

The Protected Elephant and the Devastated Field: Ethics of Human–Wildlife Conflict

Scenario: You are the DFO (Divisional Forest Officer) of a district in Odisha. A herd of elephants has destroyed crops in 12 villages overnight. Villagers have gathered and are demanding you permit culling of two elephants identified as "habitual offenders" to protect livelihoods. The elephants are Schedule I animals under WPA 1972 (full protection). PMFBY crop insurance now covers wild animal attacks from Kharif 2026, but the previous season's losses are not covered. An elderly farmer says his family has gone three seasons without income due to elephant raids.

Values in Conflict: Biodiversity conservation (protected species) vs. Human dignity & livelihood rights vs. Rule of law (WPA 1972 absolute protection) vs. Compassion for immediate suffering.

Framework: Apply Rawlsian Justice — the most disadvantaged (farmer losing livelihood) should receive priority concern. However, culling a protected species violates legal duties and ecological obligations. Explore middle path: rapid fencing, transit corridor management, ex-gratia payment, expedited PMFBY claim for current season, and advocacy for retrospective relief through state compensation.

The FTA Negotiator's Dilemma: When Trade Secrets Conflict with Democratic Accountability

The deal is finalised, but a parliamentary standing committee demands full disclosure of the negotiation texts, including India's initial concession positions on automotive tariffs and pharmaceutical data exclusivity. Releasing these texts would damage India's negotiating credibility in future trade deals (with the UK, Canada, GCC) as counterparts will know India's floor positions. However, not releasing them denies Parliament its oversight role and affects democratic accountability.

Values in Conflict: Transparency & Parliamentary democracy vs. National negotiating interest (future trade deals) vs. Public interest in FTA terms vs. Professional secrecy (diplomatic norms).

Framework: RTI Act exemptions (Section 8(1)(a) — national security) vs. Parliamentary privilege. The Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations provides confidentiality norms. Apply the "minimum necessary disclosure" principle — release the final text (already public practice), but protect pre-negotiation positions. Recommend a parliamentary in-camera briefing.

Intro: Two milestones on June 24-26, 2026 — SE2000 engine test and IGCAR Cu-Cl hydrogen facility.
