Case 1: RudraM-II Missile — Scientist's Duty, Dual-Use Technology & National Security Ethics

NEWS EXAMPLE

DRDO scientists developed RudraM-II — an indigenous anti-radiation missile that can destroy enemy radar systems. Technology has both defensive and offensive applications.

ETHICAL ISSUE

Is there an ethical obligation on defence scientists when developing weapons of destruction? Does "national security" justify any scientific development? Dual-use dilemma: military technology vs. civilian applications.

DRDO scientists, Indian government, armed forces, potential adversaries, civilian population, global arms control bodies.

How to use in answer writing: In GS4 answers on "ethical dilemmas faced by scientists in government service" — cite the dual-use dilemma. A DRDO scientist's primary loyalty is national security, but scientific ethics demands awareness of potential misuse. Use the lens of consequentialism (outcome: national safety) vs. deontology (duty: do no harm). This is a high-value GS4 case study angle.

Case 2: Below-Normal Monsoon Forecast — State's Duty of Proactive Governance

NEWS EXAMPLE

IMD forecast predicts below-normal monsoon 2026. State governments and the Centre face a duty to proactively prepare drought contingency plans, activate MGNREGS, and protect food security — before the crisis hits.

ETHICAL ISSUE

Is reactive governance (acting only after drought) ethically inferior to anticipatory governance? What is a civil servant's duty when expert forecasts warn of impending harm to millions of farmers?

Farmers, IMD, State governments, Ministry of Agriculture, RBI, rural poor, children dependent on Mid-Day Meal Scheme, food security system.

How to use in answer writing: Frame this as "anticipatory ethics in governance." Civil servants with access to expert forecasts have an ethical obligation to act before harm occurs — not after. Case 3: Sovereign AI — Ethics of Concentrating Technological Power

NEWS EXAMPLE

How to use in answer writing: For GS4 questions on "ethics of technology governance" — cite the sovereign AI concentration risk. Case 4: Tribal Karmayogi Abhiyan — Authenticity of Participation in Governance Reform

► INTRODUCTION

The successful flight trial of RudraM-II (June 2026) marks India's entry into the elite club of nations possessing indigenous anti-radiation missile capability. Beyond technological achievement, it reflects a strategic shift toward achieving Suppression of Enemy Air Defences (SEAD) — a capability gap that previously limited India's combat options.

► BODY POINTS

- **Strategic significance:** SEAD capability neutralises enemy air defences before strike missions; crucial in modern air warfare (Ukraine-Russia, Israel-Gaza lessons)
- **Technical achievement:** Mach 5.5 speed, 300 km range, hybrid INS+GPS+passive RF guidance — comparable to Western HARM missiles
- **Aatmanirbhar dividend:** 100% indigenous; RCI Hyderabad + 5 DRDO labs; potential for exports (defence exports target: ₹50,000 crore by 2029)

- **Compute infrastructure:** Gigawatt AI factory + Reliance investment closes the compute gap — India AI Mission (₹10,372 crore) provides public compute access for startups
