NGT Fines BHU ₹2 Crore for Illegal Felling of 33 Trees Including 7 Sandalwood Trees; Chandlai Lake Encroachments Directed Removed

What happened: The National Green Tribunal (NGT) imposed a fine of over ₹2 crore on Banaras Hindu University (BHU) for illegally felling 33 trees, including 7 sandalwood trees — with the fine imposed by the Uttar Pradesh Pollution Control Board (UPPCB) per an affidavit before the NGT. In a separate matter, the Rajasthan court came down heavily on the Jaipur Development Authority (JDA) for failing to protect Chandlai Lake from encroachment and garbage dumping, directing immediate action by the Jaipur Collector and Municipal Commissioner to remove encroachments.

Why it matters for UPSC: NGT's powers (fine imposition, suo motu action, writ-like jurisdiction), tree protection laws (Forest Conservation Act, Tree Preservation Orders), and urban waterbody protection are high-frequency GS3 environment + GS2 governance topics. The BHU sandalwood case adds a species dimension (*Santalum album* — endangered, Schedule I WPA).

KEY FACTS

- NGT: National Green Tribunal — established under NGT Act 2010; principal bench in New Delhi.
- NGT jurisdiction: Environmental disputes; can impose fines, order restoration, grant compensation.
- BHU case: 33 trees felled (incl. 7 sandalwood); UPPCB imposed ₹2+ crore environmental compensation.
- Sandalwood (*Santalum album*): Listed under Schedule I, Wildlife Protection Act 1972 — highest protection. Also State tree of Karnataka and Telangana.
- Chandlai Lake: Important wetland near Jaipur; encroachment violates Wetlands (Conservation & Management) Rules 2017 and NGT directions.
- Environmental Compensation principle: "Polluter Pays" — NGT regularly applies this in tree felling and pollution cases.

TEACHING HOOK

NGT vs Courts — key distinction: NGT is a specialised quasi-judicial body (not a court) that can award compensation for environmental damage without proof of harm (applied "precautionary principle"). It cannot try criminal offences but can impose civil liabilities. For UPSC, always pair: NGT (civil/compensatory) + CrPC + Environmental Acts (criminal). The BHU case used the "Polluter Pays" principle via UPPCB — not a direct NGT fine.

Mishmi Takin Captured on Camera in North Sikkim — Herd of 8 Recorded in Tingda Reserve Forest for First Time

What happened: A herd of eight Mishmi Takin (*Budorcas taxicolor taxicolor*) was filmed in the Bakuchen area of Tingda Reserve Forest, North Sikkim — the largest group ever recorded from the locality and a confirmed sighting after more than two decades in the state. Sikkim lies at the western limit of the species' global range. Forest department officials captured the footage during routine patrolling, signalling the ecological integrity of Sikkim's mountain habitats and the effectiveness of conservation measures.

Why it matters for UPSC: Species-in-news questions are a Prelims perennial. Mishmi Takin (Vulnerable, IUCN), eastern Himalayan range, Schedule I protection under WPA 1972, and habitat connectivity in the Eastern Himalayas are all examinable. This sighting also reinforces biodiversity corridor importance and the role of Reserve Forests in species protection.

KEY FACTS

- Scientific name: *Budorcas taxicolor taxicolor* (Mishmi Takin — one of four subspecies of Takin).
- IUCN Status: Vulnerable (B. taxicolor overall); Mishmi subspecies population is small and declining.
- WPA 1972 Protection: Schedule I — highest legal protection in India (same as Tiger, Elephant).
- Distribution: Eastern Himalayas — Arunachal Pradesh (Mishmi Hills), Sikkim (westernmost edge), Bhutan, China (Tibet), Myanmar.
- Habitat: Alpine meadows, rhododendron thickets and conifer forests at 2,000–4,500m altitude.
- Physical features: Goat-antelope — stocky body, concave nose, golden-yellow fur; national animal of Bhutan (different sub-species).
- Threats: Habitat loss, hunting, human-wildlife conflict, climate change (glacial retreat).

TEACHING HOOK

Takin species 4-part memory: Four subspecies — (1) **Mishmi** Takin (Arunachal, Sikkim, darkest), (2) **Sichuan** (Chinese), (3) **Bhutan** (golden, national animal), (4) **Tibetan**. For UPSC, remember: Mishmi = Arunachal Pradesh (Mishmi Hills) + Sikkim = India's only two habitat states. National animal of Bhutan = Bhutan Takin (not Mishmi). IUCN: Vulnerable. WPA: Schedule I.

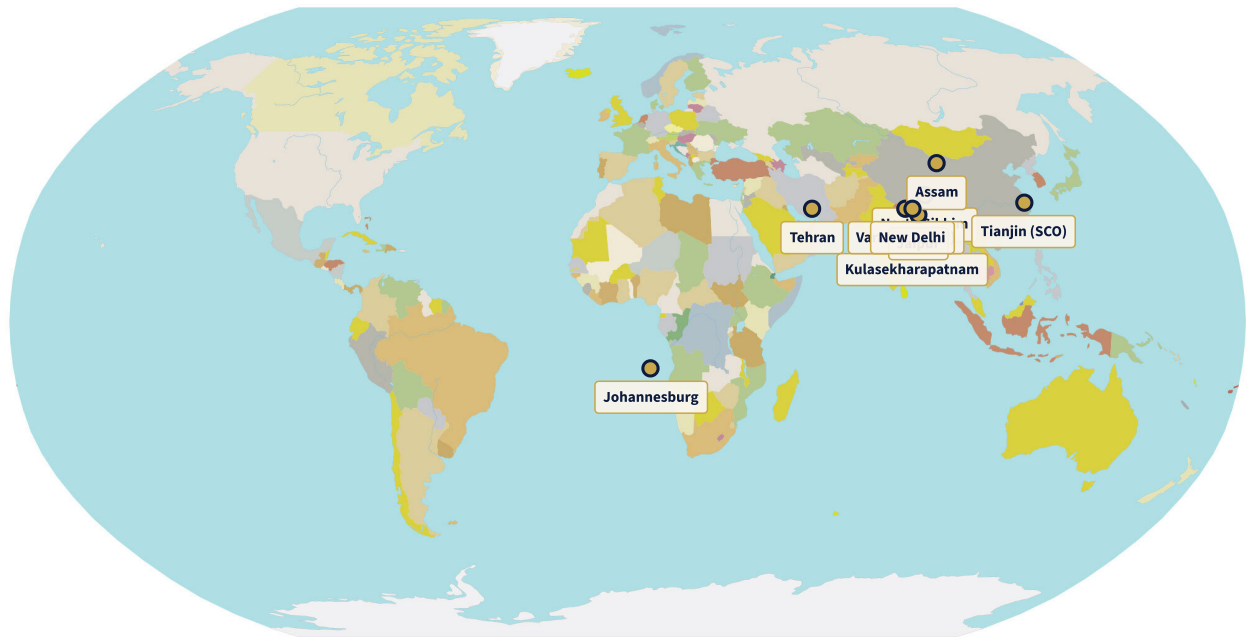

CASE STUDY 1

The Forest Officer's Dilemma: Order vs. Ecological Conscience

Probity · Public Duty · Environmental Ethics

Scenario: You are a Forest Range Officer in a district where a prominent central university is planning to fell 50 trees on its campus for a new administrative building. The Vice-Chancellor presents an approval from the state Urban Development department, but you notice it bypasses the Forest Conservation Act and the Tree Preservation Order in force for your district. The university has significant political influence and the project is described as "nationally important." Your senior District Collector has informally asked you to "facilitate" the clearance. How do you proceed?

Ethical dimensions: Probity in public office, rule of law vs. institutional pressure, accountability to environmental statutes, personal courage, and the civil servant's duty to the Constitution over political expediency.

Values in conflict: Obedience to hierarchy vs. adherence to law; institutional loyalty vs. ecological stewardship; short-term career safety vs. long-term environmental justice.

Framework approach: (1) Check legal validity — if approval bypasses FCA/TPO, it is void ab initio. (2) Write a formal note to District Collector stating the legal position. (3) Escalate to Chief Conservator of Forests and legal cell. (4) If pressure continues, seek written orders — ensuring accountability. (5) Do not facilitate an illegal clearance regardless of political pressure. Cite: AIS (Conduct) Rules 1968 — civil servants must uphold laws and refrain from acting in violation of statutory duties.

CASE STUDY 2

The DRDO Scientist's Disclosure: National Security vs. Scientific Transparency

Dual-Use Technology · National Security · Scientific Integrity

Scenario: You are a senior DRDO scientist working on a reconnaissance satellite system to be deployed from the Kulasekharapatnam spaceport. During testing, you discover a critical vulnerability that could potentially allow adversary nations to intercept your satellite's feed. You are scheduled to present the system as "deployment-ready" in a high-level review tomorrow — attended by the Defence Minister and service chiefs. Disclosing the vulnerability will delay the programme by six months and embarrass your department head. What do you do?

Ethical dimensions: Scientific integrity, national security responsibility, professional courage, transparency upward vs. institutional loyalty, and the consequences of premature deployment of a compromised system.

Values in conflict: Institutional reputation vs. national security; career risk vs. professional duty; short-term delay vs. long-term strategic safety.

Framework approach: (1) Disclose the vulnerability to the programme director immediately and in writing before the review — there is no ethical alternative. (2) Prepare a technical brief on the nature of the flaw and proposed remediation timeline. (3) In the review, provide an honest assessment; the Defence Ministry must make an informed decision. (4) National security integrity outweighs departmental embarrassment in all circumstances. GS4 principle: "An honest civil servant is never unprepared — they are prepared with the truth."

CASE STUDY 3

The District Collector and the Flood Funds: Accountability Under Pressure

Accountability · Compassion · Financial Integrity · Disaster Management

Scenario: You are a District Collector in an Assam district severely affected by the 2026 floods. An Inter-Ministerial Central Team has just visited your district and found significant damage. You have received State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF) disbursement for relief — but a local politician is pressuring you to prioritise relief to villages in his constituency (which received moderate damage) over a remote tribal block (which has the highest damage but poor road connectivity and no political patronage). The politician implies that your transfer is "pending his recommendation." What do you do?

Ethical dimensions: Impartiality, compassion-driven allocation, resistance to political pressure, financial accountability, and duty to the most vulnerable.

Framework approach: (1) Rely on objective damage assessment data (NDRF reports, revenue records, satellite imagery) to guide SDRF allocation. (2) Prioritise tribal block with highest damage — impartiality demands allocation based on need, not political patronage. (3) Document all interactions with the politician in writing; use official channels only. (4) If threats persist, inform Chief Secretary/Commissioner. (5) NDMA 2005 places legal duty of equitable relief on the District Authority. Political pressure is irrelevant to statutory duty.

CASE STUDY 4

The IAS Probationer and the ONOE Research Brief: Intellectual Honesty in Policy Work

Intellectual Integrity · Policy Ethics · Political Neutrality

Scenario: You are an IAS probationer on a central deputation, assigned to prepare a research brief on "One Nation One Election" for the JPC examining the 130th Constitution Amendment Bill. After thorough research, your brief concludes that while ONOE has administrative efficiency benefits, it poses significant federal structure concerns and historical evidence from countries that adopted simultaneous elections shows mixed results. Your senior Joint Secretary tells you to "soften" the concerns section as the bill has high-level political support and the JPC might find the concerns "unhelpful." What do you do?

Ethical dimensions: Intellectual honesty, neutrality of civil service advice, political pressure on policy research, professional courage, and the right of Parliament to unbiased information.

Framework approach: (1) Politely but firmly decline to alter the factual findings of the research brief. (2) Explain that the JPC's constitutional role requires access to balanced, evidence-based analysis. (3) Offer to present findings in a more structured, solution-oriented format — but not suppress evidence. (4) If ordered in writing to alter the brief, submit your own dissent note via official channel. (5) AIS conduct rules: Civil servants must provide "frank, fearless and impartial advice to their political masters."

Answer: (a) 1 only. Statement 1 is correct — Governor may return a Bill (other than a Money Bill) for reconsideration once. Statement 2 is incorrect — Article 200 does not specify any timeline (hence the "pocket veto" controversy). Statement 3 is incorrect — SC ruled in 2026 (following Tamil Nadu Bills Presidential Reference) that courts cannot impose timelines on constitutional authorities like President/Governor.

Framework: Context (India's 4th chairmanship; BRICS now 11 members + 10 partners = 45%+ global GDP, 40%+ population) → Opportunities: critical mineral partnerships, BRICS Pay to reduce dollar dependence, climate finance reform, Global South voice amplification → Limitations: China dominance within BRICS, no binding mechanism, diverging interests on Ukraine/Gaza/Iran, US pressure on BRICS Pay → India's strategic calculation: use BRICS as balancing platform without antagonising West → Specific agenda items: critical minerals, technology transfer, BRICS Development Bank (NDB) reform → Conclusion: India can maximise gains but must navigate intra-BRICS contradictions.

Q5. India's Kulasekharapatnam spaceport and the DRDO-ISRO strategic alliance mark a new phase in India's military space doctrine. Examine the significance of dual-use space assets for India's national security and the regulatory challenges they pose. (250 words)

Framework: What's dual-use in space: same satellite can serve reconnaissance AND civilian remote sensing → Kulasekharapatnam significance: strategic southern location for SSO launches, SSLV for rapid deployment, DRDO-ISRO convergence → India's space security imperatives: surveillance of borders (LAC, LoC), maritime domain awareness, communication in conflict zones → Regulatory challenge: Outer Space Treaty 1967 (Article IV — no weapons of mass destruction in space), but conventional military satellites allowed → India's draft Space Policy 2023 → Governance gap: India lacks a Space Situational Awareness (SSA) framework, no space debris regulation → Conclusion: India must codify dual-use space governance before it lags behind China and US in this domain.

Q6. A senior civil servant discovers that an environmental clearance for a major infrastructure project has been granted by his department based on a falsified environmental impact assessment. The project is in an advanced stage, and cancellation would cause significant economic losses and displace thousands of workers. What should the civil servant do? Discuss the ethical principles involved. (250 words)

Framework: Ethical principles at stake: Rule of law (no legitimate project can be built on a false foundation), Consequentialism (economic harm of cancellation) vs. Deontology (duty to uphold law), Public Interest (environmental harm to present + future generations) → Immediate steps: document evidence securely; report to Principal Secretary / Ministry legal cell in writing → Should NOT: suppress information to protect the project → Options: Partial course correction — halt further construction while EIA is redone; prosecute those responsible for falsification → Long-term: strengthen EIA process (Expert Appraisal Committee independence, third-party audits) → Conclusion: Short-term economic pain cannot justify long-term environmental injustice; a civil servant's integrity is non-negotiable — as Justice Krishna Iyer noted: "The law is the last shield of the ordinary man."
