### India Reaches 100 Ramsar Sites: Surha Tal (Ballia, UP) Designated as Milestone Wetland; India Now 3rd Globally

**What happened:** On World Environment Day (June 5, 2026), the Jai Prakash Narayan Bird Sanctuary — also known as Surha Tal — in Ballia district, Uttar Pradesh, was designated as India's 100th Ramsar site under the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands. With this, India now has the highest number of Ramsar Sites in Asia and ranks 3rd globally, trailing only the United Kingdom (176 sites) and Mexico (144 sites). India's Ramsar journey started with Chilika Lake and Keoladeo National Park in 1981.

**Why it matters for UPSC:** India's 100th Ramsar site is a high-probability Prelims and GS3 Mains topic. UPSC frequently asks: definition of "Wetlands of International Importance," Montreux Record (threatened Ramsar sites), India's first Ramsar sites, Wise Use principle, and state-wise distribution. The milestone number (100) and the site name (Surha Tal / JP Narayan Bird Sanctuary) are direct fact-pick questions.

## State of India's Environment 2026: Planetary Boundaries Breached, Lantana Camara Covers 50% Forest Floors, Human-Tiger Conflict Rising

**What happened:** The State of India's Environment (SOE) 2026 report (by Centre for Science and Environment / Down to Earth) warns that multiple planetary boundaries — including biodiversity, land-system change, and novel entities (chemicals/plastics) — are being breached. A major finding: Lantana camara, an invasive plant, now occupies nearly 50% of India's forest and scrublands, suppressing native grass growth. This reduces prey availability for tigers, pushing them to prey on cattle and increasing human-tiger conflicts. India also diverted ~97,000 hectares of forestland for non-forest use between FY2020-21 and FY2024-25.

**Why it matters for UPSC:** The SOE Report is a high-value UPSC source. Planetary boundaries (Rockström et al.), invasive species ecology, human-wildlife conflict, and forest diversion under Forest (Conservation) Act are all UPSC staples. The Lantana-tiger-cattle conflict chain is a perfect 10-mark GS3 answer structure.

### ⚡ KEY FACTS

- ▶ Lantana camara: Native to tropical Americas; introduced in India during British era; IUCN lists it among world's 100 worst invasive alien species

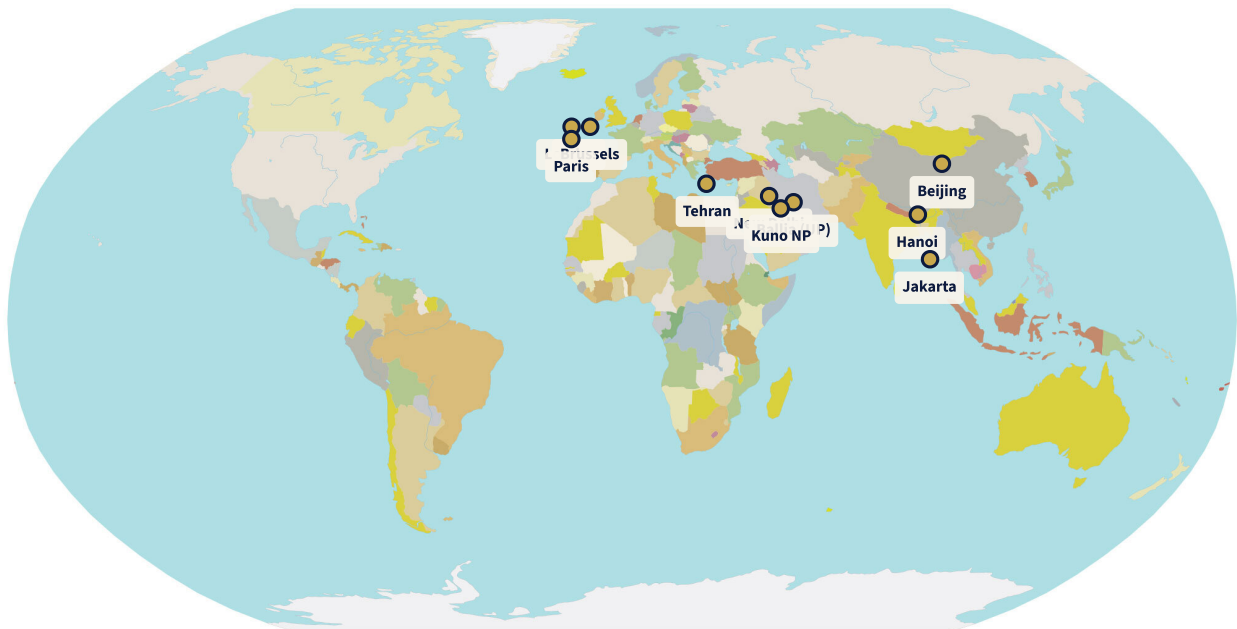

## Ethics, Integrity & Aptitude (GS4)

### CASE STUDY 1

### The Governor's Delay — Constitutional Duty vs. Political Convenience

*You are a senior IAS officer advising a State Chief Minister whose eight Bills — including one on free power for farmers — have been pending with the Governor for 14 months without assent or return. The Supreme Court has now ruled it cannot impose a timeline. The Governor claims he is "examining" the Bills. The CM wants you to prepare a strategy to compel action.*

**Ethical Issues:** Accountability of constitutional authorities; democratic legitimacy vs. gubernatorial discretion; role of civil servant when political and legal frameworks conflict.

**Framework:** Apply *Gandhi's Talisman* (does delayed legislation hurt the poorest?), Nolan Principles (selflessness, integrity, accountability), and the constitutional oath of office (Governor swears to preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution). A constitutional functionary's discretion cannot become an instrument of governance paralysis.

**Model Approach:** Advise the CM to (1) write formally to the Governor citing specific bills and elapsed time, (2) seek legal opinion, (3) engage with the Union government through proper channels, (4) keep the matter in public domain through Legislative Assembly resolutions. Avoid confrontational street politics.

### CASE STUDY 2

### Arms Export Ethics — Prosperity vs. Peace

*India has signed a BrahMos missile export deal with a Southeast Asian country. As Joint Secretary in the Ministry of External Affairs, you learn that a faction within that country's military is under UN sanctions for human rights violations. The contract was cleared by the Defence Ministry. Your ministry is handling the diplomatic communications.*

**Ethical Issues:** National interest vs. international humanitarian obligations; complicity in potential misuse of arms; conflict between departmental decisions and personal conscience.

**Framework:** *Doctrine of Double Effect* (arms export serves defence needs but could enable harm); *Consequentialism vs. Deontology*; India's commitment to UN Charter principles; the Arms Trade Treaty (India is not a signatory but must uphold spirit).

**Model Approach:** Flag the concern formally to senior MEA officials and the PMO via proper channel. Seek assurance that end-user certification is in place. Document your concern. Do not act unilaterally or leak to media. The decision authority lies above you — your ethical duty is to flag, not sabotage.

### CASE STUDY 3

## Invasive Species vs. Tribal Livelihoods — Conservation Dilemma

*As DFO of a tiger reserve, you must decide whether to eradicate *Lantana camara* across 5,000 hectares. Tribal communities collect *Lantana* sticks to make furniture — a ₹2 crore annual livelihood for 300 families. Wildlife experts warn that *Lantana* suppression is critical to restore prey base for tigers. Your decision will be cited in the National Tiger Conservation Authority review.*

**Ethical Issues:** Conservation vs. tribal livelihood rights; long-term ecological good vs. immediate socioeconomic harm; PESA rights vs. Wildlife Protection Act mandate.

**Framework:** Precautionary Principle (biodiversity threat justifies action), Justice as Fairness (tribal families must not bear disproportionate cost), and Sustainable Development principle (meet present needs without compromising future).

**Model Approach:** Phased removal with simultaneous alternative livelihood programmes (ecotourism, forest produce value-addition). Involve tribal councils (PESA compliant). Seek NTCA guidance on pilot zones. Document impact assessment quarterly.

### CASE STUDY 4

## Monetary Policy Transparency — Conflict of Interest in MPC

*You are an external member of the RBI Monetary Policy Committee. Before the rate decision meeting, you discover that your spouse's investment firm holds a large position in interest-rate-sensitive securities that would significantly benefit if rates are held unchanged — which is your own assessment of the right call. Your vote genuinely reflects your economic analysis, not personal benefit.*

**Ethical Issues:** Conflict of interest (even if unintended); institutional credibility of MPC; transparency in regulatory governance; personal integrity vs. perception management.

**Framework:** Nolan Principles — Openness (declare the conflict), Integrity (no personal financial interest must influence public duty). Transparency is non-negotiable in regulatory bodies. The *appearance of bias* can be as damaging as actual bias.

**Model Approach:** Immediately disclose the conflict of interest to the MPC Chairperson (RBI Governor) in writing before the meeting. Recuse from voting if the Governor advises so. Ensure spouse divests or places holdings in a blind trust going forward. Proactively document all disclosures.
