IMD Forecasts Below-Normal Monsoon in July 2026; NGT Orders Restoration of Suav River Status in UP

What happened: The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has forecast below-normal rainfall for July 2026, warning that nationwide rainfall is likely to remain below 94% of the Long Period Average (LPA = 280.4 mm for July). This raises serious risks for Kharif crop sowing (particularly paddy, soybean, cotton and coarse cereals), water reservoir levels, and rural livelihoods. Simultaneously, the National Green Tribunal (NGT) has ordered the Uttar Pradesh government to restore the Suav river — a major tributary of the Rapti river in Balrampur district — from its erroneous classification as a "nullah" (drain) back to its rightful status as a river in all official revenue records, gazette notifications and local publications.

Why it matters for UPSC: Two themes converge: (1) Monsoon variability and its cascading impacts on agriculture, food security and rural economies — a perennial GS1 and GS3 topic; (2) Environmental jurisprudence via NGT — the power of NGT to correct administrative classification errors that affect river ecology and floodplain management — GS3 and GS2 (polity/governance).

⚡ KEY FACTS

- ▶ **South-West Monsoon (June–September)** contributes ~70–75% of India's annual rainfall; Kharif sowing is entirely dependent on its timely onset and distribution.
- ▶ IMD Monsoon Classification: *Normal* = 96–104% of LPA | *Below Normal* = 90–95% of LPA | *Deficient* = <90% of LPA. July 2026 is forecast in the **Below Normal** bracket.
- ▶ **Suav River:** Tributary of the **Rapti River** in **Balrampur district, Uttar Pradesh**. The NGT order (originally February 2026) was triggered by a petition; classified as nullah in revenue records, depriving it of legal river protections.
- ▶ **NGT significance:** Classifying a river as a drain removes it from the ambit of the Water (Prevention & Control of Pollution) Act, 1974 and riverbed/floodplain protection norms — a common administrative tactic to clear encroachments.
- ▶ India has ~25,000 km of mapped rivers; hundreds have been reclassified as drains to enable encroachments, industrial waste dumping and construction — NGT orders like this set precedent.

💡 TEACHING HOOK — RIVER VS. NULLAH: THE LEGAL BATTLE

Why does it matter whether water is called a "river" or a "nullah"? Rivers attract: **Water (P&C) Act protections**, **MOEFCC riverbed**, **National River Conservation Plan** coverage, and floodplain zoning under state laws. A nullah gets none of these. This reclassification trick is used across India to enable encroachment. Connect: **Yamuna floodplain Delhi** | **Mithi river Mumbai** —

same pattern. NGT's Suav order is jurisprudence: the tribunal can compel administrative corrections, not just stop pollution. Classic GS3 + GS2 hybrid question.

Olive Ridley Sea Turtle (*Lepidochelys olivacea*) — IUCN Vulnerable, World's Most Abundant Sea Turtle, Yet Under Threat

What is it: The Olive Ridley Sea Turtle (*Lepidochelys olivacea*) is the smallest and most abundant of all sea turtle species, yet classified as **Vulnerable** on the IUCN Red List. It is best known for its remarkable mass-nesting phenomenon called **arribada** (Spanish for "arrival"), where hundreds of thousands of females simultaneously emerge on the same beach to nest. India's Odisha coast — particularly Gahirmatha (Bhitarkanika), Rushikulya and Devi River mouth — hosts three of the world's largest arribada nesting sites.

Why it matters for UPSC: Olive Ridley turtles are a perennial Prelims topic (IUCN status, nesting beaches, Operation Olivia, legal protections). They also appear in GS3 Mains questions on biodiversity conservation, marine ecosystem health and coastal management.

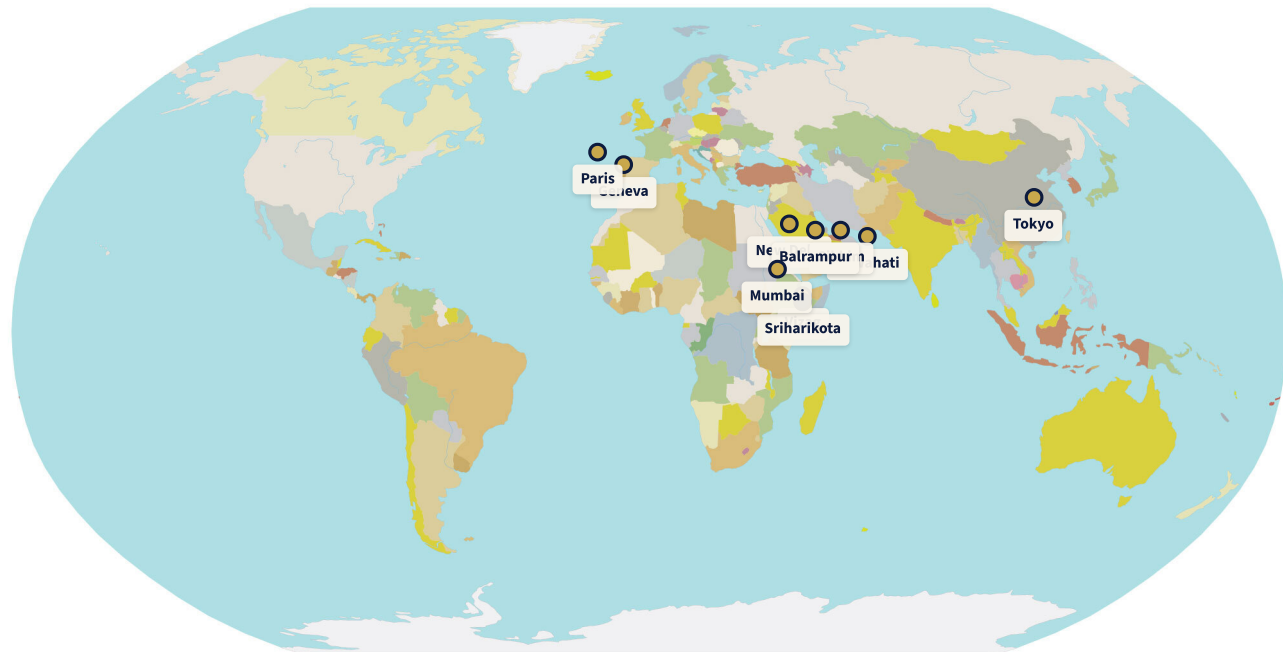

- ▶ **Distribution:** Tropical & subtropical Pacific, Atlantic and Indian Oceans; major nesting: Mexico (La Escobilla), Costa Rica (Ostional), India (Odisha).

UPSC 2023 Prelims had a question on this exact distinction. Memorise: **GOHLE** — "Good Old Hippies Love Groove" → Green, Olive, Hawksbill, Loggerhead, Giant Leatherback.

CASE 1

The Cooperative Bank Fraud vs. 20,000 Depositors

You are the IAS Collector of Balrampur district. An audit reveals that the chairman of the District Cooperative Bank — a politically influential figure close to the Chief Minister — has approved fictitious loans to proxy accounts totalling ₹45 crore. The bank's 20,000 small depositors, mostly farmers and MGNREGA workers, face risk of losing their savings. Acting immediately will trigger political backlash and could derail 12 government development projects under your charge. Delaying action will allow the fraud to continue and possibly cover tracks.

Values at stake: Integrity, Rule of Law, Accountability, Protection of the Vulnerable, Courage of Conviction vs. Political Pressure

Ethical framework: Kantian duty (act on principle regardless of consequences) + Utilitarian calculus (20,000 depositors > political convenience)

Suggested approach: Immediately alert NABARD and RBI's cooperative bank supervisory division; file a formal complaint with state police Economic Offences Wing; inform the State Registrar of Cooperative Societies; request a temporary freeze on suspicious accounts through NABARD. Avoid confronting the chairman without institutional backing. Protect yourself via proper escalation — not silence.

UPSC linkage: GS4 — Ethical dilemmas of public servants; Probity; Whistleblower Protection Act, 2014; Foundational values for civil servants (AIS conduct rules)

CASE 2

The GISAT-2 Safety Flaw — Silence or Speak?

You are a senior systems engineer at ISRO working on the GISAT-2 mission. Three weeks before launch, you discover a flaw in the thermal shielding of the cryogenic upper stage — identical to the anomaly that caused EOS-03 (GISAT-1) to fail in 2021. You inform your project director but are told to "stay quiet" as disclosure will delay the launch by 6 months, disappoint national expectations and affect your promotion. The flaw could cause another mission failure — or, in a worst case, endanger ground tracking facilities during re-entry.

Values at stake: Professional Ethics, Moral Courage, Public Safety, Institutional Loyalty vs. Duty of Care, Truth-telling

Ethical framework: Deontological — the engineer has a non-negotiable duty of safety disclosure. Consequentialist counter: cover-up could cause far greater harm (mission failure + public distrust of ISRO) than a 6-month delay.

Suggested approach: Document the finding formally in writing, submit to the Project Director and Mission Director via official channels. If suppressed, escalate to the Safety Review Board. Use the Right to Information Act if necessary. Professional ethics codes (like IEEE Code of Ethics) obligate engineers to prioritise public safety over institutional or personal interests.

UPSC linkage: GS4 — Professional ethics; scientific temper; whistleblowing in government organisations; duty vs. loyalty conflict

CASE 3**AI Data for Public Health — Privacy vs. Greater Good**

You are a senior official in the Ministry of Electronics and IT, tasked with India's submission to the UN Global Dialogue on AI Governance. A tech company offers to share "anonymized" health data of 50 crore Indians for training an AI disease prediction model. Initial analysis suggests the data is only partially anonymized — re-identification of specific communities (particularly tribal health records) is possible. Using the data could save millions of lives through early disease detection. Refusing may mean India lacks the data advantage at global forums.

- Values at stake:** Public health welfare, Privacy as a Fundamental Right (K.S. Puttaswamy judgment, 2017), Informed consent, Transparency, Non-discrimination
- Ethical framework:** Rights-based ethics (privacy is non-negotiable even for public good) + Consequentialist concern (vulnerable communities most at risk from re-identification) + Proportionality principle
- Suggested approach:** Reject the data as currently structured. Commission an independent privacy audit. If anonymization is certified as robust by a neutral technical body, reconsider under strict data governance protocols (DPDP Act 2023 compliance). Any AI health model built on citizen data must be open for public scrutiny.
- UPSC linkage:** GS4 — Privacy ethics, data governance; GS2 — Digital Personal Data Protection Act 2023; AI governance; K.S. Puttaswamy case

CASE 4**The 16-Year-Old Drug Carrier — Deterrence vs. Compassion**

As SP (Superintendent of Police) in a Northeast district bordering Myanmar, your team intercepts a major drug consignment worth ₹80 crore. The primary courier is a 16-year-old orphan from a border village, clearly being used as a "mule" by a large trafficking network. Prosecuting the juvenile under the NDPS Act will set a deterrence precedent but will harm a child who had no meaningful choice. Letting him go with just rehabilitation referral will alert the trafficking network and destroy 6 months of intelligence work. The traffickers remain at large in either scenario.

- Values at stake:** Child welfare and protection, Rule of Law, Compassion, Justice (retributive vs. rehabilitative), Long-term deterrence vs. immediate humanity
- Ethical framework:** Care ethics (prioritise the child's vulnerability) + Restorative justice (rehabilitation over punishment for juveniles) + Systemic thinking (the real target is the trafficking network, not the mule)
- Suggested approach:** Invoke the Juvenile Justice Act 2015 — the minor must be produced before the Juvenile Justice Board, not prosecuted under NDPS. Use the juvenile's information to continue intelligence operations (he is a witness/source, not the perpetrator). Ensure placement in a proper rehabilitation facility. The trafficking network remains the actual target.
- UPSC linkage:** GS4 — Compassion in public service; Juvenile Justice Act 2015; NDPS Act; GS3 — Internal security; drug trafficking in Northeast

Q4. CODOG propulsion system, fitted in INS Mahendragiri, refers to:

Q5. The inaugural UN Global Dialogue on AI Governance (Geneva, July 2026) was significant primarily because:

Answer: (c) Rapti. The Suav is a tributary of the Rapti river in Balrampur district, Uttar Pradesh. The Rapti itself drains into the Ghaghara/Sarayu before joining the Ganga.

1. It is classified as Vulnerable on the IUCN Red List.

Identify the ethical issues and the course of action you would take, with reasons.

Framework — Ethical issues: (1) Integrity vs. self-preservation; (2) Protection of vulnerable tribal farmers; (3) Institutional complicity risk; (4) Nexus between cooperative governance and law enforcement → **Course of action:** Document evidence meticulously → Report formally to District Registrar of Cooperative Societies and NABARD regional office (bypassing the SP) → Alert State Government's cooperative audit cell → If necessary, file complaint with NHRC (tribal rights) and/or SEBI/RBI cooperative oversight body → Use RTI as a transparency shield → Refuse to be silenced; the AIS conduct rules and the Protection of Human Rights Act

provide institutional recourse. The key principle: public office is a public trust — harm to tribals is not a bureaucratic inconvenience to manage quietly; it is a constitutional obligation to redress.
