





BOARD PONDERS EXPANSION OF SCHOOL FACILITIES

When the Argos Community School Corporation was first formed, plans were made to provide for further expansion. During the past seven years the classrooms have become so crowded that it has been necessary to use high school space for elementary classrooms. The formation of a cumulative building was postponed until 1963 because of the possibility of reorganization. Since Argos will be allowed to remain an independent unit, the fund was started and an emergency loan approved. \$112,500 was raised in this manner.

The next step was to plan an addition. The new section, as designed by Reid,

Ruebe, Thompson & Associates, Inc. will consist of five class-rooms, an audio-visual storeroom, a teachers' book area, an elementary principal's office and restroom facilities. It will be located off the play porch in the elementary section. The addition is designed to blend with the present architecture.


Each room will have a maximum amount of storage space and will have its own sink and closet.

and they are chosen on the basis of scholarship, character, leadership and service towards their school and community.


Mr. James Wysong has sponsored the group since its inception three years ago. Tht total membership is now twenty-three.



Mrs. Stephenson was full of patience and helpfulness for the cast and was a really wonderful director.





In the first all county tournament, Argos drew LaPaz and lost again. LaPaz went on to win the tourney.




The gymnastics program expanded at Argos for the third year in a row with the addition of parallel bars. Many new stunts were performed on them by students from the 5th grade on up.

Through an extensive 8-week unit in physical education, the freshman boys found increased courage and bulging muscles as they competed with one another and with themselves to perfect their routines.




Creating a yearbook is an exciting, frustrating task, and one that has many hours of labor preceding the thrill of seeing the finished product.






