

AS THE SELLS and Gray Circus came to Argos on September 16, Chris Stults sits on the ground for a front row view of the entertainment.








#### Academics


The adding on of an all-purpose room enables high school and elementary students to possess more time in the gym for physical education and extra-curricular activities.





The business department offers basic skill courses in typing, shorthand, office practice, bookkeeping, and business math. Students learn about the world of business in business law and general business. A student enrolled in the business curriculum can obtain vocational training that will help him on the job in the future.

General information is also obtained in office practice, such as how to stand properly, wear your hair appropriately, and look just right. Accounting students found out that people really eat chocolate-covered ants and worms.

Physical education shortened down to P.E. gives students a class where setting at a desk each day is out and participation is in. Sewing, cooking, planning and serving meals, caring for children, planing weddings, planning parenthood, and home nursing are a few of the topics covered in the home ec classes. Students learn how to cope with the everyday problems involved in homemaking as well as how to deal with sewing your finger, catching your clothes on fire, and adding one tablespoon instead of one teaspoon of salt to six deviled eggs.

Integration of the sexes has hit the Argos shop class. Girls are taking drafting and woodworking. Shop students learn to weld, build, repair, and tear

engines apart.

A REQUIRED COURSE for junior high girls is home economics. Here, Karen Fear takes on the responsibilities of caring for children.







# Kids Learn the Newness of a Language and the Oldness of History



AT THE END of each math lesson, Mr. Cullers allows study time. Some students take advantage of it, and others don't.









Freshman, sophomore, and junior English classes provide students with the basic fundamentals of English.














Club work adds another dimension to the education of students at Argos High School. The students have the opportunity to join a variety of organizations.

At Argos Community School, grades kindergarten through twelve are all together in one building. This gives all students the chance to mix and mingle with other students from other classes.


Although the classes are close because all activities are in one building, they do have their separate projects. Junior high students have halloween and skating parties. Freshmen pay dues and have a party also.

Sophomores anticipate selecting and purchasing their class rings. Juniors were confronted with the task of selling concessions at ballgames to make money for the prom.



The features that take place at Argos help to make it just a little more special.













One of man's basic needs is security. Argos has security. For example, instead of 10 policemen patrolling our school halls, we only have 2 patrolling our whole town.




