






#### A Dream Come True






#### May 22, 1977




After receiving their trophies, diplomas, and roses, Valedictorian Karen Rensberger and Salutatorian Jim Grossman are the last to exit to the lobby.








Sunshine had their candy sale in the fall. The profits financed the year's activities and also provided a








Argos is a small but growing town. It has talented people and accessible resources for those who wish to take advantage of them. Only time will tell how much or how well it prepared us for life in an ever-


