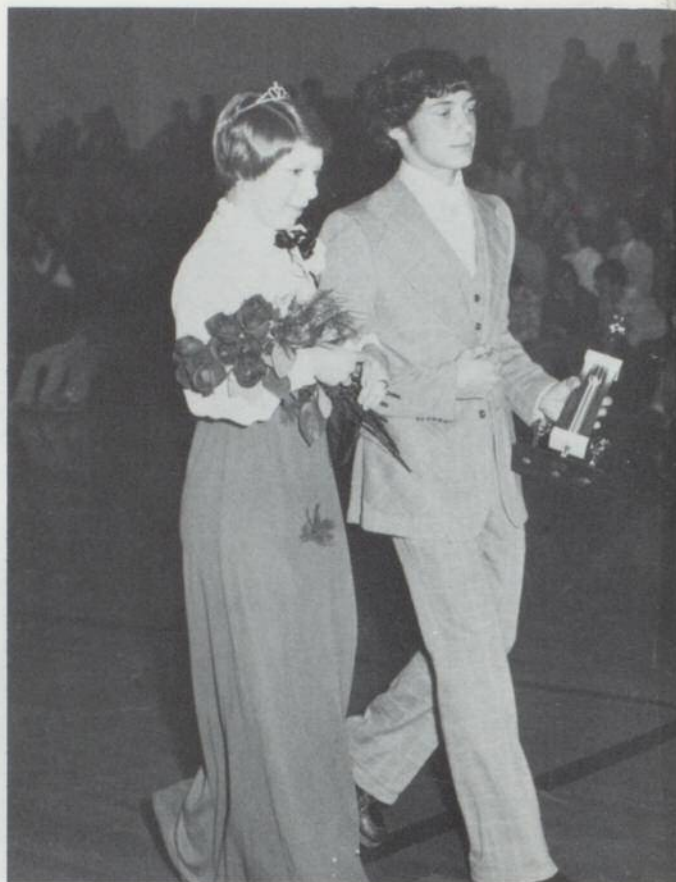

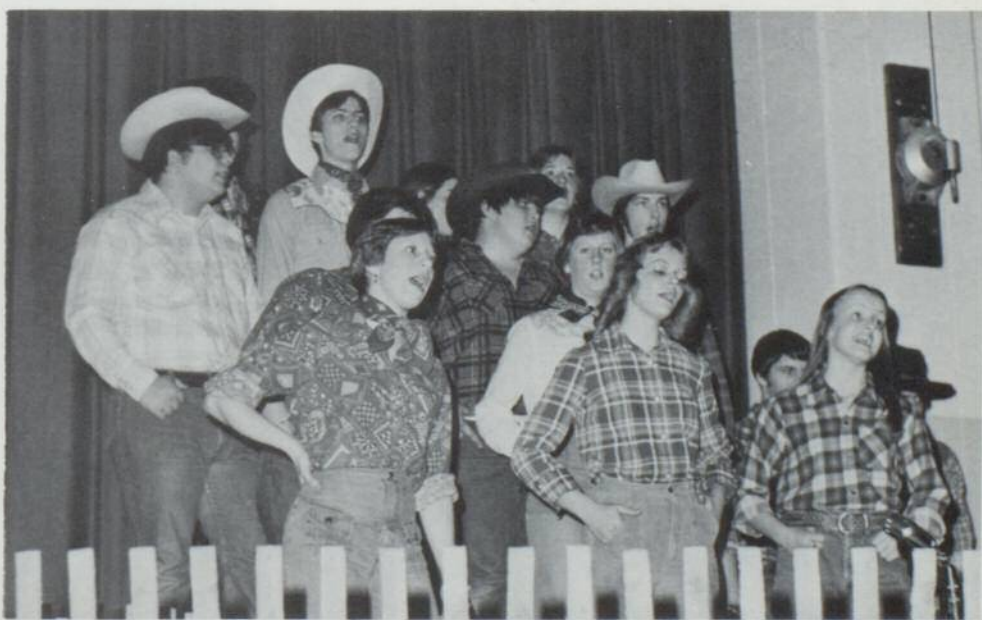

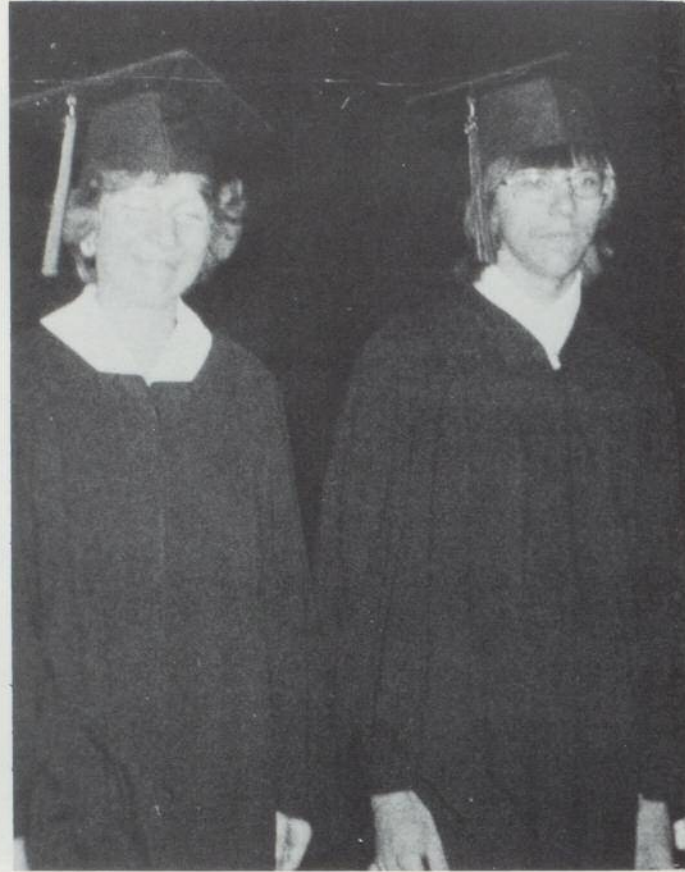


May 22, 1977

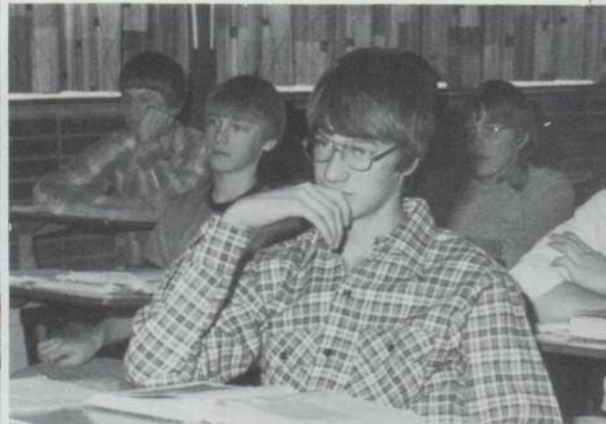
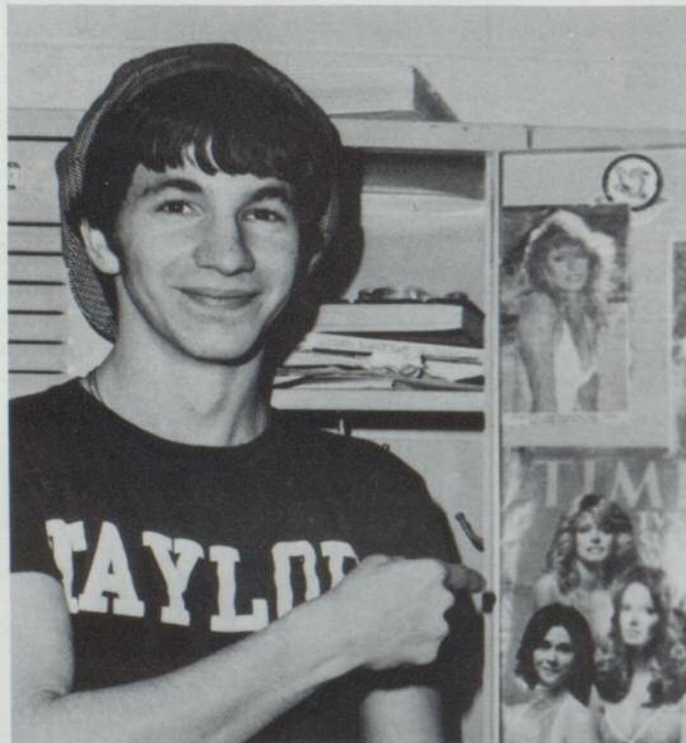
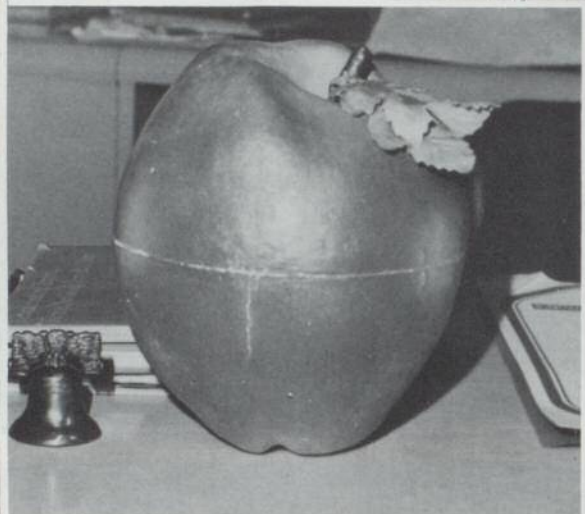

After receiving their trophies, diplomas, and roses, Valedictorian Karen Rensberger and Salutatorian Jim Grossman are the last to exit to the lobby.

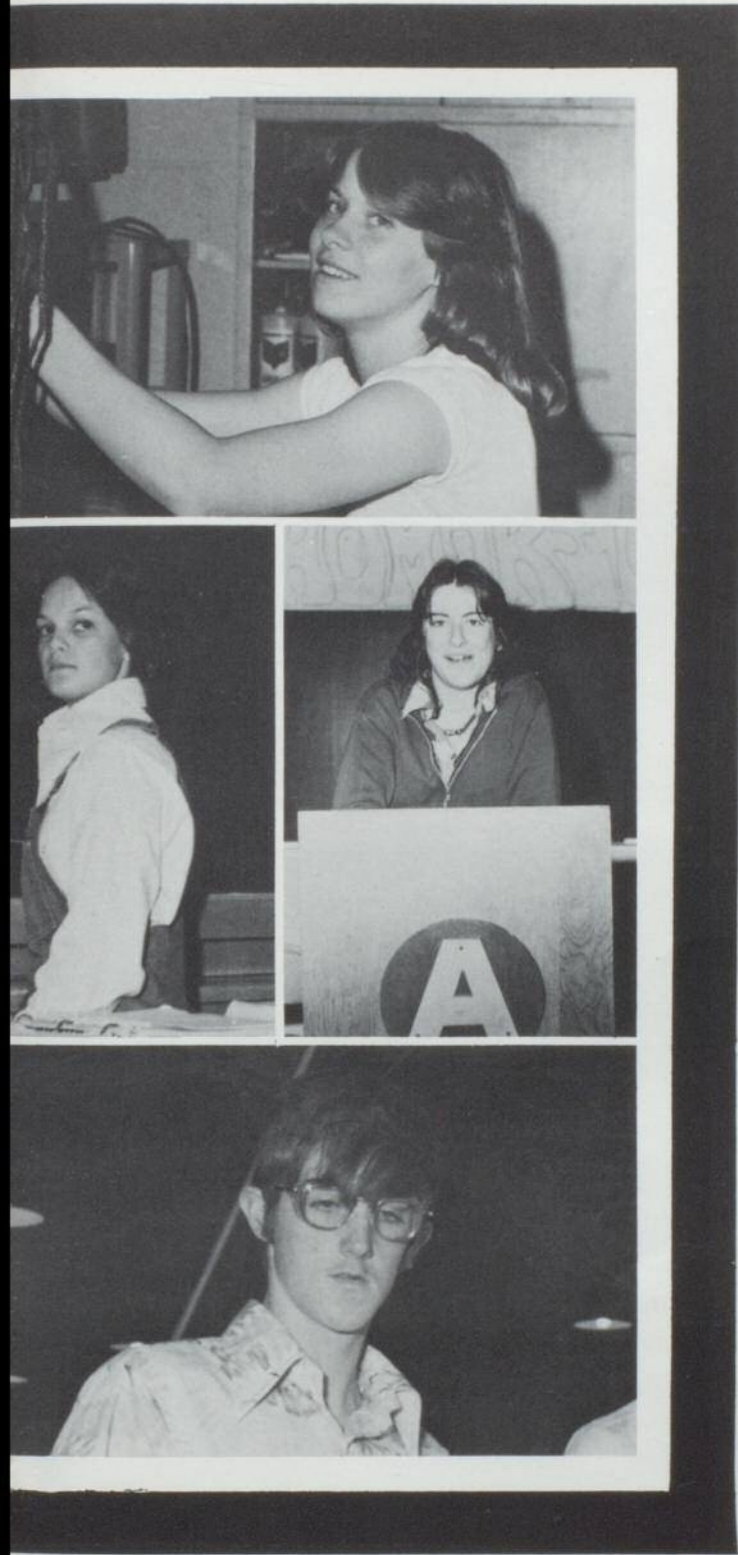

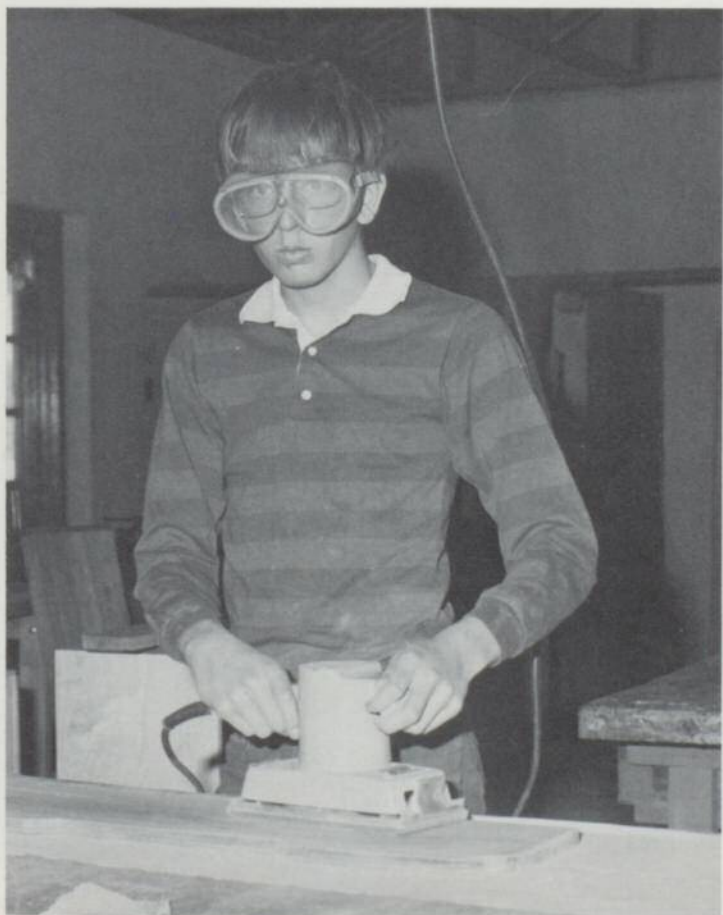

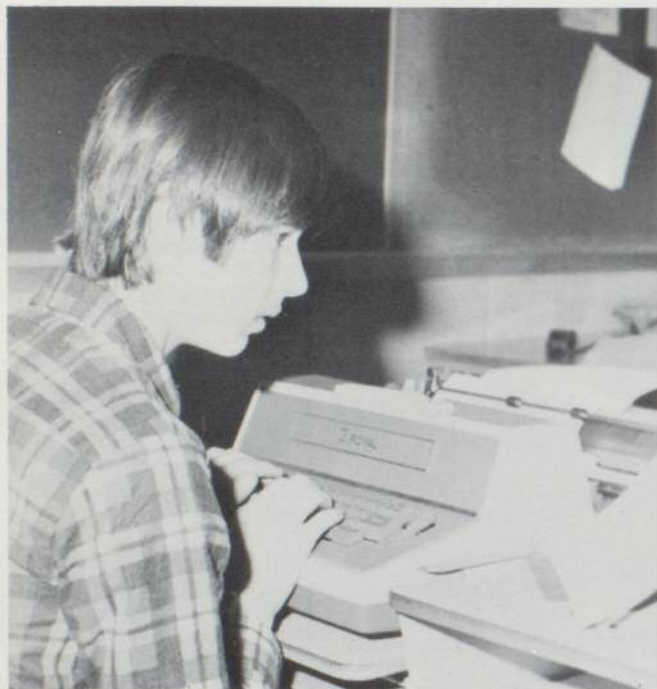

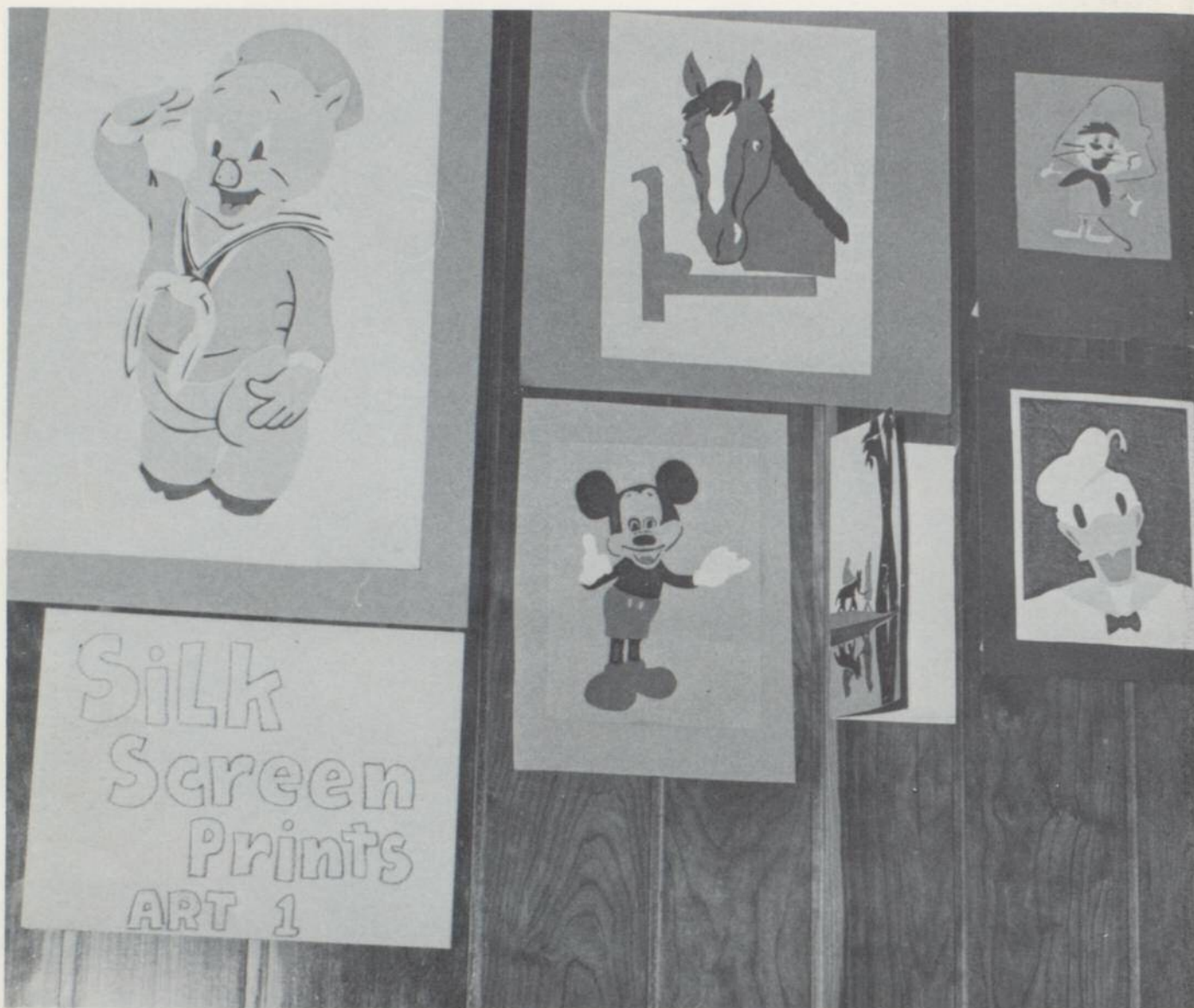

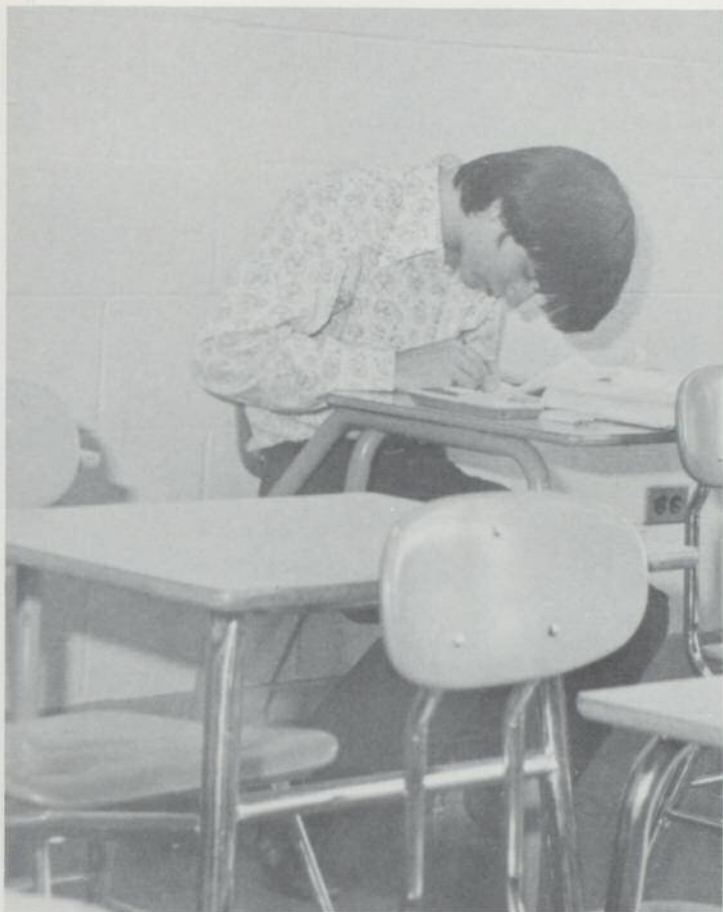

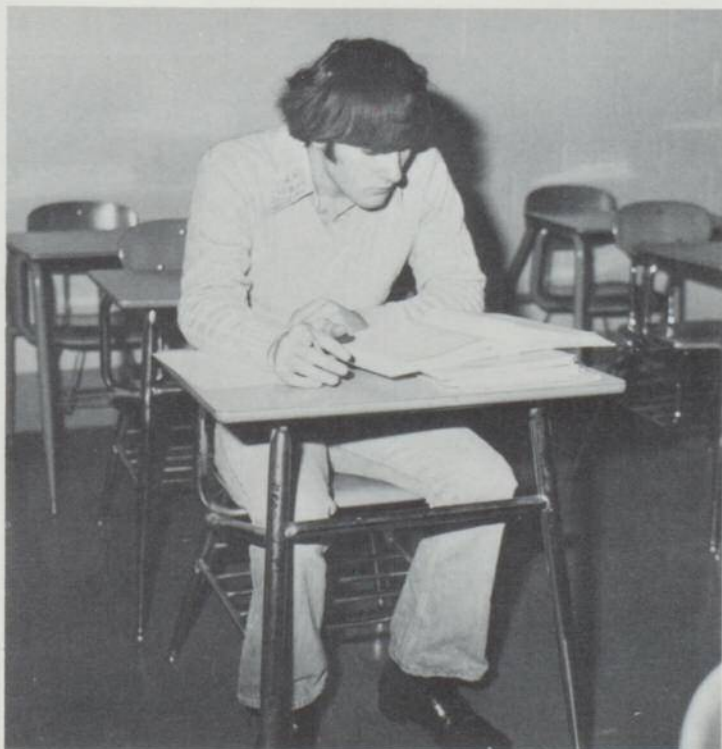

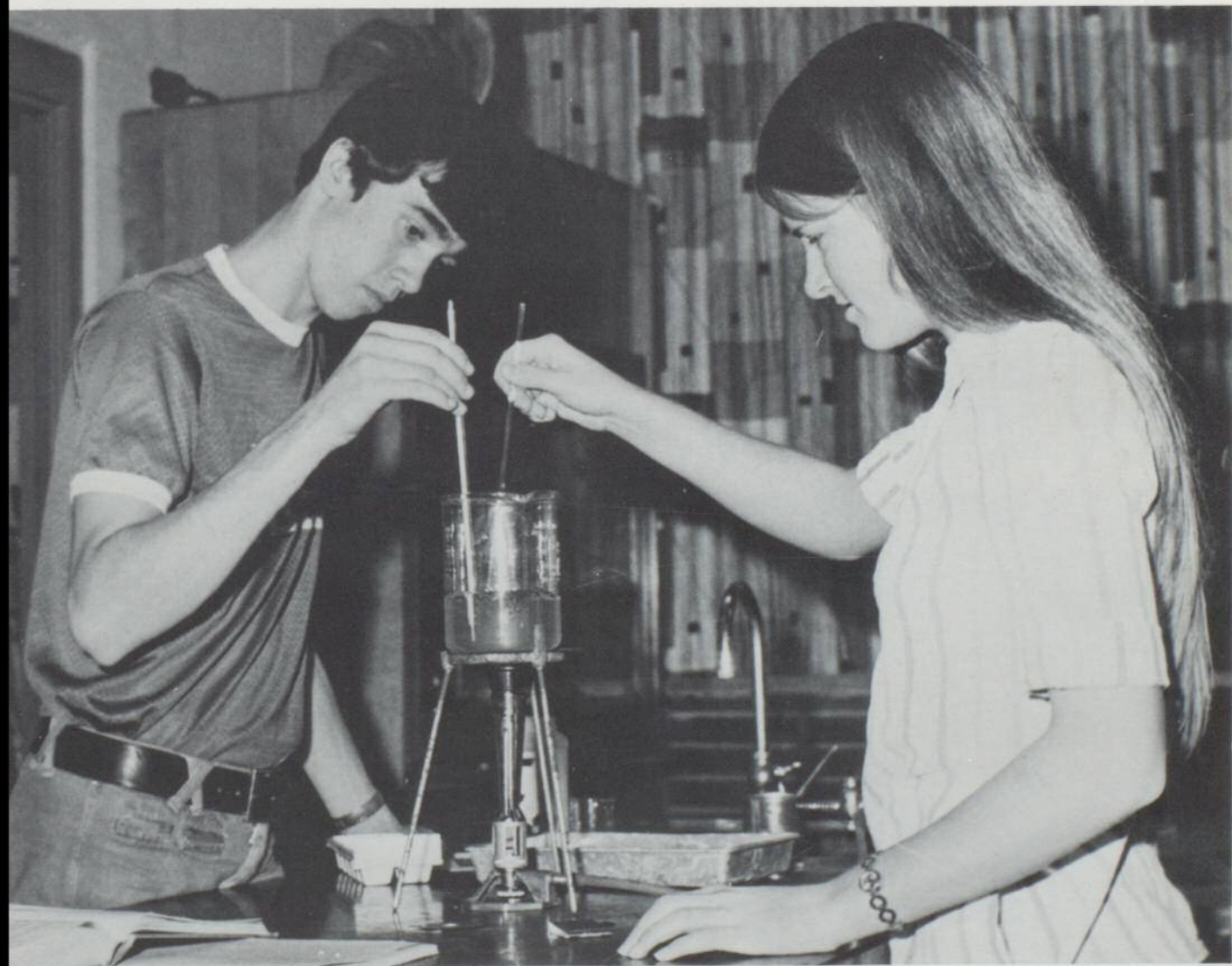

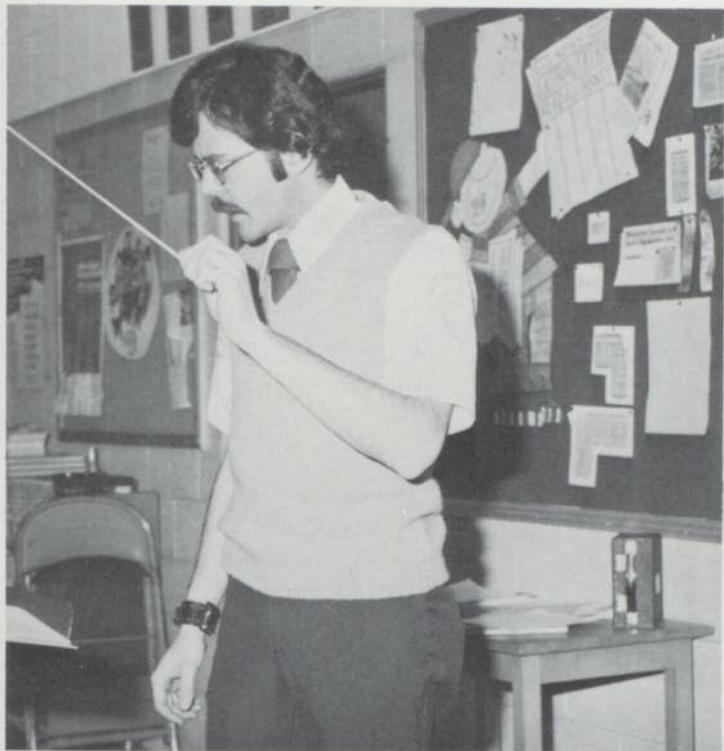

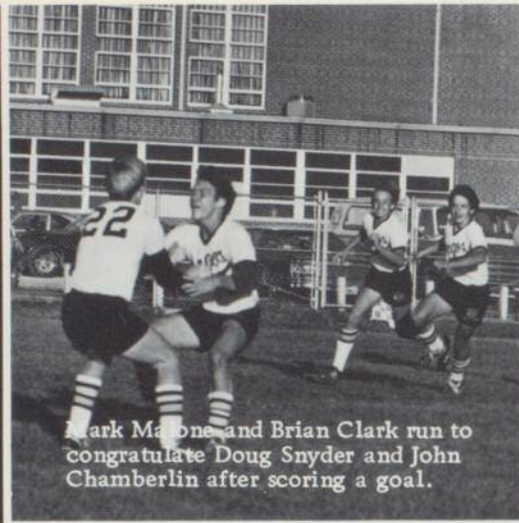

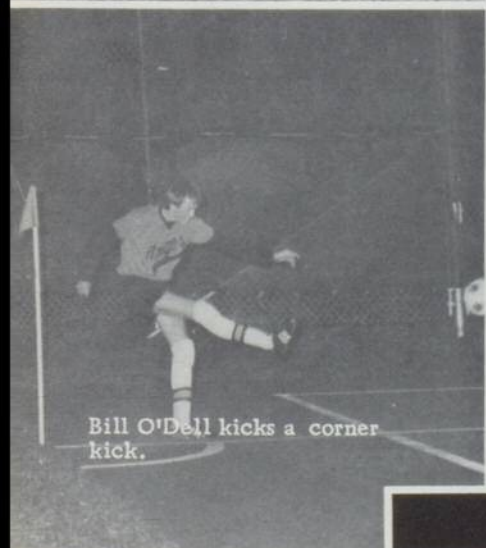

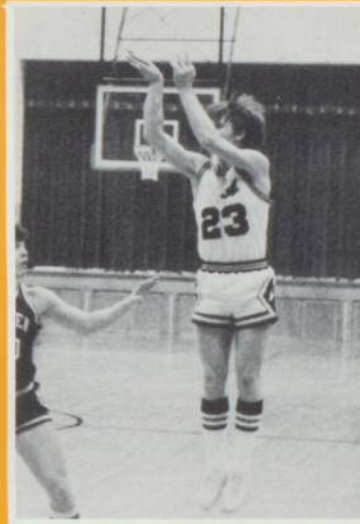

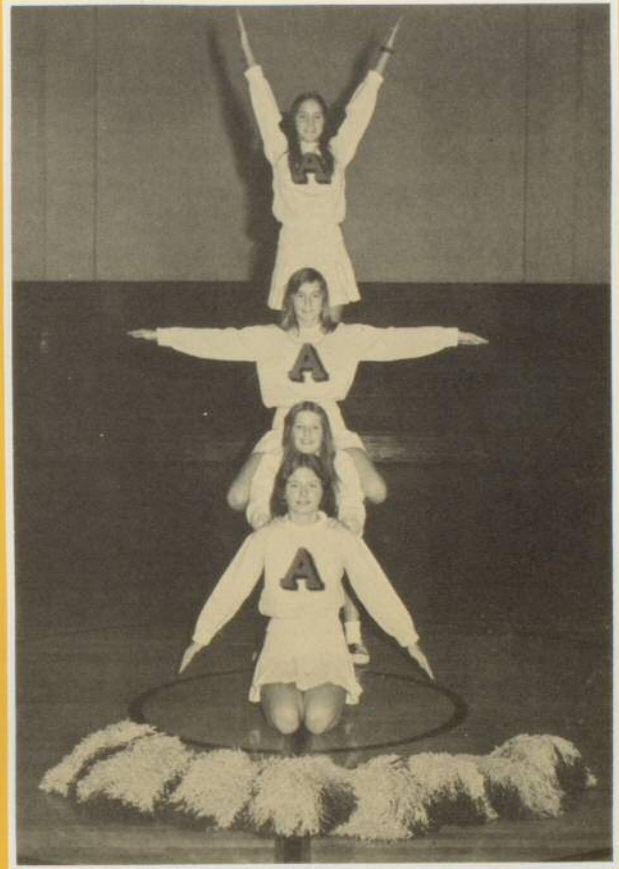

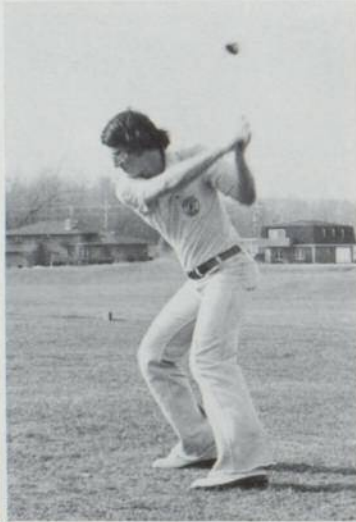

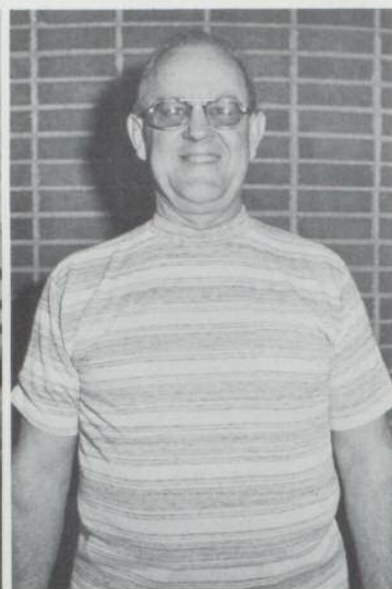
