WHO'S IN CHARGE?







One of the most interesting labs that the Chemistry class did this year was that of making soap. For centuries, people have boiled animal fat with the water extract from wood ashes to make soap. Today, however, soap is made by combining animal fat and sodium hydroxide.

From this lab, Julie, Tina, and Nancy learned that soap has several disadvantages as compared to detergents. Soap not only gives problems with hard water, but it also causes bathtub rings.

The three major areas of science study at Argos include Physics (the study of matter and energy and their interactions), Chemistry (the study of the composition, structure, and properties of substances and of the transformations that they undergo), and Biology (the study of plant and animal life).

Science and Mathematics provide the foundation for many careers — from medicine to computer programming.










Sternum, femur, and xiphoid process—these are the names of some of the bones in the human body. The human skeleton consists of about 206 separate bones of many sizes, shapes, and functions. The sophomore health class is required only to memorize the names and locations of about 30 of them.


Stan Yazel learned that the living parts of the bone include cartilage cells, bone cells, fibrous connective tissue, blood vessels, and nerves. The nonliving parts are minerals.

Stan also learned about the process of ossification, which is the replacement of cartilage with bone and the deposit of minerals in the bony region.


Health class has taught students many things from life-saving practices to good nutrition to the prevention of certain diseases.

The three social studies classes required for graduation are government, economics, and U.S. History. Government and economics are taken during a student's senior year. In these classes, students learn about our democratic political system and about our capitalistic economic system. In U.S. history, the juniors study wars, treaties, presidents, and the Constitution.

The elective social studies courses include civics, social problems, and world history. In social problems students tackle such subjects as going steady, marriage, and religion. In civics, students learn how to handle their responsibilities and privileges as U.S. citizens. In world history, students study the various civilizations of man — from the beginning of time through the 20th Century. These civilizations are studied in terms of their leadership, economic systems, and contributions to mankind.

Mr. Emenaker remarked that he would like to see more live animal demonstrations and true-to-life experiences presented to his classes.





AN INTERVIEW WITH EUGENE COOPER

Why did you become a science teacher?

I started as a Vocational Agriculture teacher and switched to science after five years, because I thought I could spend more time with my family as a science teacher. I have always liked science, and my master's degree is in the field of plant science.

What is new in your department this year?

We have new textbooks, and as a result are doing some different labs. The project biology and physics students are working on, in connection with the new park for the town, is very new and will be a different experience.

Why do you feel students enjoy your classes?

Science is so exciting. Now that I have taught a "few" years, I have more time to spend planning little fascinating demonstrations for class that help to hold attention.

How will students use what they learn in your classes in the future?

The basic thing that is taught in science is the technique of problem solving scientists apply to research problems. This problem solving can be applied to solving all kinds of problems, not to just scientific explanations. Of course, basic science is at the root of all we do, and a knowledge of this can help in everyday living.












