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Blue skies and a record turnout of players from across Mississippi combined recently to make for a great chess experience at Roosevelt State Park in Morton.

The second annual Bienville Chess Classic was held April 1 at the park's Alfreda-Harris Lodge where 45 players battled for prizes, improved ratings, and earned bragging rights. This is an increase from last year's 32 players in this tournament series, one of two series hosted by the Scott County Chess Club.


This event brought the turnout total to 192 players who have visited Scott County for four chess tournaments since the club started hosting in November 2021, holding one in the spring and one in the fall.

Chris Allen Baker, club founder and coordinator, said players reported having a great experience as many of them have played in the club's past tournaments but there were new faces.

"This tournament was incredible. We had players from North Mississippi to the coast and across Central Mississippi. It is a sign that Scott County is a popular destination for chess in our state," Baker said. "We are continuing to build something really special here."

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The event had additional support from the business community which donated funds toward the prizes and resources for the tournament itself.

"We could not do this without the support of our sponsors and partners. We appreciate their contributions and this year added more to the roster," Baker said. "We appreciate every business who stepped up to help us."

Champions were crowned in four sections over four rounds during the day-long event. Three rated sections included the Open, U1200 and U800. Players are grouped according to their skill levels reflected through ratings issued by the U.S. Chess Federation. The Open section is considered the most competitive

of the divisions in any chess tournament.

A particular feature of this tournament, the Beverly Jo Rhodes Memorial Award plaque goes to the first-place winner of the Open section. Rhodes was a gifted class teacher who started the WINGS program at Forest and supported chess among the class' activities.



The tournament included an unrated section for players just starting out, giving the experience of playing in a tournament without the pressures of ratings and U.S. Chess Federation membership.

"We offered this section last year, but everyone registered for the rated sections. I was thrilled to see registrations for the section this time around," Baker said. "It is a sign that not only are more people getting into chess as a whole, but more players are also seeking out opportunities to be competitive and learn how our tournaments work."

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As in the past tournaments the Club has hosted, at least one player has local ties to Scott County. Cody Batte won third place in the U1200 section this year after having captured the same award last year following two tie-break games.


Baker said he hopes Batte's success sets the stage for more players from Scott County to participate in the future.

With students in local schools having participated in scholastic chess competition earlier this year, they are welcome to compete in the two tournaments held locally.

"I am so excited that so many people from across the state wanted to be a part of what we are doing here. We allowed anyone who wanted to see a tournament like this to come see what it is about, and we did have some spectators," Baker said. "It would be great to see more local faces around these chess boards. The potential is there, and the invitation is extended."

Players must join the Federation to obtain a membership number which is required when registering for rated tournaments and other rated events. Tournament directors submit results to the Federation which impacts a player's rating.


