Dealing with Fungus Gnats

The bane of my existence this winter has been the dreaded fungus gnat (*Bradysia* spp.). These insidious little creature’s larvae love to inhabit overly wet soils. I probably brought it in when I brought in my houseplants for the winter. The adults leave the , often to soil and fly into your mouth, up your nose, and into your pets’ food.

I contemplated burning down the house just to get rid of them!

I read about them in Garden Gate Magazine and I tried some of their suggestions. They helped some. I am happy to report that I’m winning the war. This is what I tried.

- Letting my plants dry out a bit. The gnats are attracted to wet soil. This winter I will water less.
- Set up a sticky trap. The color yellow attracts these lousy things and they fly

into them and die. I ordered them from Amazon. (Cheers from me)

- Use a bt product like Knock out Gnats, or Gnatrol. I haven’t tried these yet.
- Cover the soil with gravel or sand
- Choose potting mix wisely
- Spray with insecticidal soap or Neem oil

I’m glad I didn’t burn down the house and I hope this helps. I wouldn’t want to wish this plague on anyone!

Things to do in the Garden:

January is one of the hardest months for the garden and one of the easiest for gardeners.

Here are some things to do:

- Snow is the gardens best friend. It insulates the plant roots. Carefully brush off evergreens if we get a heavy snowfall.
- Choose and order seeds from all the garden catalogs you are receiving. Try something new this year,
- Get lawnmowers and power equipment serviced. Avoid the Spring rush at centers
- Clean the foliage of your house plants. They will appreciate the extra sunlight from doing so. Also, you may find some hiding bugs so it’s a win/win.
