## TALMUD TALES

AMONG the books today and over the past centuries that have been considered sacred, the Jewish Talmud always occupies a prominent place. The Jews read it almost like another Bible, and much of it consists of traditions and laws which are said to have been communicated by word of mouth from the time of Moses. It contains the rabbis' writings, or authorized Jewish teachers, and includes stories, geography, poetry, law, and theology, unmatched in all literature. There are in it much tasteless and trivial tales, but there is also much that is wise and true, and many good stories, some of which will be told below.
