2. Evaluate Eisenhower's leadership decisions.
3. Explain the role of logistics, deception, and planning.
4. Analyze how the invasion changed the course of WWII.

Bell Ringer (5 Minutes)

Question: “What risks would military leaders face when planning a massive invasion?”

Introduction (10 Minutes)

Teacher discusses:

- Germany controlled much of Europe.
- Stalin pressured Allies to open a second front.
- Allies debated invasion strategy.
- Eisenhower became Supreme Allied Commander.

Discuss the “Germany First” strategy.

Direct Instruction (20 Minutes)

Section 1: Eisenhower’s Preparation

- North Africa and Sicily campaigns
- Leadership development

Section 2: Planning D-Day

Explain:

- Normandy chosen over Pas-de-Calais.
- Fake armies misled Germany.

- Air superiority was essential.
- Naval bombardment supported troops.

Section 3: D-Day Statistics

- 160,000 troops
- 7,000 vessels
- 12,000 aircraft
- Five landing beaches:
 - Utah
 - Omaha
 - Gold

 - Sword

Section 4: Consequences of Failure

Discuss:

- Longer war
- More casualties
- Greater Soviet control of Europe
- Possible use of atomic bombs in Europe

Guided Practice (10 Minutes)

Timeline Activity

Independent Practice (10 Minutes)

Historical Analysis Paragraph

Students must use evidence from the lesson.
