

The Rise of a Holiness Council

On March 14, 1949, a group of Holiness Ministers' Wives met at the home of Bishop and Mrs. Arthur R. Christian in Washington DC. Attendees of this initial meeting were Mrs. Nettie E. Davis, Mrs. India White, Mrs. Nana Acty, and Mrs. Wilhelmina Miller. In this meeting, Mrs. Christian beautifully outlined the revelation given to her from God of unifying Holiness ministers' wives. The aim was to promote and strengthen Christian fellowship among the wives of Holiness Ministers. Although not present at the meeting, others also expressed the desire for Christian unity. The first elected officers of the Holiness Council were: Mrs. Lillian Christian as President, Mrs. Nettie E. Davis as Vice President, Mrs. India White as Treasurer, Mrs. Lelia WIldy as Recording Secretary, Mrs. Celestine Keller as Assistant Recording Secretary, and Mrs. Nana Acty as Chaplin. Mrs. Irene Burton of Buffalo NY was present at the April 4, 1949 meeting and suggested as a motto: "Not by might, nor by power, but by thy spirit saith the Lord of Host." It was graciously accepted, and the organization was named the Holiness Ministers' Wives and Widows Council of Washington DC and Vicinity. Committees were formed and chairpersons appointed. From that first meeting, with few exceptions, the first Monday of each month at 8:00 o'clock PM, all the members assembled at the home of one of the members. By the third meeting in May, the president had drawn up and presented the Constitution and Bylaws which were unanimously accepted. They were printed in booklet form and distributed to the members.



The members decided upon the following aims: To promote and stimulate the interest of its members in all religious and spiritual fellowship; to promote and stimulate intellectual and social matters that were of a common interest; to act upon other matters of a more general nature; and to cooperate with other organizations who have similar interests. The members departed the meeting with a fervent determination to strengthen the bond among the wives and to help ministers' wives to better understand how to handle their day-to-day problems. Over the years, the organization has made many contributions and donations to several worthy causes such as: The American Leper Mission, Missionaries of the United Holiness Church in Liberia, Missionaries of the Church of God in Christ in Liberia, Jamaica, Haiti, to Missionaries in New Guinea, Missions in India, and to home missions in Baltimore, Washington DC, Virginia, and West Virginia, and to members in time of illness and bereavement. The meeting time has now been changed to the first Saturday of each month.



In 1979, Founder and President, Sister Lillian W. Christian died; and Vice President Mother Evelyn Simms served as Interim President from July 1979 to December 1979. In December 1979. Mother Mary Branch was elected and installed as President and lifted this organization to another milestone. During her administration, she formed a new Education Committee and Fellowship Brunch Committee; instituted the Oueen's Rally to benefit the educational fund: authorized the duties of the Executive and solidified Secretary; the Finance Committee. In April 1985, Evangelist Marjorie Brown became president and formed the 40th Anniversary Booklet Committee; established a the chairperson for Membership Pins Committee; established an Executive Board; and revised the Constitution and Bylaws. In April of 1989, Evangelist Patricia M. Brown of Annapolis, MD was elected president and published a monthly newsletter; revitalized the Annual Brunch as a major fundraiser; and realigned the organization with the State and International Associations of Ministers' Wives and Ministers' Widows. In 1993, Evangelist Lillian Tyree became president and took the Holiness Council through a difficult period of transition and change to become stronger women of God to deal with personal problems. In 1997, new President, Pastor Esther Murray, led with her profound wisdom and knowledge of God's Word and instituted the award for Minister's Wife of the Year and Minister's Widow of the Year. In 2000, Mrs. Eileen Baltimore became president and formed regional directors to be used as points of contact when emergencies occurred. Mrs. Baltimore contacted delinquent members to bring them back into the fold and began trips and other activities such as a telephone tree for member contact, mentorship program, and a website.

In April 2004, Mrs. Dale Brown was installed as the 9th president, and she immediately added members to enhance the membership committee and took the idea of mentorship to a higher level when she paired new members with seasoned members in the Holiness Council. In 2009, we sponsored the first Minister's Wives Conference and published our 60th Anniversary Souvenir booklet. The Annual Brunch was named the Rosie L. Young Brunch with the funds from this branch ear-marked for domestic and international missions.

In 2010, Mrs. Agnes Vincent was elected president of the Holiness Council and renamed the monthly programs as "Spiritual Enrichment Sessions", providing special certificates for engaging in the sessions. Mrs. Vincent trained the vice presidents to prepare them to assume responsibility as president and chaired the Women's Conference. In January 2014, Mrs. Inez Elliott was selected as president and expressed a desire to produce a book on the rich history of the Holiness Council. She assembled a membership directory; and under her tenure for two years, the Holiness Council won First Place in table display at the Annual Rainbow Tea sponsored by the District of Columbia Association of Ministers' Wives and Ministers' Widows. In 2018, Mrs. Beverly Ellerbe was chosen as the current president. She is an example to all ministers' wives, and we stand today celebrating 71 years of keeping the vision alive all because of the inspiration of one woman, our Founder Mrs. Lillian W. Christian. This has become a great organization. May the vision remain alive in our hearts from everlasting to everlasting. Oh God, our help in ages past, our hope for years to come, be thou our guide while life shall last and our Eternal Home.




She is currently the newly appointed Second Vice President to the State of DCAMWMW.

Case Study — Worship via Social Media Shaw University Divinity School

Many states in this country recently instituted stay-athome orders to stop the spread of COVID-19. This pandemic has governments ordering or advising the avoidance of gatherings of more than 10 people. This means that most churches are not able to physically meet. Therefore, the church has been deployed into the realm of social media. This case study analyzes three churches and determines their readiness for this new platform, and what the church needs to do in the future to advance the message of the Gospel.

The worship services of a small, medium, and a mega church from my hometown in the Washington D.C., area were analyzed: Servants For Christ Ministries, Campbell A.M.E. Church, and the First Baptist Church of Glenarden.

Servants for Christ Ministries is a small church pastored by Reverend Dr. Jerry Jones in Ft. Washington, MD. It has an average attendance of 20-25 people per week. The church was using social media prior to the pandemic. However, as a result of the pandemic, the church began using additional social media platforms including a Facebook live streaming service in their sanctuary. They also started a YouTube channel. They have a Technical/Communications Director who developed the platforms. In addition, the church now has prayer meetings via Zoom. They have also established an Instagram account.

Lastly, as a result of the pandemic, they updated their website and offered additional platforms to give tithes and offerings on-line. They also began utilizing electronic giving through phone apps. Servants for Christ Ministries' worship services can be accessed on https://youtu.be/yttVjSwvmYo. This church's quick adaptation to the need for social media during the pandemic was impressive. The Facebook Live video was excellent. Most of the videos are of the pastor providing the sermon from the pulpit. The quality of the video is excellent particularly so since the church does not have a large budget.

Campbell A.M.E. Church is a medium-size historic church in Washington, D.C. It has approximately 300 members. Frederick Douglass lived in close proximity to the church and attended it on several occasions. The pastor is Reverend Dr. Henry White. Prior to the pandemic, the church posted its full Sunday Service on Facebook. They have a few YouTube videos of past events as well. After the pandemic Dr. White posts his sermons only. The Easter Worship Service was actually taken at Dr. White's home. The video was well done. His message was clear. It was evident that Dr. White has videotaped messages in the past. First Baptist Church of Glenarden is pastored by Reverend John Jenkins. The church has over 10,000 members and approximately 400 employees. First Baptist Church of Glenarden is located in Upper Marlboro, MD. This church has done a lot of social media prior to the pandemic. The YouTube video titled, "Spiritual Warfare Part Seven—The Sword of the Spirit," done after the pandemic was near perfect. Many of the mega churches have outstanding videos. This is likely because of their larger budgets. The video began with clips of the choir during past worship services. There is a text box on the top of the screen stating that it was prerecorded prior to restrictions. The short clips during announcements and of the choir and scenes of worshippers praising God, provided one with a feeling that you were actually present at worship. The scriptures are beautifully posted. The video is clear and quite impressive.

It was evident that all the churches in this case study were prepared in various degrees to move to a social media platform for worship when the pandemic restrictions began. All of the pastors had an excellent message to preach and all provided a call to salvation. However, with the exception on First Baptist of Glenarden, I felt that I had not been to a corporate worship service. I realize that it must be difficult to preach in the African American experience without at least an occasion amen; however, we must remember that worship is not just the preaching moment. The awe and adoration of God was not evident in some cases. Many of the preachers was more concern with getting through this new experience instead of creating a worshipful event.

In the last few weeks, I have watched many online services. Preachers have been creative. Some present themselves at home like a fire-side chat moment. Others, like my Pastor, Paul Anderson, videotaped their message at church. My pastor actually created a worshipful background using worship flags that remind one of the date on the liturgical calendar, for example, a flag for Palm Sunday. Some of the pastor's videos had sound or buffering issues. There was one video where the Pastor was at his desk at home preaching the Sunday message and obviously quite uncomfortable with using social media. His wife walked into the room in the middle of his talk to assist him on the computer. It was obviously a first time and painful experience for this pastor. However, I applaud him and all the other preachers that have had to do a new thing and learn how to do a video presentation for worship. It was uncomfortable for many, but it is necessary considering the times we live in.

I love and miss corporate worship. However, for safely purposes, I will continue to watch worship services online for now. I understand that worship is not just a corporate event. There is of course personal worship. However, if pastors are having social media worship instead of corporate worship at churches, my personal preference is a service that recreates, as much as possible, the full worship experience with maybe scenes of worshippers and some music. We need more training for pastors in how to reach the masses through social media. In addition, for those churches who can afford it, a skilled Videographer is now a necessary staff position.
