I grew up on a farm I was that little kid driving a tractor at one point till I was strong enough to pick up the hay bales and keep up with the speed and then my tail was out there like the rest of the young uns But you made me, you made me think about something that I haven't heard mentioned before. Would you expect if we are dealing with large farms, and I think camps got a lot of usage coming forward once the restrictions are taken off of it, you know, and that's from building cars to the gas that they use to close to houses fireproof stuff, there's so much use for him. I really see that as something that's going to really take off whenever good guys have control, I guess. But as far as working with love won industries, would you expect that to be the benefactor? And that would work directly there and then sub the work down to the managing director? Or would we put a managing director be in contact with love won industries thought crossed my mind. So I wanted to at least ask that I'd be.

It's an excellent thing, love won industries is involved in the contractual part of it. And then we have the functional things that are farmed does, that can't be handled by local CAC directors. So there's a combination of what would take place there. The line is not definitively drawn, there's probably a lot of overlap. But I feel that you have to have somebody locally, like a director, a CAC director, and that CAC director can be responsible for repairing soil, or getting things or whatever is necessary to, to the farmers to repair soil. And to bring back the culture that we had when we had nutritional food. The way it is, now, they just put it up in there to make these beautiful looking tomatoes that don't that it doesn't taste like a tomato anymore,

right. And those are the kinds of things that have to be repaired. So there's a lot of, if I were to go to a tomato farmer, and start talking about some of the things that make tomatoes tastes like tomatoes, he would know exactly what I'm talking about. But because he has to do things a certain way for the people that he sells his, his tomatoes to, so that they can make a lot of money without spending a lot of money. We're going to go the opposite direction, we're going to spend a lot of money because theoretically, you can see what I'm trying to say a person, one person once in benefactor with a 100 keynote getting \$500,000 is going to make 1.25 quintillion dollars every quarter. I imagine 3530 35,000 of those kinds of people. Right? The economy of the world is somewhere between 80 and 120. That's who live hurt. I don't care what it is. There's nothing that they can have had that can compare with one of us. Right? And that's money that we're putting into society, not just creating money for ourselves. It's being consumed. And a lot of that money is going to be consumed by changing things the way that we do. We don't have to have money for that. But yeah, only Brian. So we get to have a lot of fun with this.

Now, those are the kinds of people who will be involved in the contractual obligations that we were that are not obligations, but the contracts that we're going to sign. But you need that person is down the road, you know, and eventually out of the county because he's still working, but the local people are the ones that will be here. helping it to work. And I say that CAC is in a rural area. So those are the people who there's there's gonna be some really, really good people who were doing a tremendous service for mankind by helping a farmers with everything that they need to create good quality food, nutritious food. Right.

You know, we've been talking a lot about farms, of course. This is Kevin, by the way. We've been talking a lot about farms, and specifically agricultural farms. We never really talked about the livestock farms. You know, we're supposed to be kind of moving into five d. And hopefully society will start moving into eating more plants rather than animals. And so I was just kind of wondering, what your what is your thoughts concerning those of us trying to help perhaps the livestock farmer to purchase their livestock, whether it be the cattle or the pigs, or the chickens or something and, and sending them to sanctuaries or something? I don't know. It's just a thought. I mean, I know there's going to be a transition period going on, but how do we save our livestock animals? I guess that's my, my question. Thank you.

Okay, let's take cattle for instance, and I'm not sure about others, but I've been involved in the cattle operations a little bit. I work for a farmer actually was a veterinarian believed in baby bowls. As the most nutritious and the most natural meat that you can get. It would take you a year of feeding those baby bowls with hay, instead of sending them off to castrating them or sending them off to a fattening place that feeds them. That that corn garbage and the cows don't know what to do, their bodies don't know what to do with it just fattens them up. While you lead them out on the range, the baby bulls, lead them out on the range for a year, let them grow up. And their natural testosterone will cribbing to produce the weight that they need to create really, really good food or really, really good meat that's nutritious. And we don't feed them with a bunch of garbage. We let the natural sources take their place. Resources take their place. And then when they come times for the harvesting, they're done in a very humane way. It's like the Indians used to have their they have the Buffalo and go out and organize they have a buffalo shoot and then they come out and they'd say blessings over their their animals that they had shot. And then they will consume the meat and take everything and that is edible and good. And thanks be to God for that for the American Indians because that's the way that they were raised. Well let's just be sure that we can do whatever we possibly can to be sure that the animals are treated humanely. You don't go up and kiss them and and make them pets that's hard on the heart to do that and then have them taken away for to make whatever steaks and bacon so we do things as best we can to ensure that they're those animals are giving their life for something that is useful, and not taken their lives in humanely or treated inhumanely while they're growing. There's nothing you should never start have lines and chickens sitting on top of each other pooping on each other all day long. That is a travesty. Whoever does that needs to be taken out. Officer scissors in my mind. Yeah,



I'm hoping that the replicators will happen real quickly and we can start replicating meat products and without killing the end. because particularly my heart goes out to these animals, and I prefer to purchase all of these livestock from that farmer, you know, and and then send these animals to a sanctuary someplace, you know, and, and figure out some way that I can compensate the farmer for him not having his cattle or his livestock anymore. That's kind of where my heart set so

People don't stop eating meat and less, there's a reason to do that. And there's something that can take its place. And so a man replicator can come along, and maybe do that. Now. As I've inquired about matter, replicators. I heard well, it'll, it'll stop the starvation, it'll help that. But it's not going to take the place of a family meal. It can, can take the place totally of it. But there's a socialist, there's a loving, there's an ambiance of having a family meal. And that meal can can change over a period of time. And I would love to let it do that. But I don't want to force people to change their way of living, because they have some kind of a belief system that's not consistent with their love won society is not denominational. And so if you're a Muslim, and you don't want to have pork, then that's okay. I have no problems with that. But the person who's creating growing pork, and supplying for bacon and things of that nature, well, let's change things to the way we can without forcing it on other people. And I've had people call me up, and they're very nasty about my baby bull idea. And they say, Well, why are you doing that? Because there's people who eat still eat. And you're not going to talk to me that way. And tell me that you have everybody in the world has to be the way you are. So we had a nice little argument about that. But I'm not going to do things in a way that would stop other people from living the life that they want to live. Now, yes, there's a place for the heart with animals. And I understand that, and I would never preach against that. But I would say that there's others who would preach against that, or others who would say, I would like to buy meat. And so do we stop that production, and buy, you know, somewhere in there that everybody gets to be who they want to be. If I talk to the higher ups, they have no problems with it's eating meat at the present time. There'll be a time when we need to change because eating meat might stop us from raising it to a higher dimension. But it will be a natural way. It'll be as a result of us not. I don't want to do that anymore. Rather than somebody coming in saying we're not going to have meat anymore. No, I have free agency. It was given to me by God. And if you try and take away my free agency, you're trespassing on my life. Which is worse, trespass hate on somebody else's life and tell you that they can't have me. There's all kinds of situations that need to be addressed and addressed with love and kindness. God will have his way with us.

Okay, so the next two examples are on cover employment contracts for local businesses and for fraternal organizations, churches and governments, things like that. So with regard to local businesses, who would be the contact for small business discussions would that be your directors or assistant directors, what's the best approach to promote to these business owners, decision makers and techniques to meet with businesses. So for example, having like a chamber of commerce meeting, some type of business gathering or social events to offer the information regarding resources available to those people, comments,

the local businesses are, are the mainstay of community, they offer the services, fix your cars, pull on your tires, do your cleaning, those kinds of things. Those are service oriented business, including restaurants and stuff like that. And so they're the ones that are the prime target. Yeah, how do you approach them? Well, the best thing, in my opinion, and we'll get a video that can be played and an organization, Chamber of Commerce or whatever, or a gathering of business owners who have an interest in wanting to become contracted their business with us. And once it gets out, there are going to be a lot of people. So we have maybe meetings at our CAC centers. That's why I say, you know, you might have one CAC center in a larger city, half a million people or whatever. And that's big enough to have a number of people come by, you might do it every other day. To Steve one season is to cease Thursdays and Saturday night, sort of thing, and you play this thing. And then it then you have a lot of well trained people, the director can be ensured that they may be assistant directors or whatever, who can be there and work out the details for a contract for somebody. When this is the number of employees and fill up, fill out the form. This is a, this is the name of my employees, this is what I think is my my best employee. And this is the one I'd like to pay the most to and, and so they sit down and we chat them a little chat about these things. And, and so it couldn't be by reservation to come in and spend time could have met them during the day, a lot of businesses are not open or open during the day. So they maybe take some leave the assistant manager take care of things. And you introduce this. And there's no high sell here, the benefits will outweigh any resistance. Unless they come up with stuff that is more personal, I don't know how to do, we won't know how to do that until it happens. So the building the resource of video, and maybe Alan will one of our people are doing videos now for us wonderful videos, but just I'm amazed at his ability to well, let's have him do one for the small businesses and how we're going to deal with him. So the people can come in to have their watch the video, and then they have private time with individuals that they can talk to. And you might have maybe 10 or 15 at a time in one of those meetings. But you're gonna have to have the people to sign contracts and that sort of thing with them. That's the way they're like kind of see happening as far as expanding the results of the community. CAC Sanders, what is the best approach to promote this to business owners and decision makers? I think that most people are interested in the bottom line, if their bottom line is not functioning properly, they're going to be concerned about how they're going to keep their business going. With all the shortages, now restaurants are raising their prices so that they can keep in business. Well, when we come along we can we can start offering to pay

for their food as they order it. So they don't have to raise their prices. That's something that can be in on an individual bases and individual business bases. There might be other businesses that have problems with getting equipment or whatever, to their location. And because there's takes, it's expensive, well, we can come in and help them out. We're going to be contracting with with trackers and be sure that they have everything they need. And we have to support that we'd have to have contracts with those who, who give the stuff that support that. And there's contracts that go up and down each chain of opportunities or work. Those that do the work doesn't support the work and those who have to get stuff to the work to support the work, and so on and so forth. All of those people can be made, can have contracts, is there a person who's working that cannot have a contract, unless they're a bad person, I wouldn't do that. But I believe in my mind that every person on the earth should have a contract of some sort, and should also be a beneficiary and have a beneficiary crown account with six trusts, if they're over 18. And then when they get over 18, they know that they can have a beneficiary trust, and they can start making 28% or \$28,000, out of high school. Majan if we had that kind of money when we were in high school, imagine how we could find another for us guys find another love in our life in high school, and have enough money to start a home. Is that inconceivable? I think it's a really good thing. There's all kinds of ways that we can use our Community Assistance Centers to help people and getting involved in education and types of businesses that that would work well with they have apprentices let's let's get involved with that make it exciting for somebody who has, who loves to have to work with a wrench and wants to build things, or repair things. That's their life, that might be their life experience loans, come up with some kind of a program where they can learn on the job training and from really good people. And that will Academy an apprenticeship. And they can be there and not have to borrow money to go and get them so and if for some reason they say, No, I've enjoyed this for a while I don't like to go home with my hands dirty like this every day, well, then maybe something else is different. So let's be sure that the people are the ones who get the nod. And they can get trained in what they want to do. And was some guys would rather be dancers, the ballroom dancer or whatever ballet. It's not just the women, a lot of guys are in there as well. So if you want to do stuff like that, then what about those in theater, and musical theater, have a great voice, they love to act and they love to do this, all of that is going to be reinvented in a way that will be beneficial for society, because we'll have the money to do the recreation that we want to do. And we'll have the time because we don't have to work two or three days a week, or through two or three hours a day, two or three jobs to get by. So things are going to change. Techniques for meeting with businesses, Chamber of Commerce, business gatherings and social events. You know, you have to be there to kind of get in the flow of it. And kind of feel for yourself how best to serve. And so I haven't done that. So I really don't have a real good way of, of showing somebody else how to do it. But there's people who will just gather to that it will just that's their life. They love that. Let them be the ones that go out and do that kind of work for you. So, most, mostly your job as far as in benefactor is finding the right people to do the right work. And I have been told that the right people will come for those who believe that in what they're doing and then it will make a difference. And so with that knowledge and understanding the right people, like attracts like law of attraction. They will come out of the woodwork to seek you out and find you. Those are the people now that the spirit is already preparing to meet you. Dr add on for size because it is happening now. Okay, let's go into some questions.

Okay, that's let's talk about this. There are different types of people who are going into churches, some have a calling, and are getting paid to go out and do that. And some are just wanting to create more bonus for them themselves. Ones who were creating bonuses for themselves, they don't have the authority to create grants and things like this or signing bonuses for churches or countries or fraternal organizations. They don't have the money for that they're not, they're not available to be doing that, or they're available to if you find somebody like that zim benefactor, or they can be assistant directors and you put them on a contract, they can go out and do them. And then that will be helpful. But that is something that's new for a new idea for me, and I wouldn't embrace that, as a benefactor. hire some people to do those kinds of things, get them out there train a little bit. So they don't mess things up is going wrong. Okay, meet leaders, we can offer signing bonuses. Yes, we can do that. If we have the authority to do that. Incorporate the RSS into their organizations. That's what it's for. I mean, did they organize their organizations so that they can be a part of love won society are just a lump on society designed to be created so that these people will have money? It's, it's an interesting thought. But I, I'm just simple enough to think that God created these things as best way for us to get our money out. What a what a great idea. That Oh, God on our team. Grants first, for each scholarships, certifications, projects, infrastructure. I think that's more in in where the director would have responsibilities. And yet, there's there's things that retired people to be great assistant directors, because they have a lot of expertise in certain areas, and can do scholarships and certifications and things like that. Projects for infrastructure, and infrastructure. Yeah. I'm just going to say this out loud. If I were, if I wanted to really get some good people involved, I would go to a church, or an organization or spiritual organization, where people are and do our revenue sharing solutions. And as I'm there, and people are signing up and so forth, there are retired people in those organizations, who have a wealth of knowledge that is going wasted, because there's no place for them to go or opportunities for them to serve, where they could use those years and years of experience and understanding and how to do things. And I think those are the right kinds of people to make his assistant directors or whatever and, and see what they would like to do as far as working in the communities. They may have an interest in teaching in a school. They might have some expertise on how to run equipment, building equipment, or backhaul around grade lolloping people with that kind of knowledge and understanding in these churches that have retired because they don't want to work so hard anymore. But teaching somebody else how to do

things is a wonderful thing for them. And it keeps him alive, it keeps him productive, gives him a reason for waking up in the morning and going to do something for somebody else. You're saving people's lives by doing things like that. We've discussed about the government assistance programs. I see the government assistance programs kind of flowing into reviving, not reviving, but rather assisting the the demise of the government. By signing contracts, employment contracts for firefighters, or police officers. Those are the kinds of things that I see really have great value for what we're calling the gap, the government assistance programs that they don't have enough money to run these kinds of organizations, with the things that we can do. There's been really good people here in this area that have been shot and killed, because they didn't have bulletproof windows in their squad cars. And I think that that's an essential thing that can happen to every locality, is to reek refit, their, their cars with bulletproof glass grants. And maybe the grants can come in the form of what kind of cars that people have, you know, somebody is going to buy those cars, it could be the the police chief or whatever, in coordination with Mayor or wherever. And they're going to buy cars. Well, I've heard it said that some of these people don't have experience enough to be able to know what is a good car to have to put people in the backseat that are you have arrested and and if you can't do that effectively and easily, then what good is the car paid yet, that's what some people are buying. So there's got to be a certain amount of rather than the bottom line, the cheapest car, the cheapest this that the other that oftentimes a government will make a decision on a person in government will make a decision on because they've only got a certain amount of budget. So that's where we can help with the government assistance in programs, I think, trust account for each fire station that's controlled or assisted, make the trustee the captain of the service station. And then they can use it for food and for their equipments. They bring some equipment or some equipment flies off the truck as they're going by. And there's a nice, there's a nice firefighting coat that they didn't, that they just lost. So there's replacing those things and fixing things that they that break. That's just a small thing that that can happen. So I think that those are very important things to have as well. Okay. Any questions?

Well, I just wanted to ask because we're on the topic of farm, and farm lands, because in a lot of parts of the world, the farm lands have been stolen by the mafia, and that's the case in most of Europe and Eastern Europe, where I live, and how do you see that we return back the land to the people, the caring people, the loving people, the people who take good care from it? How do we do you see that we take back this farming plant and these farms and return it to the rightful owners?

That's part of that are just sorry. When I say that the bad people that do those kinds of things be the mafia or the bad, whatever, they're going to be eliminated. And so there is going to be a void that needs to be fulfilled because these guys thought they owned all that and stole it or whatever they did, they're going to go to jail or they're going to go someplace besides being

with us anymore. And so it's at that point when we can come in, as in benefactors and have the money to, let's say a farm was stolen from somebody. And they've been having a hard time, but their hearts are farmers, they have a farming heart that they want to get back on the land. Let's find those people and put them back on the land. Let's find those people and pay for them, and buy their land for them. And put them back on the land where they can fulfill the full measure of their creation. As one who was a farmer, and they got stolen from them. Let's not just repair, let's not just get rid of these guys that are bad. Let's, let's get things repaired and put our farmers back to work, especially our farmers who have who are a family. These are the people that that are the ones that we need to help. And if they don't want, if they're too old to farm or some other circumstances, then let's compensate them be sure that they get the RSF program, let's be sure that they get. And they might have some service oriented businesses that they could do. Let's find them, let's help people get in business. We're not wasting money, we're helping people. And that money is just around waiting for it to be used. So let's go ahead and use it for the people that we're going to help to become new business owners. These these large corporations that have taken over everything, the mom paw organizations, there are mom and pop stores and stuff like that are going to be come alive again. We're not going to have big corporations, we're going to have communities that are successfully run by people in the community. And all of this other garbage that was part of the cabal is way of having an economy. Let's just kick that down the road and say we're finished with you. We don't want that kind of stuff here. And the way we do that is by finding the people who want to do the work and we invest in them. Do we need money? Let's say they need \$100,000? Well, you tell him you, I've got \$100,000 here for you. But in your mind, there's another 100,000 in an account just waiting for you if you need it. That's the way that I would work. That's the way that I will work to try and find those people. But Zim benefactors are not going to be really the ones to do that, because they're busy with many things. But the directors in the CAC is your prime target for those kinds of activities. So we're going to teach the directors how to do that. Aye. Aye. Los Angeles, California because I'd love to do some things there. But I did notice they are owned Los Angeles, the city is owned by another state, not even California. So I thought I should point that out. Hopefully it comes back to California. And then I can do things there. But right now it's run fraudulently.
