"My cousin Terri Henderson and I grew up in the village of St George. She lived in the first house east of church and I lived in the first house west of the church. As cousins/life-long best friends in this small community we have many shared memories. One of our best memories is of Christmas Eve. On Christmas, both of our families went to midnight mass (yes, mass was at midnight). To be sure we wouldn't fall asleep in church, we were both required to "rest" for at least an hour in the late afternoon or early evening. Resting on the afternoon of Christmas Eve was always a challenge for us, but we tried because we were expecting Santa to arrive that night and didn't want to ruin our status on the "nice list". Around 11:30 pm we all walked over to church. My dad would ring the bell 15 minutes before mass and again at the start of mass. The rope for the bell was in front of the middle doors and people entered by the two side doors. Once we got to church and said our prayers, we were allowed to go up to the front of the church to see the creche and the Christ child. This was a special time, because if you hadn't made your first communion, our parents wouldn't usually allow us to go up by the steps to the communion rail. Things were much more formal back in the day. No talking in church while we waited for mass to start & mass was in Latin. The expectation for children, was that we sit quietly. During midnight mass we sat as quietly as we could knowing that when we got home, Santa would have made his stop in St George. Santa was always able to complete his stop at our house before our families made our short walk home from church. While we have our own thoughts about who was Santa's elf on Christmas Eve, to this day, no one has ever confessed to being Santa's helper."
