The City Council met in a Regular Meeting on February 6, 2024, at the City Hall Council Chamber located at 501 S. Main St., Seadrift, TX 77983.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor DeForest called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

1. INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Becky Gray gave the invocation and Mayor DeForest led the pledges to the US and Texas flags.

2. CONSENT AGENDA

a. Previous Month's Meeting Minutes

MOTION: Alderperson Reese made the motion to approve the previous month's meeting minutes as presented. Alderperson Brigham seconded the motion. **VOTE:** Motion carried unanimously 4-0.

b. Accounts Payable

MOTION: Alderperson Johnson made the motion to approve paying bills. Alderperson Gaines seconded the motion.

VOTE: Motion carried unanimously 4-0

3. DEPARTMENT HEAD REPORTS

a. POLICE

Chief Carisalez read the Police Report for January 2024 with 87 calls for service, 88 traffic stops, 16 citations, 66 warnings, 3 reports written, and 0 arrests. News from the Chief was that they have been receiving an increased number of calls regarding animals at large or aggressive dogs. The Seadrift Police Department will begin to enforce the dog ordinance to protect citizens. Chief Carisalez encouraged residents to call the Seadrift Police Department or the Animal Control Officer Robert Bryant on any complaints or questions.

b. MUNICIPAL COURT

Marilyn Dufner, Municipal Court Clerk, read the Municipal Court report for January 2024 with 19 new cases, 17 closed cases, 114 current cases, and \$2,639 total fines collected for the month.

c. PUBLIC SAFETY

Alderperson Brigham did not have a report for Public Safety for January 2024.

d. PERMITS

Mayor DeForest read the Permit Report for January 2024 with a gross property valuation increase of \$12,500.

e. CODE ENFORCEMENT

Mayor DeForest read the Code Enforcement Report for January 2024 with 1 letter sent out for the month.

f. HARBOR

Alderperson Hunt was not present.

g. PARKS AND RECREATION

Alderperson Johnson did not have a report for Parks and Recreation for January 2024.

h. STREETS AND DRAINAGE

Alderperson Brigham did not have a report for Streets and Drainage for January 2024.

i. UTILITIES

Alderperson Reese read the Utility Report for January 2024 with 0 water taps and 0 sewer taps installed inside the City, and no water taps in Swan Point Landing installed for the month.

j. SOLID WASTE

Alderperson Gaines did not have a report for Solid Waste for January 2024.

4. CITIZEN COMMENTS

- Bruce Lingle commented that he had issues with the tickets reported in the monthly report by Chief Carisalez. He stated that he hears a lot of stories when he returns home. Someone's golf cart flag was 6 feet instead of 8 feet, someone's license plate was too dim to read, he personally was ticketed due to the plastic cover on his license plate on his 18-wheeler, and that a dog was disposed of without contacting Animal Control. Chief Carisalez specified that Animal Control did dispose of the dog, but Bruce Lingle stated that the Officer shot the dog. Mayor DeForest asserted that there would be no arguments and asked that Bruce Lingle continue his comments. Bruce Lingle continued by asking why discussion around defunding the Police Department began. There are 995 people in Seadrift, 700 over 70 years old, but you better not have a wheel moving at the stop sign, have your seatbelt on, and have your turn signal on. Bruce Lingle stated that he would like to view all the 87 tickets issued as reported. Bruce Lingle asked if that was not considered harassment. He continued that there was someone at Dick's Food Store's parking lot that had the officer tap on the window regarding no seatbelt. Some of the things, for a small town, make you afraid to even drive down the street. Bruce Lingle stated that some may agree with him, and some may not, but he hears a lot of stories when he comes home. Bruce Lingle asked that if any of the incidents are true, he would like a follow-up from the Mayor at the next meeting. Mayor DeForest stated that more information will be available in the next report.
- Paul Gonsalez stated that he liked the fact that the police are patrolling the area. He stated that his
 reason for retiring to Seadrift was the Police Department. If anyone has concerns, there are open
 records. If someone wants to look at the video, it can be requested with an open records request.
 He finished his comment by stating that things are getting done, and the bad people are getting
 arrested.
- Bucky Park asked about the drainage at 1510-1512 W. Bayview. He stated that the gentleman at the caddy-corner on the bayside had closed off the natural drain. Before when he would clear his property, it would drain but now backs into his property. Bucky Park stated that the gentleman cut a new ditch on the east side of their property. Bucky Park was wondering where the City was with

this. Mayor DeForest answered that the City, along with the County, are still working on it. The Mayor stated that is taking quite a bit of time to get resolved due to other issues.

• Steve Delacruz presented himself as a candidate for the office of Sherriff for Calhoun County.

At 7:25 PM, Mayor DeForest stated that the City Council would be going into an Executive Session

Meeting closed for the Executive Session at 7:25 PM.

5a. SEAWALL RESTORATION PROJECT PW 4450

5ai. Pay Application #7

MOTION: Alderperson Reese made the motion to approve payment of SR Trident Pay Application #7 for \$687,261.55. Alderperson Brigham seconded the motion. **VOTE:** Motion carried unanimously 4-0.

5aii. Change Order #2

Scott Mason with G&W Engineering was in attendance to discuss Change Order #2. Scott stated that additional cap will need to be removed than originally anticipated. He stated that it would be approximately 633 feet of cap that will need to be removed. Scott continued that they determined that they did not need to demo the number of existing panels as originally intended in Changer Order 1. That amount will be deducted from the approved quantity and amount with Changer Order 2. This Change Order would also add an additional 120 days to the contract.

MOTION: Alderperson Johnson made the motion to approve Change Order #2 for the Seawall Restoration Project. Alderperson Reese seconded the motion. **VOTE:** Motion carried unanimously 4-0.

Justification for Changer Order #2 from G&W Engineers, Inc., attached.

5aiii. Change Order #3

The Seadrift Council listened to an update from the engineer Scott Mason with G&W Engineers regarding a potential Change Order #3. The contractor had encountered issues with panel installation by the bridge. The contractor had 19 panels left to install, but there is so much rubble in the ground that some panels cannot go further down. This area has large concreate pieces. Scott stated that he has two options for the City.

- Option A: With the current U.S. Army Corps of Engineers permit, an earthen dam would be installed to allow crews to properly excavate a trench to remove the rubble under the ground. This option would cause a two-week delay and have a cost of \$72,443.
- Option B: Stop where the contractor is at, turn the wall, and head towards the road. They would install four panels, which would be 20 to 30 feet. This option would cause a two-week delay and would have a cost of \$78,102.

Mayor DeForest stated that the preferred option would be Option A since it would still follow the original scope and design with FEMA. Any changes to the design of the wall would require FEMA and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers approval, which could take months. Alderperson Brigham stated that he agreed with Option A. Scott Mason stated that he just needed an idea on how the City wanted to proceed but would present justification and the Change Order 3 at a later meeting. Mayor DeForest stated that the City will hold a Special Meeting the following week to act on Change Order #3.

MOTION: No action taken.

MOTION: Alderperson Brigham made the motion to approve payment of GrantWorks Inc Invoice #3 for \$7,000.00. Alderperson Gaines seconded the motion. **VOTE:** Motion carried unanimously 4-0.

MOTION: Alderperson Reese made the motion to approve payment of Lynn Engineering Pay Application E2527.007 for \$8,250.00. Alderperson Gaines seconded the motion. **VOTE:** Motion carried unanimously 4-0.

6. SEADRIFT CHAMBER OF COMMERCE – MARKET DAYS – CIVIC CENTER RENTAL

Lacey Vasquez, with the Seadrift Chamber of Commerce, was in attendance to discuss item #6. Lacey Vasquez stated that the Chamber would use the Civic Center as a contingency plan in the case of bad weather.

MOTION: Alderperson Gaines made the motion to authorize the Seadrift Chamber of Commerce to hold their monthly Market Days, on the last Saturday of the month, at the Seadrift Civic Center until no longer needed. Alderperson Johnson seconded the motion. **VOTE:** Motion carried unanimously 4-0.

7. SEADRIFT SERVICE CLUB:

7a. & 7b.

MOTION: Alderperson Johnson made the motion to authorize the creation of a Service Club, and authorize the rental of the Seadrift Civic Center, at no charge, for their monthly meetings. Alderperson Gaines seconded the motion. **VOTE:** Motion carried unanimously 4-0.

8. UPLOADING CITY ORDINANCES/FILES ONLINE

MOTION: Alderperson Brigham made the motion for the City to get a quote for uploading ordinances online. Alderperson Gaines seconded the motion. **VOTE:** Motion carried unanimously 4-0.

9. DOCKSIDE BOAT RAMP

Chris Ingram, Harbor Master, stated that the lease holders put a bag of cement on the spot that was bad, and was closed off until dried. Chris Ingram stated that the repair looked good. Alderperson Johnson asked if anyone else had gone to inspect it besides the Harbor Master. Chris Ingram stated that Alderperson Geoffrey Hunt also looked at the repair and was okay with it.

MOTION: No action taken.

10. SEADRIFT POLICE DEPARTMENT

a. UPDATE REGARDING K9 UNIT AND K9 ROSCOE

Chief Carisalez stated that K9 Roscoe is still being lodged at Lavaca River Ranch for free. Chief Carisalez stated that she had reached out to agencies, but they currently do not have the purchase of a new K9 in their budget. Chief Carisalez stated that a Senior Corporal, with Newman DPS out of Cedarville, TX, was in the process of getting approval on purchasing K9 Roscoe. The Senior Corporal had mentioned also that he had gotten approval to send the K9 over to them already to get it back in training. This training would be free. Chief Carisalez clarified that she didn't know if the Council would agree to send the K9 for training before it was sold. Alderperson Johnson asked if this was a sure thing, to which Chief Carisalez replied that either way it would be free training for K9 Roscoe. Mayor DeForest stated that in the authorization with Roscoe, the Chief was given the responsibility to determine issues around Roscoe and his disposition. He stated that the Chief should be trusted to handle that disposition appropriately.

Chief Carisalez gave an update regarding the 2017 Tahoe that was declared surplus in a previous meeting. Chief Carisalez detailed that the Tahoe is currently on standby since the Police Department needs three units. The Police Department has been awarded a grant for a new unit, but there are delays with vendors getting the unit outfitted.

Justification for Change Order No. 2 GLO Contract No 20-065-103-C278 FEMA Project No. DR-4332-PW-4450

Subject: Seawall & 2nd to 3rd Street Improvements Project

Dear City of Seadrift:

This letter is intended to serve as justification of the necessity of issuing a Change Order No.2 to the project. The extents of Demo Cap are more extensive and intrusive now that the project is progressing. This in return has warranted the need for additional existing concrete cap to be demolished in order for work to be completed. With this being said, as work has progressed, we do not need for as much existing concrete panels to be removed as originally anticipated. There is also a need to install additional cap at the boat ramp to retain the proposed material in the area and eliminate erosion concerns. Therefore, we offer the following as justifications of the necessity of Change Order No.2

- Additional cap is needed to be removed. This is more than originally planned in Change Order Number 1. This is necessary as the cap needs to be remove to properly form up for the cap and to allow for the install of the filter cloth to seal the panel joints as planned. Since change order 1 was approved, crews have begun installing filter cloth and looking at the project moving forward it will be necessary to remove (demo) additional existing cap.
- 2) We will not need to demo the number of existing panels as originally intended in Change Order Number 1. Therefore, we are deducting from the approved quantity and amount with this Change Order Number 2.
- 3) The design of the project was for the panels to be of the required length and installed into the earth at specified depth. There have been several panels which after continuous driving and jetting have reached a termination depth and left fractions of the panels sticking up. In engineering terms, the pile reached refusal. These panels have to be cut at the grade necessary so as not to stick up above the cap elevation. We have looked at all the panels needing to be cut and have no concern with the stability or structural integrity if they are cut. This is necessary in order to continue moving forward with the project.
- 4) There is a need for installation of 80 linear feet of proposed concrete cap at the boat ramp. This will retain the road material installed and will act as a retaining wall for the boat ramp area. We recommend we implement this change so that road base material does not erode into the ramp.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF SEADRIFT, TEXAS FINDING THAT THE STATEMENT OF INTENT OF CENTERPOINT ENERGY RESOURCES CORP., D/B/A CENTERPOINT ENERGY ENTEX AND CENTERPOINT ENERGY TO CHANGE RATES FILING WITHIN THE CITY SHOULD BE DENIED; FINDING THAT THE CITY'S REASONABLE RATE CASE EXPENSES SHALL BE REIMBURSED BY THE COMPANY; FINDING THAT THE MEETING AT WHICH THIS RESOLUTION IS PASSED IS OPEN TO THE PUBLIC AS REQUIRED BY LAW; REQUIRING NOTICE OF THIS RESOLUTION TO THE COMPANY AND LEGAL COUNSEL.

WHEREAS, the City of Seadrift, Texas ("City") is a gas utility customer of CenterPoint Energy Resources Corp., d/b/a CenterPoint Energy Entex and CenterPoint Energy Texas Gas ("CenterPoint" or "Company") within the unincorporated areas of the Houston, Texas Coast, Beaumont/East Texas, and South Texas Divisions, and a regulatory authority with an interest in the rates and charges of CenterPoint; and

WHEREAS, the City is a member of Cities Served by CenterPoint Gas ("Cities") (such participating cities are referred to herein as "Cities"), a coalition of similarly situated cities served by CenterPoint that have joined together to efficiently and cost effectively review and respond to natural gas issues affecting rates charged in the Houston, Texas Coast, Beaumont/East Texas, and South Texas Divisions; and

WHEREAS, on or about October 30, 2023, CenterPoint filed with the City a Statement of Intent to Increase Rates seeking to increase natural gas rates by \$37.4 million annually and to all customers residing in the City; and

WHEREAS, Cities is coordinating its review of CenterPoint's Statement of Intent filing with designated attorneys and consultants to resolve issues in the Company's filing; and

WHEREAS, through review of the application, Cities' consultants determined that CenterPoint's proposed rates are excessive; and

WHEREAS, the Cities' members and attorneys recommend that Cities members deny the Statement of Intent; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEADRIFT, TEXAS:

Section 1. That the rates proposed by CenterPoint to be recovered through its gas rates charged to customers located within the City limits, are hereby found to be unreasonable and shall be denied.

Section 2. That the Company shall continue to charge its existing rates to customers within the City.

Section 3. That the City's reasonable rate case expenses shall be reimbursed in full by CenterPoint within 30 days of the adoption of this Resolution.

Section 4. That it is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Resolution is passed is open to the public as required by law and the public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required.

Subject: Seawall & 2nd to 3rd Street Improvements Project

Dear City of Seadrift:

This letter is intended to serve as justification of the necessity of issuing a Change Order No.3 to the project. The installation of the last 19 panels of the project towards the 2nd street bridge have ceased. The contractor removed the concrete rubble and debris within this area per the original contract. However, panels have stopped driving due to rubble being buried below ground at approximately 4' below the mud line. The panels will not overcome the pressures and push the rubble into the earth when being installed. This change order captures a solution to deal with this issue to continue progress and facilitate the installation of the remaining panels. Also, we are needing to adjust the quantity of core stones and armor stones required to complete the project. Therefore, we offer the following as justifications of the necessity of Change Order No.3:

- 1) As discussed above, G&W had to come up with a solution to the problem. We have determined that installing a temporary earthen dam where the rock is to be will allow for crews to properly excavate a trench to remove the rubble under the ground and dispose of it. The contractor will then fill the trench with appropriate backfill material. Then they will continue to install the remaining panels as planned and finally remove the temporary dam and use the material of the dam as general fill within the area. This underground interference was not known at the time of design and was not accounted for in the original bid documents. We have reviewed the proposed cost associated with it (including quantities, material cost, labor, and equipment cost) and in our professional opinion justify that the cost associated with the effort is appropriate and fair.
- 2) G&W used standard engineering practice to quantify the approximate amount of stone required for the project. We used a simplified approximate method based on average bay bottom depths. The contractor has notified us of the actuals required to complete the project and G&W has verified these quantities using computer modeling to determine if they are accurate. Therefore, we need to adjust the contract to the actual amount required. This change order captures this and the price is based upon the original bid. 661 cubic yards of additional core stone is required and 833 cubic yards of armor stone is required. This can be common to adjust approximate numbers to actuals once construction is underway and the contractor is performing the work. This justification applies to items 2 and 3 in the attached GLO change order form.
