EAST TRINITY LODGE HISTORY CORNER

This historical sketch is the 22nd article in a series of the history of the East Trinity Lodge. This month we are featuring the lodge's 19th Worshipful Master <u>E.W. Hardin</u>.

Eli Wilson Hardin

Biography

Worshipful Master for the East Trinity Lodge (1891)



E.W. Hardin

Eli Wilson Hardin was born on 3 January 1861 in Calhoun City, Mississippi. His father was William Glenn Hardin born about 12 November 1822 in Hall County, Georgia. His mother, Mary Elizabeth Henderson was born in Pickens County, Alabama on 7 February 1827.

We found a marriage record for E.W. Hardin and Miss Kittie Long, married on 19 January 1891 in Rockwall County, Texas. Her full maiden name was Mary Katherine Long but she was known as Kittie. She was born on 2 July 1868.

Eli is listed in East Trinity Lodge Records for the first time in 1890, and in that year, he served as the Junior Warden and he was elected to be Worshipful Master in 1891 with the following officer line-up:

In the 1900 census, Eli Hardin was living in Rockwall County with his wife Kittie and their two sons: Clifford (6) and Edward (3). Eli reported his occupation as "Banker".

E. W. Hardin demitted from the East Trinity Lodge in 1894 and moved to Oklahoma. His relocation to Oklahoma is interesting because he and G.A. Truitt demitted at the same time and both relocated to Ada, Pontotoc, Oklahoma.

The 1910 census shows Eli still living in Ada, Pontotoc County, Oklahoma. He and his wife Kittie now have three children living at home: two sons Clifford Wilson (16), Edward Glenn (13), and a daughter Harriet Louise (9). Eli reports his occupation as "Insurance Agent". The Hardin family home is also a boarding house with eight boarders.

In the 1920, Eli and his family have moved to Oklahoma City. He is now 58 years old and his occupation is "Secretary Commission" working for the State of Oklahoma. His wife Kittie is 51 years old and they still have their three children living at home. Clifford (26), Glenn (23) and Louise (18).

In 1930, Eli is still living in Oklahoma City. He is now 69 years old and his occupation is listed as "Oiler". His wife Kittie and two of their children are living at home. Son Edward Glenn (33), and daughter Harriet Louise (26). There is also daughter-in-law, Louise Hardin, living with them as well as four lodgers.

The 1940 census shows Eli and his wife Kittie living on Youngs Blvd, Oklahoma City. They are both retired and their two sons and one daughter have families of their own. Clifford and Edward Glenn have moved to Los Angeles, California and Harriet Louise is married and she has moved to Houston, Texas.

Sometime after 1940, Eli and Kittie moved from Oklahoma City to Houston, Texas to live with their daughter

and son-in-Law. Eli was over 80 years old and Kittie was in her late 70s.

Eli died on 23 February 1946 in Houston, Texas at the age of 85 and he is buried at Forrest Park Cemetery, Houston, Texas. He has a Square and Compasses on his tombstone.

Mary Katherine "Kittie" Hardin died on 20 December 1952 and she is also buried at Forrest Park Cemetery, Houston, Texas.

Driver's used to say that he doesn't actually deliver freight, he just drives around saving people. So many that at times I've doubted that all of them could be true or if Eric is a real person. Real or not, Eric is definitely a guardian angel.

This is my reason for writing you his letter at his time. My niece has been having a difficult problem with a stalker. The police have said he hasn't actually done anything illegal that they can trace back to him, so they can't do anything with him. This past week my niece's stalker tampered with the gas in her car causing it to break down along the interstate. He was following behind her and when she pulled off the road he passed her, pulled off the road not too far in front of her broke down car and started walking back to her. Praise God, Eric stopped to see if he could help. When Eric arrived my niece's stalker turned around and drove off without incident.

MASONIC INFLUENCES IN EARLY AMERICAN HISTORY

- Lafayette, French liaison to the Colonies, without whose aid the war could not have been won, was a Freemason.
- The majority of the commanders of the Continental Army were Freemasons and members of "Army Lodges."
- Most of Washington's Generals were Freemasons.
- The Boston Tea Party was planned at the Green Dragon Tavern, also known as the Freemasons' Arms, and "the Headquarters of the Revolution."
- George Washington was sworn in as the first President of the United States by Robert Livingston, Grand Master of New York's Masonic lodge. The Bible on which he took his oath was from his own Masonic lodge.
- The Cornerstone of the capitol building was laid by the Grand Lodge of Maryland.

Good men search for Freemasonry; Freemasonry makes them better.








