




Downtown Phoenix showing the layout of the automated streets and building plots

will be the route into the charging station and a gas station garage will be the exit back to Route 66.

Dave Irick has been busy with buildings. He has completed the Grand Canyon Station, the Congress Hotel in Tucson, and the freight depot in Flagstaff. Next up is the station in Tucson, the courthouse and station in Prescott, and a couple more buildings.

John Clark has completed his Clark Citrus building for Tempe. This is a well detailed plaster building. Don Stewart has almost finished the Stockyards in Phoenix. It needed some modifications to better fit the space and additional details: water troughs, feeder bins and cattle.

When building your buildings, remember to add lights per the standards developed by John Mick and Jesse Poole. An interior light and maybe an outside light would be nice for houses. Larger buildings will probably need more lights.



The storage boxes we built for rolling stock have been installed.

Scenery work on the area above Prescott and below Flagstaff has been ongoing with rock castings being added and painted, track painted, ballasted and scenery added.

It was later revealed that he was designing the south wall and its access doors (for lighting controls). He also laid out the extent of the Grand Canyon footprint. Always planning . . .

Ken Nelson measured the areas around Phoenix and into the corner of Tempe to cut the plywood for the outer lower walls. The oak plywood has been provided by *Spellman Hardwoods* of Phoenix.



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We enjoyed a work session at Jess's place on Saturday, April 10 to build the windows to fit into the plywood on the lower level. We also completed the component installation in the electrical box designed by John Mick.

#### Building the Grand Canyon Depot

What was involved in constructing the Grand Canyon Depot? What I thought would be an easy construction project turned into a herculean mission. I accumulated Google footprints and all the photos that I could find on the internet and had a couple of friends visit the depot and took photos for me. I gathered all of the building materials needed and was ready to go, I thought.

Next I made the mistake of asking Jesse Poole if it could be built in HO scale and to the exact footprint. That was a bad assumption, as Jesse said that he wanted an N scale building. It took some convincing that N scale would look funny next to a HO scale loco.

I thought that I had won that discussion when Jesse allowed me to build 70% height of HO scale. But my elation was short lived. Jesse informed me that the width could not exceed 4 1/2 inches, but he assured me that the length would be ok. So back to the drawing board I went.

The final building size would be depth 55% of HO, height 70% HO and length 82% of HO.

With my faithful scale ruler, I pressed on. First, I built the building shell out of .40mm styrene, cutting out for all windows and doors which are made to HO scale.

I covered the sheet styrene with 2.5mm rod styrene to simulate logs, braced the inside with scrap styrene from my scrap box. The doors are simply cut from styrene car siding sheets, window are mostly scratch constructed.

The last major consideration was the correct roofing material and the color of the structure. After looking at numerous photos I came to the conclusion that in the 1950's the roof was an asphalt diamond shingle and the building was a dark brown or redwood paint.

Well that is my story. I hope that we can install it on the layout soon. Please Jesse don't move any track!
