

A REVOLUTIONARY MONUMENT.

Memorial of Kings Mountain Unveiled
on the Battlefield of Guilford
Court House.

GREENSBOROUGH, N. C., July 4.—Ten thousand people, gathered from surrounding counties, met to-day on the Revolutionary battlefield of Guilford Court House to celebrate North Carolina's part in this and related battles. It is an annual State affair. The field is the only one of the Revolution owned entirely by an association of private citizens who have restored it, marked all of its lines, and erected many impressive monuments.

To-day one to the battle of Kings Mountain was unveiled. The orator was Col. W. A. Henderson, assistant general counsel of the Southern Railway. His address was an exhaustive historical paper, and the general verdict was that it would become one of the most valuable papers in the annals of the State.

The other speakers were Major Robert W. Hunter, Adjutant General of the Stonewall Brigade; Commissioner of Pensions Ware, Gen. W. H. Payne, Colonel of the Black Horse Cavalry at Bull Run; Gen. H. V. Boynton of Washington, and Judge Stephen A. Douglas, Jr., former Private

Secretary to Gen. Grant. There was an immense and most enthusiastic audience.

The only flags were the National colors, and the only number rendered by the band was "The Star-Spangled Banner."

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
