
## Food Shelf Needs for Christmas Baskets

In President John's absence, Past President Mark gaveled the meeting to order. Pat George led the pledge and Becky Wilson offered the invocation.

President Mark announced that the shelter boxes we've been building for The House of Mercy are complete and about to be delivered. A huge thank you and round of applause went to all those who worked on the project, but most especially to the long hours and ingenuity of Tom Van Buskirk and Ed Johnston.

Heinrich Fischer announced that the final net income on our Pasta Dinner was just a tad under \$5,000.

Cindy Hunt introduced Vicki Profitt, president of the Perinton Historical Society and Director of the Fairport Museum.

Vicki told us that the Historical Society began in 1935 when ten women, including first Perinton Town Historian Charlotte Clapp, decided something should be done to save local history. They recruited other volunteers and began collecting information on the town. The first physical location for the Museum and the Society didn't come until 1961 when a room was made available in the Crosman Community Center in the Village.

In 1978, the Fairport Public Library, which had been in a building at 18 Perrin Street since 1938, moved to its current location in the Village Landing. A year later, the Perinton Historical Society moved into the Perrin Street spot and, in 2019, the site was named a National Landmark.



In her presentation, Vicki showed us the impressive Carl Peters mural that is a centerpiece of the interior and told us how the Greenbrier Garden Club has maintained the backyard gardens for some 40 years.

People visit the museum to research family history, their homes, and often to look at the array of Fairport High School yearbooks dating back to 1926.

The museum is used for school visits -- some 500 fourth graders attend every spring -- as well as scout programs, a meeting place, community events. The Society also runs an annual homes tour and cemetery tours, although the latter is no longer an on-site event.

Other than Vicki, the Society and Museum is run entirely by volunteers. Funding comes from the dues of the 440 members, plus gift shop sales, donations, grants, estate benefits, etc. The annual Yuletide Traditions Silent Auction of baskets is underway now.
