Grew up in a family of 4, did the normal things we all do play, go to school, began the journey of learning how to fit in and work within our capacities. My Father passed when I was 15. Became heavily involved with Ice hockey and other sports endeavors, fortunate enough to attend Michigan State University to further that desire and attain a BA degree in Landscape Architecture and a minor in Ornamental

Horticulture which led to my life's work. First employment was for a Boston based LA firm with a Canadian office in Toronto. I spent the next 2 years working in both Toronto and Montreal on Expo '67 World Exposition developing /constructing a new island in the St. Lawrence River, La Ronde, which today is an active amusement area in that City. Worked on various projects across Canada. Aspired to attend to LA Grad school at Harvard U. From Toronto to Rochester where I was married, had 3 daughters, pursued my NSY license to practice Landscape Architecture. Made the decision to forego the Graduate degree and began a design/build landscape/ maintenance business with the help of R. Clinton Emery.

After a short stint in Syracuse in a Landscape Architectural firm, returned to Rochester area. As children grew, business and life proceeded changes occurred. President John introduced Cheryl Wygal, owner/grower at Cobblestone Hop Yard in Ontario, NY. She began the business of Hops after her kids were older. She earned a horticulture degree from Finger Lakes Community College in 1992. In 2013 she started exploring business opportunities to fill the void of children heading off to college and with a very supportive husband, Charlie, she decided to do something she enjoys using her horticulture background. After much research, she decided to grow hops for the NY Craft Beer Industry. She bought her grandfather's farm with its sentimental value and rich growing



conditions; this was the place where she envisioned beginning her new farm.

Cheryl informed us the process, you plant the hops once and they keep coming back, no pollination in the hop yard. The vines require spring training, the greenery climbs the string, so May is a very busy month. In June the yard is sprayed to keep the weeds down. Our climate, similar to Germany's is conducive to growing hops. A lot of nitrogen is needed for the plants so that is added. Harvest begins the end of July into August with a crew of Cheryl and 3 others. A sorting machine is used, the hops are dried with no heat, just air flow, then sent to processing.



A few sample bowls were passed around and Pete took a taste, very surprised with the bitterness! Some varieties of hops going for IPA's require 3-4 lbs per barrel others use ³/₄ lb for 11 barrels. Workers use safety equipment, safety glasses and respirators. Of the 10 acres of trellis, she has 7 ¹/₂ planted. Cheryl has developed a personal relationship

with her brewers. She welcomes visitors and is planning a "Hop Fest" for July 30. Instagram @cobblestone hops Facebook Cobblestone hops
