Precautions Are Prayers In Action

Dear Parish Family,

We are in the midst of and experiencing the most extraordinary health crisis of the century. The coronavirus, which seemed to come out of nowhere, has now sped across the globe to almost every country. Daily we hear of increased hundreds of thousands being infected and thousands dying. With each mandate of increasingly stringent precautionary steps, there are empty mercantile streets, restaurants and pubs being closed and most recently, a "Stay Home and Stay Safe" order from Governor Scott.

There is a pervasive feeling of dread as we are increasingly isolated and common interactions with neighbors, friends, and even family members, are stunted and stilled by social distancing and sheltering-in-place. Hospitals are on the brink of being overwhelmed by the increasing number of seriously sick patients. Field hospitals are being erected to attempt to manage the overflow, while essential medical supplies are running out and warehouses are near to empty.

Of course, you know all of this! But the remarkable thing is that had someone described a scenario like this, even a few months ago, we would have thought it to be nothing more than a script for a Robin Cook horror movie. But it is real and it is here and therefore more than a bit difficult to really get one's head around. My observation is that this week the reality is truly, finally, sinking in.

When we start to know people who have tested positively with COVID-19, people not in China or Italy, but down the street, members of our church, and even several who died at a facility in downtown Burlington, then this is real. Really real!!

So I must ask myself, much as I suspect you are asking yourselves, "What can we say to these things? If God be for us who can be against us?" The knee-jerk fundamentalist reaction would be that this pandemic is punishment for sins, and if not exactly for ours, certainly for those whom they vilify, depending on race, orientation, immigrant status, or that "we just don't like them".

So if the wrath of God is not responsible for this pandemic, what sense do we make of what is going on? In the midst of this crisis of gargantuan proportions, what makes theological and spiritual sense? I suggest that we look for the ways in which the Holy Spirit and the love and power of God are being manifested within us and right beside us, every moment, every day. Governor Scott, (whom I would not previously thought of as a theologian), today emphasized the profound meaning of fully participating in ALL of the precautionary behaviors which have a chance of stemming the spread of the virus. And in so doing, **SAVING THE LIVES OF OTHERS.**

The sacrificial restraint that each of us shows by every sanitizing, hand-washing, isolating, sheltering, distance-keeping, blood donating, mask-wearing, home-staying behavior, is an act of love. Of course there is some self-serving benefit if by doing so we remain virus free, but it is surprising to me that some cannot see that the "common good" begins with protecting the God-given gift of our own lives. If the greatest prayers are not petitions for what I want, but thanksgivings for what I have, then all our efforts to protect our health and that of my "six feet distant" neighbor is showing genuine gratitude to God. **Each of our precautions is a prayer in action.**

The following is part of Presiding Bishop Michael Curry’s message to the Episcopal Church on March 23rd, that some may have already seen.

“The other thing that I came across was a poem. It was in an email from Thistle Farms, a ministry that many of us know, led by Becca Stevens. It was a poem called *Pandemic**. It's by a poet named Lynn Ungar, who's also an ordained minister, and in the poem she says:

*What if you thought of it
as the Jews consider the Sabbath—
the most sacred of times?
Cease from travel.
Cease from buying and selling.
Give up, just for now,
on trying to make the world
different than it is.
Sing. Pray. Touch only those
to whom you commit your life.
Center down.*

*And when your body has become still,
reach out with your heart.
Know that we are connected
in ways that are terrifying and beautiful.
(You could hardly deny it now.)
Know that our lives
are in one another’s hands.
(Surely, that has become clear.)
Do not reach out your hands.
Reach out your heart.
Reach out your words.
Reach out all the tendrils
of compassion that move, invisibly,
where we cannot touch.*

*Promise this world your love—
for better or for worse,
in sickness and in health,
so long as we all shall live.*

South Burlington Food Shelf Covid-19 Update

Current status

Following the Governor's update to his Executive Order "stay home", we wanted to provide another update to you as well.

The Food Shelf is considered an essential service under the updated order as an entity that "provides necessities and services to economically disadvantaged populations". As such, we can continue to operate but like all organizations we are being very deliberate in our actions.

We are also sensitive to the volunteer nature of the operation, so we reached out via email to the advisory board and hosted a conference call with the Faith Influenced Leaders and Peter. We wanted to discuss items such as: the growing need for the food shelf due to layoffs and other displacements, the risk of being a vector for spreading the virus, and the health and safety of those that use the food shelf's services and those that volunteer in person, among other items.

With the new process that Peter has put in place we've minimized as many person to person contacts as possible and will continue to serve our community. At the same time, we want to be very clear that any in-person volunteer who is not comfortable being present at the food shelf should feel free to stay home. Your health and safety is of the utmost importance. If you make this choice, please know you'll be welcomed back with much love when we are past this pandemic crisis.
