## For All the Saints

Dear Parish Family,

The phrase "on the tiptoe of expectation" is usually associated with the season of Advent at the end of November, when we begin to look eagerly with joyful anticipation for the birth of Baby Jesus. But 2020 is an election year, so as this November begins, we are indeed anxiously poised, but mostly with fearful worry about the possible outcomes and aftermaths of this looming election. To further add to the atmosphere of uncertainty, at the same time, the spread of Covid is escalating dramatically throughout much of our nation and again in Europe.

In times of crisis we often find comfort in the gathered and near presence of one another. We seek out the comfort and companionship of friends, families, neighbors, and sometimes of even complete strangers. An irony of the pandemic is that such proximity is precisely what fuels the current rise in infections and deaths.

One of the saving graces of burgeoning technology is that many of us have been able to gather electronically and antiseptically via the internet. After a time, however, the virtue of "virtual" loses some of its appeal as "digital fatigue" sets in. Yet, this connection has been a great blessing and never more needed than now in this anxious time of microscopic disease and societal dysfunction.

As I thought about the importance of connection with one another and the ways in which Zoom contact with each other, even if imperfect, has been soothing, I looked at the Church Calendar and there was another significant November date staring at me! Yes, fellow saints (in training), November 1<sup>st</sup>, All Saints Day! It's amazing how anxious thoughts can crowd out more important things, like our parish's "name day"!

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But then, another level of connection occurred to me. As Christians we believe that at all times and in all places we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses. This coming Sunday we will pray for all the saints, known to us and held in blessed memory, and others unknown. As you think about some treasured person, now a saint, who has shared your life's journey and maybe sometimes even sat next to you at All Saints over the years, draw near to them in your heart and mind and find comfort in their love and prayers for you and yours. At this time of Pandemic distancing, draw near in prayer to those who from their labors rest. As you think of them, pray with them for God's peace and for healing for a sick and broken world. Draw near and be comforted as we face into an uncertain future, but remember that we do not face it alone.

### All Saints' Day

All Saints' Day, also known as [All Hallows' Day](#), *Hallowmas* (saints have historically been known as *hallows*) and *Feast of All Saints*, is a Christian celebration to honor all known (and unknown) saints and martyrs. It always falls on **November 1**. It is preceded by [Halloween](#), its vigil, on October 31 and followed by [All Souls' Day](#) on November Together these three days of remembering the dead form the triduum (a religious observance lasting three days) of *Hallowtide*.

### What Is A Zoom Service, Anyway?

#### And What If I Can't Get Onto A Zoom Service Because I Don't Have A Computer??

Some folks in our parish may not know what we are talking about when we mention Zoom services. A Zoom service allows those of us with computers, tablets or smart phones to hear each other and see each other's faces as we worship together through the readings, sermon and prayers of the day. It's not as good as being in our beloved building, but it's still pretty special to be together in this way.

**But here is good news!** Even if you have no computer, or prefer not to connect by computer, you can still join us on Sunday mornings. Zoom technology allows you to join our Sunday worship by phone! Here are detailed instructions for doing so:

**A few minutes before 10:00 AM, dial 1 6465588656 (unfortunately, it is not toll-free);**

**When asked for the Meeting ID enter the 11-digit number 879 1513 1295, and the # sign;**

**When asked for your Unique Participant ID press # to skip;**

**When asked for the Passcode enter the 9-digit number 696650929 and the # sign.**

You can hear everyone, and we can hear you. It should be easy to join us. While we won't see you, **we will still be so excited to hear your voice!**

During the Zoom service or the Virtual Coffee Hour that follows it, you can participate:

**Press \*6 to Mute or Unmute your phone;**

**Press \*9 to “Raise your hand” so that our host John Bertelsen will see that you would like to speak.**

I was recently asked to write a brief testimonial about what All Saints means to me. When I began reflecting upon this question, the word *home* kept coming to mind. As a result, I thought about what the meaning of *home* really is, and it became abundantly clear to me why I associate that word with All Saints. Allow me to elaborate.

Home is a physical space that evokes feelings of warmth, peacefulness and comfort whenever we enter. That is All Saints!

Home is a place of sanctuary, where we feel safe and secure, and where healing of the emotional wounds that can sometimes be inflicted on us by the outside world can occur. That is All Saints!

Home is a place where quiet spiritual reflection can take place, allowing us to open our hearts and minds to the soft voice of the Holy Spirit, and to receive the message of love which God wants all of us to hear. That is All Saints!

And most importantly, in my opinion, home is where people who are very special to us reside – those who always offer us love, support and nurturing, and accept us for who we are. That, most definitely, is All Saints! This fact began to come into focus for me the very first time I visited our wonderful little church 22 years ago. I, of course, was invited to take part in the coffee hour after the service, and in so doing encountered a welcome like I have never experienced anywhere else. The genuine kindness and warmth shown to me that day is almost indescribable! I think I can say without exaggeration that everyone who was present in the Deforest Room that Sunday morning, most of whom I had never met before, came over to offer a friendly welcome and make me feel comfortable. What a blessing! I was one of the last people to leave the church that day, had already been recruited to be on the stage crew for the annual play, and been handed a member information card to fill out. Is it possible to come home to a place you have never been before? I say the answer is yes, and offer as proof that amazing day all those years ago when I first entered All Saints Church and realized I was home!

**From Becky Fox**

**A Tradition**

Our lives are upside-down because of this pandemic but in truth this is a repeat in my family history. My Grandmother Fox, Minnie Irene Craig, was born on July 4, 1888 in Carntown, Kentucky. As a young girl her family migrated to Connersville, Indiana in search of a high school from which she and her sister, Rebecca Mae, graduated in 1906.

The residents of East Connersville wanted a church to be built, and old Herman Fox, my grandmothers' future husband's grandfather donated the land, and as reported in church records, a frame building was constructed, becoming affiliated with the Methodist Church in 1889. Arriving in Connersville in 1902 the two sisters were actively involved, teaching Sunday School and participating in all church activities.

Meanwhile, my grandmother met Arthur Fox and got married in 1910 settling in a house right down the street from East Side Methodist Church, close to her sister's new home and proceeded to have three sons, my father being the youngest. Unfortunately, her world was turned upside-down and Arthur died on January 6, 1919, during the flu epidemic. With her widowed mother in tow, she moved to Indianapolis to find work as a bookkeeper to provide for her family. She states in her brief memoirs, "I have always kept up my membership at the East Side Methodist Church in Connersville." Those sons grew up to have families of their own, and in the 1950's I spent my teenage summers in East Connersville with my Aunt Mae. I attended church, went to youth group meetings and I even helped deliver pies to the church "pie tent". Those years were very meaningful to me.

I have to admit, I've never made a pie for our All Saints' Holiday Bazaar, but I have always supported All Saints in some most wonderful endeavors; our fabulous musicals, Saint of the Month, Bazaar raffles, pledge drives, greeting and ushering, music and precious activities with my granddaughter. In reality, I am just a continuation of a tradition that started in the 1800's and I pray that we all stay safe and that this pandemic is soon over so that we all may continue to worship and support our All Saints' Episcopal Church.



## **All Saints Memorial Garden Refurbished**

For some time the juniper and other bushes in the Memorial Garden were showing their age and looking a bit “scruffy.” Most had been planted over twelve years ago! In some places grass and other weeds had overtaken the central garden area.

The Memorial Garden Committee consisting of co-chairpersons Chuck Conn and Martha Chambers and committee members Hilla Damm and Peggy Mathauer consulted experts from Claussen’s to draft a proposal to replace struggling bushes and to weed and mulch the overall garden.

This simple and straightforward plan was presented to All Saints Vestry at its last meeting and the green light was given to commence the work. The photo below shows the simple refurbishing of the central garden area which was recently completed, presenting a view of peace and tranquility fitting for this sacred place. In addition, new bushes along the eastern and northern edges of the Memorial Garden, which are not visible in this photo, frame the space beautifully.
