**TICKETS ARE REQUIRED TO ATTEND
the Service of Ordination and Consecration
for Bishop-Elect Shannon Mac-Vean Brown,
11th Bishop of Vermont on September 28th**

From the Diocesan Transition Committee:
We are writing to explain more fully the process by
which lay people can reserve tickets for the
consecration on September 28. The process will be
announced in the September 2, issue of *The
Mountain*.

The following people do **NOT** need to reserve a
ticket (because seats have already been reserved for
them): members of the clergy, anyone in the
procession, ushers, and members of the choir.

More than 500 seats are still available in these three
options for tickets:

1. The main floor of the Ira Allen Chapel
2. A lecture hall in the basement of Ira Allen Chapel
3. An overflow space in the Davis Campus Center

Attendees in the overflow spaces will be able to
participate via a live broadcast and receive
communion. Everyone is invited to the reception
that will follow in the Davis Campus Center. There
is no cost for the tickets, but they are required.

Parishioners may reserve tickets in any of the above three spaces. In other words, the overflow tickets will be available simultaneously with the tickets on the main floor of the chapel. People with mobility issues may find the overflow spaces more desirable than the main floor of the chapel. It should be noted that the overflow spaces will also be air conditioned (the chapel is not), have more comfortable seating (the chapel has wooden pews), and will have easier access to restrooms during the nearly three-hour service. The overflow space in the Davis Center is the option that requires the least amount of walking.

Parishioners are expected to apply individually for tickets following the directions in the September 2nd, issue of The MOUNTAIN. (you will need a printer to print out the ticket).

By looking back to their first entries into public life, we encounter them at a time when their paths were filled with confusion, fear, and hope.

Christian Education Opens For The Season

Safer Church Basic Training

The Episcopal Church in Vermont will offer a Safer Church Basic Training on **Saturday, September 14th, at St. Michael’s Brattleboro, and on October 19th, at St. Mary’s in the Mountains Stowe,** from **8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.** Topics include power, authority, and boundaries in ministerial relationships, and prevention, identification, and response to elder, child, and youth abuse among other topics.

Persons who are paid or volunteer with children or youth or any vulnerable population, Eucharistic Visitors, and employees of a congregation are required to take this training. All other leaders and members of our congregation are encouraged to attend.

Forgiveness

*Hatred does more damage to the vessel
it is contained in than the vessel it is directed at.
Chinese Proverb*

As I was walking through several department stores recently, I couldn't help notice they were already decorated for the holidays. Thanksgiving Day was still many weeks away but here we were moving rapidly into one of the busiest shopping periods of the year. It prompted me to think about a different kind of gift. This kind of gift would have profound importance, such as forgiveness, but no monetary value. I have always enjoyed giving and receiving material gifts. However, I think it is worthwhile to consider other types of gift giving as well.

You can't purchase forgiveness. It is one of the most valuable yet difficult gifts to give to someone. It touches our sense of justice, our sense of right and wrong. In addition, it involves our emotions, including anger and resentment. Such deep passions of the heart do not always pay attention to the rational counsel from the head, even wise ones. Our revered Vermont poet, Robert Frost, once wrote: To be social, is to be forgiving.

Forgiveness is not a formula or a technique. It really is a matter of the heart. It goes to the very core of what we truly believe and feel regarding our interactions with others. Have you ever needed forgiveness in your own life? Was it given or withheld? If it was freely given by another, how did you receive it? If it was withheld, how did that make you feel? Answering these questions is an important first step in understanding how a person might handle the position of being on the forgiving end of an interaction.

Forgiveness is not forgetting or condoning. It is not a clear cut, one-time decision. It is a process that takes time and plenty of self reflection. It requires a candid inventory of our many strong emotions and the pain those emotions cause us. Hopefully, we can eventually move in the direction of releasing that pain and reclaiming control of our lives. As a person experiences emotional healing, the capacity to forgive grows. When you gain a more accurate understanding of what forgiveness genuinely is and is not, that information helps pave the way for real healing.

I have lived long enough to have experienced both sides of the gift of forgiveness, in the giving and the receiving. The unique quality of forgiveness is that it can be a gift, not only for the recipient, but to the giver as well. Professionally, I had the privilege of working with individuals, couples and families as they made their own painful trip from red hot emotions to personal healing and forgiveness. Once the heaviness of those strong emotions was finally released, clients often spoke of actually feeling lighter. In many ways, they were indeed.

This holiday season what non-material gift might you consider giving another?
