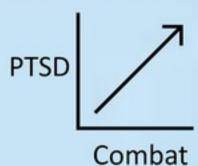
## Combat Exposure Continues to be a Strong Predictor of PTSD and Worse Health and Functioning 50 Years Post-Vietnam Service

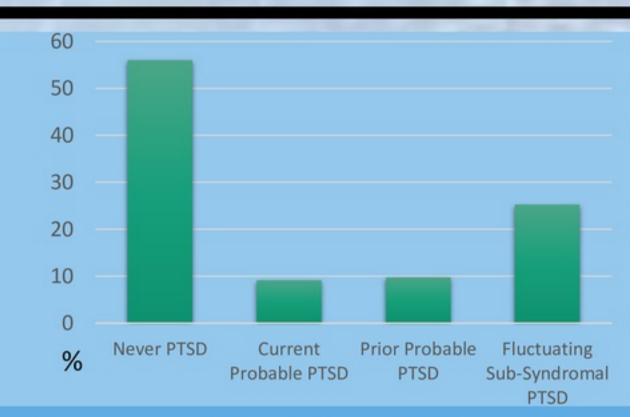
Combat exposure is strongly related to PTSD symptomatology over time



Higher social support continues to be associated with less severe PTSD symptoms

Across 35 years of follow-up, **four** temporal PTSD patterns emerged

Veterans with current and subsyndromal PTSD symptoms face significant functional challenges





Veterans with higher PTSD scores continue to have higher depression and anxiety, lower mental and physical health functioning, and greater functional impairment
