



At the tender age of three months, I was brought to Muscat, Oman and lived there for the next 12 years of my life. My parents and older sister have been living there for quite some time and so when I was born, it was only natural to spend my childhood in this city I still call home. There are a lot of things I will never forget about Muscat: Waking up to the sound of waves in our Azaiba beach bouse and smelling the salty air; being told to keep quiet every 12nn and 6pm as you hear chanting and praying from mosques; the perfectly asphalted roads in the city (not a bump or rock along the way); and blaring horns and 'rejoicing' (as the Omanis would say) each time the Oman team wins a football game in the Gulf Cup (causing so much traffic – something very uncommon in Muscat). Then, there's also the smell of a basket-full of dried fish balanced on the heads of Bedouins crossing towns; and the very sweet (almost harsh) floral scent of Arabic men and women. Until now, whenever I visit Muscat, I still stare at the sea of women in black abayas walking in shopping centers (when they're probably the ones looking at me since I'm dressed very differently in casual jeans and a shirt); and lastly (before I fill up a dozen more pages of my fond memories), how can 1 ever forget the "unique" (and often times, funny) store names and signs such as 'Automatic Bakery' (there is also one named 'Manual Bakery').

Story # 2 fast forwards to my last year in college when I was fortunate to be chosen as our country's representative in an interior design competition and student exchange program in Japan. I convinced my good friend Kring Zulaybar to come to Osaka with me, and boy did we have quite an adventure (this was my first time to travel without family). From the time we landed in Kansai Airport at 8pm, finding our way to the hotel and school, having 'lost in translation' moments, realizing we can't use our GSM phones, and to me breaking down and wanting to come home on my first night there (I seriously wanted to leave and didn't care about anything anymore). I was probably such a pain in the butt (and I'm deeply sorry for that); but with Kring's calming force, and my sister and parents' frequent calls and support, I managed to stay and actually enjoy the experience. To this day, I don't regret it and cherish the weeks I experienced a culture totally different from Manila's. For starters, I barely understood the people; I absolutely loved how convenient and organized their railway system was; train rides and long walks (it took me almost three hours to get to school from my host family's house: 20 minute walk uphill, two long train rides, and another 20 minute walk ... whew!); cool vending machines and convenience store meals; the quirky shopping boutiques; just to mention a few. The feeling of independence taught me so much about self-discipline - you have to respect and take care of yourself, and learn to adapt.

These two experiences never fail to bring a familiar feeling of nostalgia – something that helps me take a step back, observe the things around me, discover my strengths and weaknesses, and most importantly, breathe and take in life slowly. There are still so many places to visit and I eagerly await the opportunity to travel some place far and learn.

This issue, we hope to enlighten and excite with what we have in store for you: a lot of cultural happenings and leisurely destinations. To name a few – Paris' Maison et Objet; a Grecian walk-through of their history, architecture and art; and the famed Kashah Tamadot by Richard Branson. A FASHIONABLE FETE A concept home store's brand of coveted opulence

AC+632 (area code manila) invites everyone to stop and smell the roses with a concept home store by Ricky Toledo and Chito Vijandre located at the second floor of Greenbelt 5, each corner stocked with conversation pieces that would be an interesting addition to anyone's residence.

One corner of the store is dedicated to 'Le Prince Jadinier', translating to 'the garden prince', with a collection of tools, clothing, picnic baskets and other accessories for flower arrangement and gardening. The corner was inspired by Prince Louis-Albert de Broglie, famous for saving the iconic Paris institution of Deyrolle (which is a favorite store of Ricky and Chito).

The shelves and tabletops are filled with party and entertaining essentials such as Belgian linens, crystals, silver accoutrements, table accessories, accent pieces and hard-to-find Danish handdipped, dripless and smokeless tapered candles in unusual colors to complete any celebration.

One section is dedicated to bed and bath, offering luxe teddy bears by Filipino designer Audie Sison, which happen to be indemand pieces in Japan, Europe and the US. Portugal's Claus Porto has a line of beautifully packed soaps and perfumes, which have catered to royalty since 1887. To complement any room, the decadence of the store is spread throughout the area with Millefori natural oils, the finest of its kind.

Paying homage to the man of the house, there is even a special area for men's needs such as humidors, bar sets, handkerchiefs, cuff links, office accessories, games, and even fragrances and after-shave. Other attractions include Panama hats, English bowler hats, Spanish handmade walking sticks and designer umbrellas by Jean Paul Gaultier and Chantal Thomass.

Avid collectors will be happy to know that vintage spectacles and sunglasses in celluloid from England and France, feather calligraphy pens, mother of pearl fountain pens by Dallaiti of Italy, and a line of fine leather notebooks and table accessories from Pinetti of Italy, the atelier entrusted by designers like Armani for their leather accoutrements, are also available.





At the far end of the store, an area commits to the boudoir of delights for the ladies—with jewelry, bags and accessories by Wyn Wyn Ong, Bea Valdes, Gigi de Jonghe and Amanda Coleman. Wyn Wyn creates singular pieces that make use of indigenous materials such as pearl and Philippine hardwood mixed with specially cut, top quality gemstones in unusual shapes and designs, while Bea's internationally acclaimed bags and jewelry celebrates Philippine artisanship, which she has fostered through the years. The opulence of the Maharajahs and the elegance of the British Raj are inspirations of Gigi to come up with edgy and contemporary silk headbands and cotton pastel blouses inspired by Nancy Mitford, which combines the richness of ancient design with that of the digital-age. Moreover, Amanda's delicate gold earrings and neck pieces bring to mind the English countryside's foliage.

On a larger scale, the rest of the store is filled with salon pieces dressed to showcase exclusive and elegant pieces that will delight the senses. Period styles are given a dose of either whimsy or progressive touches to come up with avant garde furniture and accessories. For instance, Tats Manahan's coveted pieces are Chippendale-inspired accent chairs adorned with etched gold-leaf chinoiserie and another inspired by a Venetian grotto. Furthermore, AC+632 exclusively distributes polychromed and gold-leafed furniture pieces by Cebu-based Delphine Groult, niece of Andre Groult, an outstanding French interior designer of modern decorative arts in the 20th century.

With all that AC+632 has to offer, there never seems to be enough time (nor space) for the finer things that inspire and bring pleasure to our homes and lives.

Head: ECLECTIC INFLUENCE Subhead: A salute to personal expression and cosmopolitan taste, Decon Santos' upscale condominium is on full display

Without ringing the bell, the pitter-patter of tiny feet signals there's someone at the door. Two adorable Yorkshire Terriers say hello and let you in. They begin to sniff your shoes and look at you with goo goo eyes, as if hinting for cuddle- or playtime.

A voice is heard from the hallway connecting the kitchen and powder room to the living and dining space, "I see you've met my two babies Miuccia and Alaia." This home is exquisitely glamorous yet undeniably warm—its idiosyncratic interior conceived by realtor and home accessory designer Decon Santos. It is brightly lit, thanks to the white walls and floor-to-ceiling window that provides natural light to the entire space. There is a subtle, well-edited mix of contemporary and oriental elements making it an eclectic space without being overbearing. Hues of white and gray from the walls and wallpaper provide the necessary backdrop for such aesthetic. The notably (and enviably) high ceiling is the main attraction and star of this home. It brings about an air of luxury, and also shows off the paneling, recesses and moulding quite well.

Eyes are immediately drawn to his wall of books and paintings. "My guests are always in awe with the book shelf and how I filled it up," proudly says Decon. Not an inch to waste, he hangs his impressive collection of paintings in between books with knick-knacks carefully curated with them. You can easily spot pieces from Fornasetti, Hermes Home, Maison Les Rob, More Than A Chair and Ethan Allen, just to name a few.

Decon takes inspiration from designer Kelly Wearstler. With an open plan, his home features a juxtaposition of contemporary and classic, masculine and feminine, curves and lines. This is reflected in the tightly edited color combinations, choice of wooden and metal furniture, smart use of mirrors, tight-cut editing of transitional pieces, and gold tones that frame and enhance his surrounding. You can't really pin down one particular style for this home. Some pieces are from his former home, and he's first to say that he is happy to reuse his old furniture items and restore them into new life. "With a fresh coat of paint or displaying certain pieces differently, it's as if it's new again. Plus, I don't like everything brand new. Having these pieces make my home feel very much lived in and not just for display."

The result is an instant classic, a style that is bound to be timeless. "My style depends on my mood and season. Just like how I dress—I infuse a little trend into my rather classic taste in clothes. The same goes for my home. I usually buy pieces that will stand the test of time. Lately, I've been investing in timeless and quality home pieces."

Looking around, his home style reflects a life well traveled. "Every time I travel especially to exotic destinations, I make sure to drop by a flea market or a vintage store and try to buy something for the home that would remind me of that trip." Turn a corner and you will surely find a piece worthy of conversation. For instance, by the main door, you'll see a chair by Marcel Wanders and an army of gold ants crawling on the shelf. In the sitting area, there's a Hermes leather horse saddle and shagreen accent table. And of course, there's his artwork collection. He admits to being currently obsessed with paintings. According to him, his best acquisition was his 1987 BenCab painting.

Every home has a hero element. For Decon, it's Ito Kish's award-winning Gregoria chair. It's not hard to see why – its exquisite craftsmanship and workmanship is timeless and unique at the same time. It's definitely a showstopper. "It's something people instantly recognize," he says. In fact, Decon says it was love at first sight and purchased it right away. A handmade silk rug in the living area that a friend brought home from Pakistan comes a close second favorite. "Imagine. It took years to finish this entire rug. It's simply fascinating."

This upscale two-bedroom condo spans 127 sqm and the location is absolutely golden. Decon exclaims, "It's in the middle of everything!" When asked about his first memory of his home, he answered, "Seeing it for the first time during a site inspection, I instantly pictured myself living here. I fell in love with the location and its ceiling height, which isn't common in most condos. The moment I laid my eyes on it, I told myself, 'I'm not letting this get away.'" It's been four years since he moved in and he has hosted memorable New Year's Eve dinners here with his family. "This home is filled with so many special moments especially when I have my little nephew around. He loves hanging out here."

He then signals lunch was ready and ushers us to the dining area. Immediately, he talks about his wooden tabletop purchased from Tagaytay and that he had the leg frame custom made. He is proud to mix and match pieces to create something of his own. One can't help but notice the bowler hat drop lamps. It's quirky, provides just the right lighting and works perfectly for the dining area. The table is set beautifully—the sight of matching blue and white china and placemats, intricate silverware and designer ware is straight from the pages of a coffee table book—while elegant white roses provide a breather from all the details. Decon reveals he likes to entertain at home. He enjoys setting the table when guests come over, and loves to serve Martini, wine, tea and cheese. For big parties, however, lechon, paella and pasta are his staples.

After lunch, Decon shows us the master bedroom. It is remarkably reminiscent of an Upper East Side apartment. "I love New York style apartments. It's probably where my design aesthetic for this unit came from. My room was particularly inspired from the movie Cruel Intentions," he gushes. A three-piece crystal chandelier watches over a four-poster bed and a pair of matching ottomans from Ethan Allen. The walls

are painted in a midnight blue color and he tells us he doesn't like the sun peeking in his room, hence the automatic black out curtains. In one corner, he has a home office and admits to love spending time in his bedroom, even if to work on his computer and surf all day. "When I'm alone, you'll find me napping and cuddling in bed with my dogs. This is where I find tranquility. I could stay here all day if only there's no work to do." Is there anything else he needs in his bedroom? Well, he's been thinking of getting an Osim full body massager. Who wouldn't want to pamper themselves at the touch of a button?

Everyone has dreams of owning a walk-in closet. Decon decided to renovate the second bedroom and managed to build and design a loft-type closet complete with a spiral staircase to connect the bi-level structure. "It was very challenging to build this loft closet on a flat unit. It was difficult to secure all the permits, but we were eventually allowed to do so." No waste of space here. He made use of every nook and cranny (even the odd spaces) for extra storage and shelving. His closet is complete with a settee, a side table for his coffee-making unit and a leather rug for added glamour. With dark gray walls, his bag collection takes center stage. It is neatly stored in glass-covered shelves with directional and accent lighting, and provides a nice display in the room. A particular Ralph Lauren clutch bag holds a special place in Decon's heart. As a young boy, he bought it with his savings when he was still in grade school making this a memento from his childhood.

Decon describes his typical day for us. "I wake up at 10:30 am and check my phone for messages and I reply to email. Around 11:30 am, I'd have brunch. I discuss with my secretary my schedule for the day then leave home or wait for guests 'til around 5pm. I play tennis or workout at 6 pm; then meet friends or have dinner at 7:30 pm. When I get home, I catch up on my favorite TV series or surf the net 'til I get sleepy. I'm a late sleeper. I go to bed around 1 to 2 am daily. Everyone actually says, 'Hey, you're out again.' They'd be surprised to know that I actually like to spend a lot of time at home especially with all the traffic. If only I could do all my meetings at home, I'd rather stay in."

It is no wonder why he would opt to stay home—his living space is not just a complete stunner. It is inviting, comfortable and well thought off. Is there anything else he would like to add to his home? He answers, "Well, if I had the space, a guest room would be nice."
