
Kitty of the Month—Holly, our little miracle!



A tiny 4 - 5 week old kitten was brought to the shelter for euthanasia because she was paralyzed in her back legs. We couldn't let her go without at least trying to help! X-rays initially revealed damage to her spine, but within days of heating-pad warmth and physical therapy she began to improve. She was a little fighter! Soon she was up and moving around quite happily. Then she was romping and running with the other kittens in her foster home as if nothing had ever happened. About 2 months later she visited the vet's office for a check up on studying the x-rays again it was decided that she did in fact have a broken pelvis and dislocated hips that by some miracle are totally healed! Holly has a clean bill of health and is ready to find her purrfect forever home!

SPAYING OR NEUTERING IS SUCH A CRITICAL PART OF PET OWNERSHIP Every year tens of thousands of unwanted pets are euthanized—and many of those are kittens or puppies that never had a chance at life. It is so much kinder to prevent their birth in the first place! It is possible to create a world of "a home for every pet" but only if spay or neuter becomes the absolute norm and is strictly adhered to by EVERY pet owner

This chart represents one unspayed female, her mate and all of her offspring, producing 2 litters per year, with 2.8 surviving kittens per litter:



By spaying and neutering just one male and one female cat, more than 2,000 unwanted births can be prevented in just four years – and more than 2 million in 8 years!
