For as long as there are irresponsible pet owners who don't spay or neuter their cats, there will always be an abundance of babies born in the spring. The lucky ones will be properly raised and stand a chance at a good life, but too many are born outdoors, grow up unsocialized, and will later only contribute to the everpresent overpopulation of community cats. Fortunately in areas like ours where TNR is practiced, feral colony numbers are kept in check, but that doesn't account for the kittens that come to us from backyards and under houses or decks where Mom "accidentally" got out or is living as an indoor/outdoor cat and the resulting kittens "unexpected" "unwanted". and are **NEVER** UNDERESTIMATE THE ESCAPE CAPABILITIES OF A CAT IN HEAT!

We already have 4 litters of kittens in foster. They are all doing great and will be available for adoption starting early in May.

"I FOUND A KITTEN—WHAT CAN I DO?"

The Golden Rule: Do not remove it from the area for 12—24 hours. Mom may be in the act of moving the litter, or she may be hunting for food. If you are quite certain that Mom isn't coming back, get the kitten to safety and call us.

If you locate Mom and she has a litter, do not separate them—the younger the kittens, the more they need Mom. As their eyes open and they start to move around more, handle them gently to begin the socialization process for later adoption. But if Mom is feral, she may well move her kids to avoid your interference.

DO NOT GIVE KITTENS AWAY IN FRONT OF ANY STORE. There are way too many people who will take them with bad intentions! Contact us and we will properly find homes for them.

Baby kittens can survive incredible odds, but they are also incredibly fragile. Please consider their welfare!





KALYNNE, the Therapy Kitty

Kalynne and her brothers and sister were born under a house and taken into foster care at seven weeks old. Kalynne had some health issues as a kitten and wasn't ready for adoption until she was a "teenager". An elderly woman with some health challenges of her own wanted a pet to keep her company and was put in touch with ARGONN. Kalynne's foster mom knew that Kalynne would be perfect for Mary as the kitty was so very loving and gentle, and could easily provide the lady with the companionship she sought. What no one knew at that time was what else Kalynne would be for her new mom! Mary suffers from sleep apnea and reported to the former foster mom that Kalynne would wake her if she stopped breathing in her sleep! The kitty would not let her human rest again until she knew she was okay.
