

Rules Regulations & Policies

WIS. STAT. 895.481 – NOTICE A PERSON WHO IS ENGAGED FOR COMPENSATION IN THE RENTAL OF EQUINES OR EQUINE EQUIPMENT OR TACK OR IN THE INSTRUCTION OF A PERSON IN THE RIDING OR DRIVING OF AN EQUINE OR IN BEING A PASSENGER UPON AN EQUINE IS NOT LIABLE FOR THE INJURY OR DEATH OF A PERSON INVOLVED IN EQUINE ACTIVITIES RESULTING FROM THE INHERENT RISKS OF EQUINE ACTIVITIES, AS DEFINED IN SECTION 895.481(1)(E) OF THE WISCONSIN STATUTES.

Safety 1st! This is an equine campground. Horses have the right of way. Please maintain a safe distance from horses and riders. If a horse and rider are approaching you, stop, step to the side and wait for them to tell you what to do. If they want to you to wait for them to pass, please wait. If they decide to wait and tell you to proceed, then proceed.

Horses are privately owned. Do not feed or pet any horse without the owner's permission.

Never go into another camper's site without their permission.

All campsites are to be cleaned by guests upon check out or a \$50 clean up fee will be charged to the guest. All garbage must be bagged and taken to the dumpster at check out. Do not burn garbage in the fire rings! The only thing allowed to burn in the fire rings in paper and wood.

We will come around daily starting at 11:00am to pick up garbage. Should you have any garbage, place your garbage bags at the end of your campsite by 11:00am for pick up. If you need extra garbage bags you can get more at the office or ask us when we come around to pick up garbage.

If you bring a dog, they must be <u>kept on a leash at ALL times</u>! If your dog is not kept on a leash, you will be asked to leave and you will not be given a refund. Please pick up after your pets and dispose of the waste bags properly.

Quiet hours are between 10:00pm and 8:00am. Quiet hours will be strictly enforced. If we receive numerous complaints, you will be asked to leave, and no refund will be given.

No fireworks or firearms of any kind are allowed in the campground. No exceptions and no excuses.

No four wheelers or minibikes allowed.

Campfires allowed fire rings only. Do not move fire rings! Fires too large for the fire ring will be extinguished for everyone's safety. Do not leave a fire unattended. Fires must be extinguished before you leave your site or retire for the evening.

Do not cut down trees or brush for firewood. Firewood is available for sale at the office.

If you move your picnic table to another campsite, please return it to where it belongs upon check out.

Horse Owners:

It is your responsibility to maintain control of your horse. Please maintain a safe distance from other guests staying at the campground and give verbal directions when needed so they understand how you would like them to proceed to avoid confusion and maintain safe conditions for everyone.

All riders under the age of 18 are required to wear a helmet. Additionally, it is mandatory for all riders to wear suitable footwear that features a heel of no less than ½ inch.

Do not tie your horse to any paddock or gates.

Please clean your corrals daily putting manure in the supplied muck buckets. We come around daily starting at 11:00am to pick up manure and garbage. Place the muck buckets at the end of your campsite by 11:00am and we will come around to empty them. Should you have any garbage, place your bags next to your muck buckets and we will be happy to collect your garbage for you as well. If you need extra garbage bags you can get more at the office or ask us when we make our daily rounds at 11:00.

If you are riding anywhere on the campground and your horse makes a mess it is your responsibility to clean up the manure in a timely manner. Muck buckets and carts are available around the campground. Please make sure to return the muck buckets & carts to where you found them. Horses are not allowed in the non-equine areas.

Please do not leave your horse unattended outside of your campsite.

If you or your horse are not familiar with obstacles, we recommend that you walk your horse through the obstacles first for your safety and the safety of your horse. Even an experienced rider never knows how their horse will react to a new obstacle.
