# Executive Director's Message - Steven Wendell

Monday, September 9, 1968, the number one song on the pop music chart was The Rascals' single, *People Got to Be Free*. The first two stanzas read:

All the world over, so easy to see People everywhere just wanna be free Listen, please listen, that's the way it should be There's peace in the valley, people got to be free

You should see What a lovely, lovely world this'd be Everyone learned to live together, ah hah Seems to me Such an itty-bitty thing should be Why can't you and me learn to love one another?

The song was popular perhaps because it represented the idealism and passion running through much of the country's youth at that time including the deep strain of anti-Vietnam War sentiment coupled with the Woodstock generation.

September 9, 1968 is also memorable for me because it was my first day of employment as Director of Teen Activities for the Jewish Community Center of Bridgeport, CT; my first, fulltime job and the beginning of my career as a Jewish communal professional.

As many of you know, this June I will be retiring after a nearly 54 year career that has included positions in six states encompassing JCCs, Federations, day schools, resident camps, and a national Jewish organization. It's been a fantastic and fulfilling journey. And other than this current pandemic, I could not have chosen a more rewarding position than as Executive Director of the UJCVP to end my career and where Charlene and I have decided to call our retirement community.

My career began less as a planned opportunity and more as an opportunity of circumstance and convenience. As I was pondering my post graduate options, I got a call from my former BBYO Regional Director who had also directed Camp B'nai Brith in Canada, and a JCC overnight camp in the Catskills, both of which I had worked as a counselor and unit head. He told me that there was an immediate need for a teen worker at the JCC in Bridgeport, a half hour from my home, and he thought I would be a great candidate for the job. It seemed that the person they had hired suddenly was no longer available. At the encouragement of my father, I agreed to interview and subsequently take the job for what I thought would be maybe a year, giving

me time to plan my future finding a "real job" and/or graduate school. My father warned me not to ask for too much money because JCCs didn't pay very well, but the experience would be worthwhile. At the interview, after it became clear that either I impressed the JCC Director or he was just desperate to fill the position, when he asked how much annual salary I needed to take the job, I told him \$5,000. His response was that he'd love to hire me, but the salary I asked for was not within their salary scale. The minimum starting salary was \$5,500. From that moment on, I learned always to ask for the highest salary you could imagine and then negotiate from there. One of the most valuable career lessons learned over a half century and from the many opportunities to come.

During the next few months, in this column of our UJC Newsletter, I hope you will indulge me as I share some thoughts, highlights, and lowlights of my career and what I have learned along this journey covering some 7 decades. I'll try not to bore too much!

From Charlene, my wife and partner for what will be 52 years this January, and me, we wish everyone a Happy Hanukkah, and a safe, and healthy holiday season.

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

### Rachel's Well: 4 Years of Immersions by Deborah Moon

When Rachel's Well Community Mikvah turned 4 on Nov. 1, the ritual bath will have enabled more than 1,200 traditional and contemporary immersions. Rachel's Well is owned by the Jewish Federation of Greater Portland with ritual supervision provided by the Oregon Board of Rabbis.

"Rachel's Well is here for the most traditional and for everybody who self-identifies as Jewish for the most contemporary of reasons," says Rachel's Well Mikvah Manager Caron Blau Rothstein. Before COVID limited access to the mikvah, nearly 400 immersions took place annually. In the past 12 months, despite pandemic restrictions, more than 250 immersions took place. Numbers will likely increase as the mikvah resumes normal operations.

"The Federation has done a tremendous service to the community by both the building of the mikvah as well as the

professional oversight that provides a comfortable, efficient and safe environment for all those who use it. I see it as truly symbolic that an organization such as the Jewish Federation, which is situated at the center of the Portland Jewish community, has stood up to the responsibility to provide such an institution that is so central to Jewish life," says Rabbi Chanan Spivak, CEO of the Portland Kollel. The Kollel has been designated by the OBR to be the mikvah's halachic supervisor.

In a video for Federation, mikvah volunteer guide and user Toni Jaffe says that a mikvah open to all Jewish people for any reason really struck a chord with her. "I think we need more ritual in our life to mark transitions, to mark ceremonies, to mark passages," says Toni. "Rachel's Well is an experience of immersion you can enter as one person and exit as another person who has gone through a particular time or situation or passage in your life."

Portland may well have the only mikvah in the country that was built and owned by a Federation, according to Lucy Marshall, director of the Rising Tide Network. Though many Federations provide financial support for mikvaot, Lucy says none of the 34 communities in six countries

in the network have a Federation-owned mikvah. "The leadership Federation has taken is inspiring," says Carrie Bornstein, CEO of Mayyim Hayyim, one of five core mikvaot that launched the network. "Rachel's Well is a model for other Federations."



## 5 Hot Israeli Drinks to Get You Through Winter

All the hygge feels, with a Middle Eastern twist.

While Israeli winters tend to be mild (40-60 degrees F), locals — spoilt from months of sunshine — suffer through the season, wrapped up in padded coats, a hot drink permanently in gloved hands. But I am not talking about just your average Swiss Miss hot cocoa packets. These five beverages keep them toasty as they huddle in cafes with fogged windows, or under blankets at home when a whiff of snow shuts down all public transport. Fragrant with spice, they'll warm you from the inside out.

#### 1. Sahlab

Beloved throughout the Middle East, Israelis rely on this thick, creamy drink to keep them cozy through winter. Traditionally, it is made from ground orchid



bulbs (said to cure coughs and colds, and act as an aphrodisiac — fun!) and milk, often flavored with rose water or orange blossom, and topped with nuts, dried fruit, and cinnamon. These days, many versions are thickened with cornstarch, and Israelis have gotten creative with the toppings, which include vanilla, caramel, banana, to name a few.

Ingredients to make Sahlab

4 cups whole milk or coconut milk, divided

2 tsp vanilla extract or 1 vanilla bean, split and seeds scraped out of the pod

3 tbsp sugar or honey, or to taste

¼ cup cornstarch or 3 tbsp sahlab powder


½ tsp rose or orange blossom water, or to taste

- Pinch of salt Finely chopped pistachios
- Shredded coconut

Ground cinnamon or cardamom

### 2. Coffee With Hawaij

There are two versions of the Yemenite spice blend hawaij: a savory mix (for soup) and a sweet mix (for coffee). The coffee blend is like a less basic, super fragrant, punchy



often cinnamon, cloves, and nutmeg. It is typically mixed into a strong



topped with cocoa powder. It's easy to recreate at home — just choose your favorite chocolate candy to stir in. You could use leftover Halloween candy or even Hanukkah

### 4. Mint Tea

Often, what Israelis call "tea" is actually an infusion (i.e. without any tea leaves). Tea is drunk year-round, but are especially beloved in winter. And mint tea — water with fresh spearmint



leaves called "nana" — is the most popular; at once both warming and refreshing. You can adapt your tea to your taste, or what you have growing on your mirpeset (balcony); ginger, lemon, lemon verbena, and herbs are popular additions. Sweeten with a drizzle of honey or silan (date syrup).
