

Executive Director's Message - Steven Wendell

Here's the third installment in my "professional retirement" musings. I did not anticipate this to be a monthly topic in this column, but there seems to be some interest in these writings, so I'll try another.

After my first few years as a JCC youth worker, having achieved some measure of success, I was approached by the leadership of the JCC Day Camp Committee,

several members of which were also on my Youth Committee. It seemed that key leadership of the JCC, including the executive director, were putting together a proposal to sell the JCC day camp site, which included some 50 acres located about 20 minutes north of the JCC building, and had been operating for about 35 years. The day camp had individual cabins for each age group, a large ball field, a Quonset hut that served as an indoor gym, a large pool, a corral for horses, an administrative building, a caretaker's house, etc. In short, it was a great day camp facility able to accommodate more than 400 campers.

So why sell such a valuable asset? Well, camp registration had dipped below 200 and it was losing money. And the "big donors" at the JCC

wanted funds to redo the men's health club and thought this would be a great way to raise that money plus bail out some accumulated operating deficits. The camp leadership, who had attended the day camp and sent their kids to the camp, were totally opposed to selling a program asset that had been so impactful on their lives and the lives of their children.

A compromise was reached. The JCC leadership agreed to let the "kid" (me) run the camp for a maximum of two years. If it didn't turn around financially by then, it would be sold. I am certain that the JCC leadership thought


they had a foolproof way of placating the folks who were lobbying to keep the camp and who represented

the younger families with younger children, few of whom were paying triple dues to be men's health club members. To further guarantee that the camp would continue to fail, there was no budget for much needed repairs to the camp facilities.

Of course, I thought this was a great opportunity for me to be elevated to Camp Director in addition to my Youth Director position. And being young and naïve, I was cocky enough to think I could succeed where others with much more experience than me, had failed.

Eagerly, I drove up to the camp to inspect my "new kingdom." As I walked around the swimming pool and stepped to the edge near the pool's gutter, a 10-foot section of

the pool gutter and supporting wall collapsed into the empty pool. That's when the scope of the challenge began to set in... a failing facility infrastructure, poor registration, no significant money for repairs, and a novice camp director.

So what's a person to do? You call ghostbusters! In my case, the "ghostbusters" were the teens with whom I had developed a close relationship. We set up an ongoing series of weekend mitzvah days solely devoted to cleaning up and repairing the day camp facilities. With the help of some generous donations from "camp people," the teens and I were even able to re-cement the pool (no city inspections required) with a special waterproof, fast drying cement mixture. The work, of course, took longer than expected, so a day before the opening of the camp season, we were filling the pool at the deep end while still finishing painting the shallow end. The pool never lost that underwater paint smell all summer and there were a few large pieces of pool paint that would need to be removed from the pool each morning. But we had a working pool, and the teens were very proud, and invested, in that pool and all the other work they had done to get camp ready for the summer. Those teens, and their parents, were our best marketing "experts" at getting kids to register. And, of course, they all had summer jobs at "their" camp.

Within two summers, camp registration went from 180 to more than 400. By the third summer, the day camp was the largest, programmatic, surplus producing department of the JCC. When I left the Bridgeport JCC (the first time) in 1977, the day camp had a registration waiting list and more staff applicants then we had positions. The camp offered off-site waterskiing, onsite horseback riding, softball, tennis, soccer, archery, pottery, wood crafts, nature, weekly overnights with campfires and s'mores, and even a staff softball team that was part of a city league with full uniforms and multi-evening games. We ran a dozen leased school buses driven by trained and licensed counselors who

earned extra money driving the buses, while at the same time, being camp ambassadors twice daily as they picked up and dropped off kids at their homes. It was exhilarating to be part of this program and to have played a role in its growth.

But... in spite of all this success, within 4 years of my departure from the JCC and the day camp, the property was sold. It seems that some of the JCC key leadership learned that a highway connector to Route 95 was being planned and could run through the camp property. The developers bid up the worth of the land and the JCC couldn't resist the temptation. The camp was sold, and the money put into a new health club.

Fast forward 30 years. The highway was never built on the old camp property. I was recruited by the JCC leadership, who were the same teens, now all grown, that I had worked so closely with, to return as the JCC Executive Director to try and save the JCC from closing. I maintain that the decision to sell the day camp, thereby removing a valuable program from the community that served families with children, the future leaders, and funders of the JCC, was at least an element, if not the main reason for the financial collapse of this JCC after it had served the Jewish community for 100 years. The condition of the building and operating debt was too large to save the JCC. It became my job to negotiate the sale and closing of that institution, where I started my career and learned so much. Bittersweet memories.

It is essential for volunteer and professional leadership, in making impactful decisions related to facility development, to consider how investments in the present can be maintained in the future and who will be the future leaders invested in the continuity of those investments.

Mikveh Project

I never considered myself as a kind of Jew who goes to the mikveh. I always considered the mikveh a place for Jews more observant than myself and belonging to an older, more traditional form of Judaism. I attend services regularly, buy kosher meat, lead services, read Torah, and am active in my synagogue, but still I saw the mikveh as not belonging to me. This all changed however, a few years ago. I went to the mikveh a couple of days before getting married, and it was one of the best decisions I made about the entire weekend. After discussing different aspects of a Jewish wedding with our rabbi, and getting good advice from my mom (thanks, mom!), I decided that this was a part of a Jewish wedding that I may regret not doing later in life.

I am lucky to belong to a synagogue with its own mikveh, so the logistics were easy, and in the moment, the logistics are what I focused on; arriving on time, removing all my makeup and nail polish, etc. However, the experience became about so much more than just going through the motions. It was about walking 2 miles from my apartment to the synagogue on a Thursday morning with two of my bridesmaids who live far away. I was able to spend quiet and meaningful time with them. It was about removing every last piece of clothing and jewelry, which often feels like a second skin. I have a great picture of my friends removing my nose ring for me, which I have not taken out in 10 years. It was about creating a spiritual space for myself before moving forward into a new phase of life, and on a practical level, it was about having a few moments of peace or quiet before days of nonstop celebration.

Going to the mikveh was the perfect way for me to start my wedding and marriage, but in the end, it was also the perfect way for me to gain strength in my own religion and faith. In many ways, I felt that I was reclaiming and embracing a part of Judaism that I thought was only for a certain part of the community, a part that I thought might not always view my Judaism as correct.



I make conscious choices each day to be Jewish and have a Jewish home in an ever-changing and modernizing culture, and I am proud to be part of a global Jewish community wanting to change with me. The mikveh is not a part of Judaism that should be reserved for a few, but rather a space, both physical and spiritual, for any of us during life's biggest and best moments.


The Virginia Peninsula Jewish Film Festival's Winter Series continues on Sunday, March 6th and Sunday March 27th.



The film unravels the many stories of the camp residents, examining and discovering many surprising new details, shattering common stereotypes of the current Israeli discourse.



Sunday, March 27, 2022 at 2pm Shared Legacies 2020, 1 hr 35min

The often-forgotten story of the coalition and friendship between the Jewish and African American communities during the Civil Rights Movement. The crucial historical lessons of Black-Jewish cooperation are revisited and revived in this fascinating, urgent call to action. Common cause was found in the turbulent '60s Civil Rights era, as Jewish leaders backed Dr. King's efforts at racial equality and harmony. Yet, the relationship has frayed in recent years, as a once mighty bond of support and respect has seemingly faded, been forgotten, or ignored.
