Executive Director's Message - Steven Wendell

As noted in the last issue of our Jewish Community News, my more than half century career as a Jewish communal professional began on September 9, 1968. I arrived bright and early that morning at the Bridgeport, CT, JCC with great anticipation and eagerness to see my new, private office. There it was, at the end of the hallway with a plastic sign that read, "Steve Wendell, Director of Teen Activities." What more could a young twenty something ask for? So I opened the door, which suddenly stopped halfway as it hit my desk. It seemed my new private office was a converted closet, barely large enough to accommodate a desk and chair!

No matter. Who cared about an office? I was ready to engage all these teenagers who I was certain would be

arriving later that day and evening to meet me and talk about participating in exciting new activities. And they wouldn't fit into an office, large or small anyway. So I hung up my plastic peace sign (remember those?) and began walking the building, looking for places to host meetings and activities.

For the rest of the week, every afternoon and evening, I waited to meet the teens. Actually, for that entire first month, I waited... and waited... and waited. And other than the basketball league players who had no interest in "teen activities" outside of sports, no teen showed up.

Undeterred, I began to ask other staff in the building, and some of the basketball players who would at least stop and engage in a 10 second conversation, as to why no teens were coming to the JCC, and in particular, the JCC Teen Lounge, which doubled as the bridge club room during the day. The answer was universal. It wasn't cool for a teen to be seen at the JCC except perhaps for competitive sports. And then I remembered. That's exactly how I felt as a teen

just a few short years before. What cool teenager would want to be at the JCC in a structured, supervised environment, with an "adult" advisor, when you could just hang out with your friends at one of their houses where the parents were invisible and do whatever you wanted? (Jewish kids didn't hang out on street corners in Bridgeport.)



Well, I was getting paid this huge salary to do something. So I decided if the teens weren't going to come to me, I was going to go to them. After all, we were nearly the same age, and I was a pretty cool, single guy just out of college who knew exactly what these kids were doing when they were "hanging out." I had also learned the golden rule of


teen behavior as a youth leader in AZA (BBYO) and a resident advisor at a Hillel House: find a couple of "cool girls" and at least one "cool guy" to come to an event and everyone else will follow.

Just so happened that the secretary for the athletic department had a popular teenage daughter who was a junior in high school. After some "help a poor struggling colleague" guilt trips, I encouraged Florence (the single mom of the popular teen) to bribe her daughter to invite me to her home, and have her daughter invite some of her friends just for a friendly chat. It probably didn't hurt

when Florence told her daughter she was inviting a "cute single college-age guy over" to meet her. And I guess I shouldn't have been surprised when half a dozen girls showed up... and no guys.

The agenda for the meeting was simple. I just asked the group what it would take for them to even consider coming

to the JCC to hang out. The one answer (other than free pot) that they all could agree upon was a teen lounge that was exclusively theirs and that they could decorate and manage themselves, and that was out of view of adults and younger kids. After several months of weekly meetings to discuss details, but more importantly, to establish trust and expand the group, a plan was developed.

When the JCC moved from downtown Bridgeport to the suburbs and built a new 100,000 square foot building, they included the basic infrastructure for a half dozen bowling alleys, which were a popular facility at the old building. During the several years of design and construction, the popularity of bowling declined significantly as a group, Jewish activity. The space reserved for the alleys, with the poured floor, including raised entry and seating areas, became an unfinished, large storage room in the lower level of the building. There was one raised area of about 2,000 square feet, with a stairway exit to the parking lot that I thought would be an excellent spot to put up some plywood and create a teen lounge space. The teens worked hard and creatively to come up with sketches and plans for the space and pricing for materials. They even solicited prospective donations of used furniture. And as they worked on the plans, the word spread, and excitement grew... a teen lounge that they created and would be their own at the JCC.

Of course, by now I had already learned that the executive director of the JCC, and the Board, would be resistant to such an idea. But, fortuitously, every January, the JCC Board of Directors hosted an open meeting for all members to attend and bring up any subject they wanted. Usually, no members except Board members showed up, but the PR looked good in the monthly newsletter. Since the meeting was open to members, and the teens were members either with individual or family memberships, I planted the idea that attending this open meeting and presenting their plan for a teen lounge might be a good idea.

About 15 minutes before the open Board meeting was scheduled to begin, I received a frantic call from my boss, the Executive Director. "You need to come upstairs and get rid of all these kids in the lobby. The Board meeting is about to start." To which, I replied, "Isn't tonight an open Board meeting? I think they're here for the meeting. But if you don't want them to come, including those whose parents are on the Board, then I guess you'll need to tell them to leave." Of course I knew the Exec, who could barely deal with me, was in no way going to deal with a bunch of teenagers.

The Board President was totally impressed that so many kids had showed up at a JCC meeting, and in particular, his daughter, who had not mentioned to him that she would be there. After the usual opening comments and niceties, the Board President asked the assembled teens, and me, if they had something they would like to discuss. I explained that this group of teens represented our new "Teen House Council" and they had worked on an idea they wanted to discuss. Several teens, who not by accident, had parents on the Board, presented their idea for a teen lounge and asked for \$2,000 and permission to use a portion of the "storage room" to build their lounge. (Keep in mind this was 1969 dollars.) The Board then did what boards do when unprepared to deal with an idea, and began to discuss all the obstacles and problems with this project and were ready to "send it to committee" for further discussion.

Just at the moment all seemed lost and you could see the disappointment, and anger, on the teens' faces, a Board member and major donor in the community stood up and proclaimed: "I don't know how my daughter got involved in this project and what motivated her to even come to the JCC, let alone make this presentation to the Board, but if this is what it takes to get kids to care about this place, I'm prepared to contribute \$50,000 towards this effort, raise whatever else is needed, and hire an architect to design a proper teen lounge using the entire 10,000 square feet that was planned as bowling alleys." The daughter of this mega-dollar-donor whispered in my ear, "You can't let him take over our project. He won't listen to anything we say." I'm not sure how I would react to this situation today, but at that moment, having worked hard to gain the trust of these teens, I had little choice. I stood up and said, "Thank you very much for that generous offer Harold, but our teens cannot accept. They have worked hard to design their own space and that's why they are here tonight, to ask you for a space they can truly call their own. But if you are willing to give them total control and veto over all aspects of the project, maybe I can convince them to accept your generous offer."

The project was completed with the teens involved in every facet of the design, construction, furnishings, and equipment. At the ribbon cutting and opening Saturday night dance, 500 teenagers showed up. The Teen Lounge became the center of youth activities open six afternoons and evenings per week, with an average attendance of 25 to 75 teens per day. The Teen House Council ran the lounge and enforced a strict code of conduct for all users. They considered it their space and were very protective of it.

The early lesson I learned from this, aside from how to use children to get money out of parents, was that real power or influence lies not so much within a leader, but in a leader's ability to empower others.

For those who don't know me, I'm Steve Shapiro and I was honored when Kelli Caplan and Steve Wendell asked if I would chair the Mikveh Committee, following the Board's vote in September. As a refresher, the Board voted unanimously to establish a Mikveh Committee to undertake an investigative process related to the possibility of creating a modern mikveh. We were charged with: providing construction cost estimates, providing an operating budget, conducting outreach and providing education on the mikveh concept, administering the current Mikveh Endowment Fund and coordinating fundraising efforts. I know a lot of folks put in a lot of time and effort over the past 5 years to get us to this point and I applaud their efforts and commitment.

A little about me – I retired at the end of June 2021 from the City of Hampton after 37 years as Deputy Director of Community Development; 34 of which were as the City's Building Official, which meant I oversaw all construction inspections and all construction plan review, amongst other tasks. I was also President of Rodef Sholom Temple for 3 years, during which time I was Chair of the design committee for the construction of our new building on the UJC campus and worked alongside many dedicated RST volunteers to bring the dream of a new building to reality.

So, where are we with the Mikveh concept? Our committee has been formed consisting of myself as Chair, Meryl Kessler, Kelli Caplan, Judie Kavit, Elaine Abrams, Lois Ullman, Wendy Eisner, Steve Marks and Steve Wendell and we conducted our first meeting in November. We have engaged Ritchie Curbow Construction as a design/build contractor to provide us with a concept plan and costs that we can then bring back to the Board. Ritchie Curbow has enlisted Mike Henry Architecture and A.D Potts and Associates Surveying to prepare the concept plans. We have also engaged Rabbi Eliyahu Stern as our Mikveh expert for everything religious in regards to a modern mikveh that can be used by our entire community.



Tu B'Shevat Recipe: Shevat Haminim Salad by Chef Jamie Geller

When Tu B'Shevat rolls around, we always make a habit of cooking with the Shivat HaMinim, the 7 agricultural products enumerated in the Torah as special to the Land of Israel. Barley, wheat, figs, dates, grapes, pomegranates and olive (oil) are all represented in this salad. The honey is a nod to the land of milk and honey and even the red wine vinegar is a further play on the grape theme. Make this and you will have done this holiday proud.

INGREDIENTS

- •3 cups cooked barley or Israeli couscous
- •1/4 cup dried figs, chopped or 3 fresh figs, quartered
- •1/4 cup pitted dates, chopped
- •1/4 cup seedless grapes, halved
- •1/4 cup pomegranate seeds
- •1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil



- •2 tablespoons honey
- •2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- •1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- •1/4 cup wheat and barley cereal (such as Grape-Nuts), optional
- •2 tablespoons parsley leaves, torn

PREPARATION

1. Combine barley, figs, dates, grapes and pomegranate seeds in a large bowl.

2. Place oil, honey, vinegar and mustard in a small bowl and whisk to combine. Pour over barley salad and toss to coat well.

3. Just before serving add cereal and toss to evenly distribute. Garnish with parsley leaves.




The Sarfan Center Goes Global!


