News From the Rising Tide Mikveh Consortium

As a member of the Rising Tide consortium, we in Newport News, are able to join Mikvaot with inclusivity and modern and traditional practices throughout the world. These are very exciting times for addressing personal, local, and international needs in a changing world.

WHAT IS AN OPEN MIKVEH? Lucy Marshall, director of operations for the Rising Tide Open Waters Mikveh network: "When I think of an open Mikveh, I think of it opening in two directions: (1) It honors all the traditional uses and also opens the ancient ritual to mark any meaningful life transitions; (2) It ensures Mikveh is accessible to all genders, abilities, ages, sexual orientations... everyone."

ISRAEL: Havana Ner David, who runs the Shmaya Open Mikveh in Israel, talks about the local art hanging in their Mikveh rooms. She and Rachel Stock Spilker from Minnesota have co-authored and illustrated a new book for children about the Mikveh experience.

DES MOINES: Mayim Rabim is the newest Rising Tide Mikveh that opened on Nov. 20, 2022 (five years after being an Emerging Mikveh). This is the only Mikveh in Iowa. Rabbi Barton says the community is small but mighty! All Jewish members of the community have accessibility and inclusivity in the Mikveh experience, uniting the Jewish community.

PORTLAND, OR: Rachel's Well Mikveh is the only up and running Mikveh in the consortium of over 36 Mikvaot worldwide, that is owned and run by the Jewish Federation. It has been running for five years and is open to the entire Jewish community.

NEW YORK CITY: Immerse NYC is the only open Mikveh in New York City, which opened in 2018, who partners with facilities across the New York Metropolitan area, to priovide their inclusive Mikveh experience. Rachel Kunstadt, their director, says "the world is changing and I think Mikveh is the beautiful stream of water that will always be there - it's whole and beautiful in a world of so much uncertainty."



Our UJCVP is a member of the consortium RISING TIDE, a national network devoted to opening the mikveh experience to the entire Jewish Community.



Local Feel Good Story

Newport News woman has co-authored a new children's book, Shabbat and Sunday Dinner, to promote cultural understanding.

At the C. Waldo Scott Center in Newport News, Candace Bazemore reads her book from cover to cover to children.

"Who here likes to learn about cultures? Raise your hands," Bazemore said before beginning her read.

In April, Candace, and Gabrielle Spatt published their children's book, *Shabbat and Sunday Dinner*.

"It's really cool. It's a Black Christian boy and a young Jewish kid and they're basically sharing their family dinner traditions," Candace said. "The book follows

these two sweet boys through their elementary presentations about teaching their family traditions. And

the traditions are based on my family tradition and Candace's family traditions," Gabrielle said.

The two characters are David and Malcolm. David celebrates Shabbat and Malcolm celebrates Sunday dinner.

"In Judaism, every week we celebrate Shabbat. Some people say it's the holiest holiday because it happens every week," Spatt said. "It's a


commandment to stop, to disconnect, to forget about the week in the past, to welcome a start to a fresh new week, and to be with those that you want to spend time with."

Eric Bazemore, Candace's brother, illustrated the book. He said he reflected on his childhood memories when portraying Sunday dinner in the book.

"For Sunday dinners when I was growing up, I just remember all the good foods that my grandmama used to cook," he

said. "My grandmama used to make excellent mashed potatoes, the greens, sweet potato pie." The book also includes a recipe for challah and deep-fried cornbread.

Candace lives in Newport News but formerly lived in Atlanta where she met Gabrielle. The two authors and



friends learned they were both members of Atlanta's Black/Jewish Coalition.

The coalition was founded in 1982. The late Con-

gressman John Lewis co-founded the organization.

Gabrielle said the group was created to bring the Black and Jewish communities together. She said she and Candace participated in a retreat with other Black and Jewish people to learn about each other's cultures, build friendships and discuss tough topics.

"This is an outcome of an experience that Candace and I had where we got to

learn more about racism and more about antisemitism and one of the pictures in the book, dedicated to Black

> Jewish relations, is of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Rabbi Heschel walking hand in hand," Gabrielle said.

The duo came up with the idea for a book at the end of 2020.

The Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta awarded the authors a \$2,000 grant to help self-publish the book.

"We want to encourage those who

read the book to continue those conversations, to ask the difficult questions and we hope that in doing so, it will help them start new relations with the person

that's across the dinner table from them," Candace said.

"It's really about making friends, about breaking bread, and that's where the really special conversations happen, around the dinner table," Gabrielle said. Although Shabbat and Sunday Dinner is a children's book, they hope adults learn the message that's inside it.



Sunday, January 29, 2023 at 2:00pm The Levys of Monticello 2022, 1 hr 11 min, Documentary

A missing chapter of American Jewry comes to light in this fascinating chronicle of the Virginia home of one of the nation's Founding Fathers. Thomas Jefferson's Monticello residence, just outside of Charlottesville, stands as a complex symbol of the paradox of democracy. Designed by Jefferson, built and tended by slaves, the palatial plantation was a presidential retreat, retirement home, and final resting place. Sold due to mounting debts, Uriah Phillips Levy, a Jewish naval officer and fervent believer in Jeffersonian ideals, became its unlikely caretaker. When historical preservation was all but unheard of, Levy's family restored and saved the estate from ruin. The story behind this national treasure confronts the stain of ongoing racism and antisemitism that remain part of the national narrative.

Sunday, March 5, 2023 at 2:00pm The Un-Word 2020, 1 hr 25 min, German, English subtitles

This German satire lays bare the discords of modern multiculturalism. Tempers flare after a Jewish student is goaded in a schoolyard brawl. After more taunts by Muslim classmates, the 15-year-old fights back, injuring an Iranian and a Palestinian student. The film is intended as a darkly humorous conversation-starter, seeking a common language in the unending fight against intolerance.

Sunday, March 26, 2023 at 2:00pm Betrayed 2020, 2 hr 6 min, Norwegian, English subtitles

Based on true events, this Norwegian narrative film exposes how Norway's government and people systematically persecuted the country's Jews, and then collaborated in deporting them to German death camps. The horror and callousness of those times is embodied in the experiences of one Jewish family, the Braudes, whose members we get to know through their photographs and their prize-winning portrayals by actors, making this a very personal story for the audience.



Holocaust Writing & Arts Competition

2023 marks the 22nd year of the Holocaust Writing & Visual Arts Competition sponsored by the UJCVP and funded by the Sarfan/William M. & Gary S. Nachman Philanthropic Fund of the UJC Endowment. One of the primary goals of this competition is to encourage young

people to apply the lessons of history to the moral decisions they make today. Through studying the Holocaust, students explore the issues of moral courage as well as the dangers of prejudice, peer pressure, unthinking obedience to authority, and indifference. This competition provides students an opportunity to think and express themselves creatively about what they have learned.

This competition has been a continued labor of love to many in the community. Originally chaired by Sandy Katz and Sue Friedman, Helaine Shinske joined the

helm after Sue stepped down after a few years. Together Sandy and Helaine would hit the road, physically driving to schools and speaking at staff meetings and often presenting to classrooms to get the word out.

"I loved it, absolutely loved it. It became the thing for me." Helaine reminisced. She

felt she was truly able to introduce Judaism and the issues of antisemitism to hundreds of local students each year. She recalls a year when a student rode her bicycle to the UJCVP all the way from York County to turn her essay in on time. "I think Linda Molin gave her a ride home!" She laughed.

In 2019, Sandy and Helaine passed the torch to the next generation of competition chairs, Melissa Kashy and Marley Keefer. "We wanted to pick up from where the people who ran it for many years and make sure that it continued." Melissa said. And Marley added "We're losing the youngest generation of the Holocaust survivors. And because of that, there aren't enough stories being brought down to generations and people are forgetting."

Like with most things, the pandemic caused a decrease in the number of entries over the past few years. Marley and Melissa, both educators themselves,

understand the stresses of teaching. "Teachers are overwhelmed in the schools and may not be getting the word out as much." Marley notes. They are currently exploring other avenues to promote the competition without relying on overworked school staff. According

to Helaine, school participation would vary according to the year and teachers, "It was very difficult to grow."

Regardless of the quantity of entries, reading students work and viewing their artwork has remained a favorite part for competition chairs. For many years, essay judging was communal and took place in the UJCVP Library, papers and essays would be all over the

table and floor! Judging looks a bit different since March 2020, now judges receive their stack of essays via email and all reading is done at home. Every entry

> is read by at least three volunteer judges and then the top essays are then sent to a separate group of volunteer readers. Scores are then tabulated, and winners notified. The Visual Arts scoring happens similarly, however art judges are back on the UJCVP campus to view these entries.

Prizes are awarded at the UJCVP's Annual Yom HaShoah Commemoration where the first-place winners read their essays and artwork is on display. "It's seeing the kids that win present their essay and displaying their artwork," Melissa said of the most rewarding part of the competition. "And that children of all religions and ethnicities are getting involved in this and learning about the Holocaust." Marley added.

The UJCVP would like to thank everyone who has donated their time and energy to the success of the Holocaust Writing Competition over the past two decades and to those who continue to volunteer. If you would like to get involved, please


