

How a Century-Old Cemetery in Hampton Connects Jewish Community to Their Ancestors and Faith

At the Jewish Cemetery of the Virginia Peninsula, the past, present and future are all intertwined.

"We have to honor our responsibility to make a proper place for the burial of Jewish people, and their spouses, and their children," said Buddy David, president of the foundation that oversees the cemetery.

He said the cemetery was created in 1895 to meet a need within the

Jewish community at the time: a place to bury its loved ones.

"The Jews in the 1800s, they had

to have their own burial place because they weren't welcome anyplace else. And even in this cemetery, we have evolved where the rules used to be if you were not Jewish you couldn't be buried here, that's not the rule now," David said.

Kenny Murov, who helps handle burials at the cemetery, explained that the cemetery used to be split into two sides: one was Orthodox and the other was conservative.



"It's been around since the 19th century and it's had different forms and shapes," Murov said.

It was called both the Hebrew Cemetery and the Rosenbaum Cemetery until they combined in the late 1990s.

"My great-grandfather arrived in the United States around 1882. [His family] was one of the first Jewish families to settle here on the Peninsula," said Neal Rosenbaum, namesake of the Rosenbaum Cemetery said.

He said the cemetery makes him feel connected to his family.

"You can't put any value on the name that was left to you by your ancestors. It [has] more value than anything," he said.

Murov said the cemetery is significant because it reflects values important in the Jewish faith: honor, respect and ritual.

"Judaism is about a path, and it's about a path from birth to death," Murov said. "You're buried in a wooden

casket, no metal, and the idea of dust to dust that there's some contact with the earth of the casket."

Over a century after its creation, the cemetery is still frequented by people paying respects to their loved ones. Richard Gordon, who also assists with burials, said eventually he will be buried in the cemetery too.

"We have my mother and my father on this side, my aunt and uncle on the other side, so it's a two-deep gravesite, and they're amongst their friends, people that they lived with and partied with and did business with, they're all here," he said.



The cemetery is important to their legacy, and Rosenbaum said the future of this hallowed ground remains just that.

"What's the future? Just to live great lives, be healthy, raise your families, be successful in your careers," he said. "And then, ultimately, prepare for what will be the fate for all of us."



UJCVP Executive Director, Eric Maurer participated in the "Communities in Action: Building a Better Virginia" forum at the White House. He joined other local community leaders and elected officials from across the Commonwealth to meet with senior leadership of the Biden-Harris Administration at this half-day forum hosted by the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs.





Biden Releases New Plan to Tackle Antisemitism

President Joe Biden announced what he said is the most ambitious and comprehensive undertaking by the U.S. government to fight hate, bias and violence against Jews, outlining more than 100 steps the administration and its partners can take to combat an alarming rise in antisemitism.

Speaking during a videotaped address at the White House, Biden said the first U.S. National Strategy to Counter Antisemitism sends a "clear and forceful message" that "in America, evil will not win, hate will not prevail" and "the venom and violence of antisemitism will not be the story of our time."

Months in the making, the strategy has four basic goals: increasing awareness and understanding of antisemitism, including its threat to America, and broadening appreciation of Jewish American heritage; improving safety and security for Jewish communities; reversing the normalization of antisemitism and countering antisemitic discrimination; and building "cross-community" solidarity and collective action to counter hate.

Jewish organizations largely applauded the administration's effort.

"Jewish safety is inextricably linked to the safety of other communities and the health and vibrancy of our multiracial democracy," said Amy Spitalnick, CEO of the Jewish Council for Public Affairs. "As we see antisemitism and extremism increasingly normalized in our politics and our society, the urgency of this framework is even more clear."

The strategy also calls on Congress, state and local governments, tech companies and other private businesses, faith leaders and others to help combat bias and hate directed at Jews.

Tech companies are asked to establish "zero tolerance" policies against antisemitic content on their platforms. The U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum has committed to launching an education research center. Professional sports leagues and clubs are asked to use their platforms and clout to raise awareness. The White House public engagement office will invite members of the public to describe how they have supported Jewish, Muslim or other communities that are different from their own.

Doug Emhoff, who is married to Vice President Kamala Harris, said at the White House that hate crimes against Jews accounted for 63%, or nearly two-thirds, of all religiously motivated hate crimes in the United States in 2022 although Jews make up just over 2% of the overall population.

"I know the fear. I know the pain. I know the anger that Jews are living with because of this epidemic of hate," said Emhoff, the first Jewish spouse of a U.S. president

or vice president. He has become the administration's point-person on combating antisemitism.

Emhoff, formerly an entertainment lawyer in California, said he never envisioned that this issue would become "my cause" as second gentleman of the United States, " but now, more than ever, we must all rise to the challenge and meet this moment." He said the plan will save lives.

"We are committed to making sure that everyone can live openly, proudly and safely in their own communities," Emhoff said. "It's on all of us to put an end to the visceral hate we are seeing across our nation. We cannot normalize this."

In a sign of the administration's support for the strategy, Emhoff was flanked by White House domestic policy adviser Susan Rice; homeland security adviser Liz Sherwood-Randall; and Ambassador Deborah Lipstadt, the special envoy to monitor and combat antisemitism.

Harris slipped into the auditorium for a few minutes to watch her husband from the back of the room and flashed him a thumbs-up before departing.

In his videotaped remarks, Biden said hate does not go away, that it only hides until given oxygen. He recalled the deadly white supremacist rally in Charlottesville, Virginia, in 2017, and noted that the antisemitic chants by participants led him to run for president in 2020.

"Silence is complicity," the president said.

Last fall, Biden hosted a White House summit against hate-fueled violence. Emhoff led a White House discussion with Jewish community leaders last December to discuss the rise in antisemitism and how to counteract it. Days later, Biden created a government working group to develop the new strategy.

Lipstadt said the strategy's release is a "historic moment in the modern fight against what's known as the world's oldest hatred."

"For the first time, the United States government is not only acknowledging that antisemitism is not only a serious problem in this country, but laying out a clear plan to counter it," she said.

Last year, preliminary discussions began on the need for a Strategic Planning process for the UJC. We are pleased to announce that we have engaged Amy Nisenson Consulting of Richmond, VA, for the strategic planning for the UJCVP.

Many of you know Amy through her position as board president of the Jewish Federation of Richmond, or for her role in numerous Jewish organizations. Her consulting expertise includes strategic planning, board development and governance, organizational development, and resource development. She has a strong passion for the nonprofit community and Jewish organizations -- and most of her work has been done in Virginia. She believes in a hands-on collaborative team approach to strategic planning and has created over a hundred such plans. For the UJCVP project she will be joined by Nannette Shor, also a past president of the Richmond Federation. Nannette has been a passionate volunteer and longtime leader of the Jewish community. She has served on the boards of multiple Jewish organizations including Hadassah and the Richmond Jewish Foundation. She has had a career in assisting nonprofits in their development efforts.

This project will likely take 9-10 months to complete. It will require engagement and involvement of all of our members. Phase I will concentrate on research, data collection, and visioning. In order to hear all voices and value all opinions, we will request everyone's assistance at various levels -- from surveys, meetings, focus groups, or 1:1 interviews.

Please help us. This is an extraordinary opportunity to make an impact in planning for the future of our campus and our community.


