Executive Director's Message - Steven Wendell

A career spanning more than 53 years doesn't survive without great partnerships, fantastic colleagues, and a high dose of good luck. There are so many times over the years that my career could have taken different turns. And there are many times my career path led me in directions I would have never dreamed possible and afforded me opportunities that many folks don't get a chance to experience.

Ukraine is in the headlines these days as a tug of war between Russia and the West unfolds on the Ukrainian border. In the winter of 2004, I was fortunate to be part of a resident camp director, international summer staff hiring tour that traveled to Kyiv as one of our camp job fair stops. We

found ourselves in the midst of the "Orange Revolution" protesting the results of the Ukrainian Presidential

Election held that fall. This mostly peaceful protest included thousands of young demonstrators camped out in the rather "chilly" winter weather on the main streets of Kyiv. As Americans, the demonstrators were most eager to engage us in conversation about their issues. I even have an official "Orange Revolution" scarf given to me as a gift from a demonstrator. It was fascinating and

very informative to be able to interact in real time with participants during this historic event and learn about Ukraine and its issues from their perspective.

From Kyiv, we traveled to Moscow for a camp hiring fair there. I was overwhelmed by the beauty and cleanliness of the Moscow subways.

Just going down the long, steep escalators was like taking a slow ride on a roller coaster, and almost as scary. And I also took away a bit of the feeling of what it must be like to live in a country where your every move is being watched. We were never without our special "government chaperone" wherever we went.

Over the years that I worked in resident camping, I was fortunate enough to be able to attend

many international camp hiring fairs, including trips to Warsaw, Krakow, Dublin, Belfast, Glasgow, Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Auckland, London, Manchester, and Amsterdam. Hiring international staff for US resident camps was, and remains even today, a big business. And of course for our



The ABGS of PJ Library

A - ABOUT

PJ Library is a program of the Harold Grinspoon Foundation, a North American Jewish non-profit organization based in Agawam, Massachusetts. It was created in December 2005 as a Jewish en-

gagement and literacy program for Jewish families with young children. PJ Library is modeled after Dolly Parton's Imagination Library program. PJ Library sends out free Jewish children's books to families "with Judaism as part of their lives" by monthly subscription. The UJCVP has been a partner in distributing these books since about 2008, allowing 200+ families the opportunity to learn together and celebrate our heritage through monthly bedtime stories. While PJ never charges families for their books, we have been very fortunate to have the Eugene M.

and Betty N. Levin Philanthropic Fund generously step in from day one to provide for our community's children.

B-BOOKS

PJ Library selects both classic works like Hershel and the Hanukkah Goblins and Hillel Builds a House and more modern titles such as Bubbe's Belated Bat Mitzvah and Queen of the Hanukkah Dosas, which explore more contemporary and blended families. PJ Library sends more than 220,000 books to kids aged 6 months through 8.5 years in the USA and Canada each month. At 9 years old, tweens are invited to join PJ Our Way, a choose your own book program. Over 30 tweens on the Peninsula are currently selecting their own



chapter book each month. These paperbacks range from works of fantasy and contemporary to historical fiction and biographies. Tweens are also given the opportunity to suggest titles and provide reviews in their online selection portal. PJ Library has even gone as far as providing parents with books, sometimes a holiday guide and sometimes a choice of biography or memoir. With over 670 titles (not including PJ Our Way) and even more not yet in circulation, PJ Library will continue to provide Peninsula kids book for years to come.

C - COMMUNITY

In addition to books, PJ Library strives to connect families to their local Jewish communities. Here on the Peninsula, that means PJ Library events for all our UJCVP families and PJ Our Way (PJOW) events for our 4th-7th graders. We strive to offer an event for each age group monthly. PJ Library has met at the pool, different parks, Home Depot in Williamsburg, and of course on Zoom. Recently, we have started a PJ Library of the Virginia Peninsula Facebook group to allow parents to connect with each on their own schedule. PJOW is a bit different; this youth group enjoys activities like trips to the planetarium and movies, cooking and fashion competitions, and even had zoom talent shows and scavenger hunts during the pandemic. Most recently, tweens made s'mores and had a karaoke party that channeled the best of the 1990 Bar Mitzvah scene. Upcoming events include the Community Purim Carnival on 3/20 and A Pre-Passover Find the Frog hunt on 4/3!





The response was incredible, and that generosity allowed us to build a state-of-the-art ropes course and climbing tower, upgrade our basketball court, create nature trails and install bird cameras, hire a professional camp art instructor, and install an outdoor recreational canopy. 

The idea behind the committee is gathering and presenting to the board the required data and information


needed to explore a community aquatic asset as part of our UJC


campus and programming.

Her presentation is on Thursday, March 17 at 12:20 on MCM 101 and will be on Zoom.




The Virginia Peninsula Jewish Film Festival's Winter Series continues on Sunday, March 6th and Sunday March 27th.





Celebrate Purim With These Unique Hamentaschen Recipes

Pizza Hamentaschen Makes 20-24 hamentaschen

For the dough:

- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 4 oz butter
- 1 egg yolk1 tbs sour cream/yogurt
- 1 tsp kosher salt
- 1/2 tsp sugar
- 1/3 cup cold water
- 1 tbs white vinegar

For the filling:

- 1/2 cup marinara sauce
- 1/2 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese

Preparation:

- 1. In a food processor pulse flour, butter, egg yolk, sour cream, salt, and sugar until a coarse meal is formed. With machine running, add water and vinegar, a bit at a time, until dough pulls together.
- 2. Turn dough out onto counter and knead a few turns to combine. Flatten into a disk and wrap in plastic or parchment paper and refrigerate for at least 1 hour or for up to 2 days.

Assembly:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper.
- 2. Roll dough out to quarter-inch thickness. Cut dough into 3-inch circles. Spoon sauce into center.
- 3. Sprinkle cheeses over sauce.
- 4. Brush edges with egg wash and fold over into a triangle, seal tightly, be sure corners are firmly pressed together. Place hamantaschen on prepared pan and leave about 2 inches between for dough to expand.
- 5. Bake at 350°F for 30 minutes, or until golden brown.

Gluten-Free, Sugar-Free Hamentaschen Makés 20-24 hamentaschen

For the dough:

- 1 cup (110 g) cashews
- 1 egg
- 1 cup (95 g) almond flourpinch of sea salt
- 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 3 tbs (45 ml) sugar-free maple
- 1/4 cup (28 g) coconut flour



For berry filling:

- 1 cup (140 g) frozen or fresh raspberries
- 1/4 cup (60 g) coconut palm sugar
- 1/2 lemon, juiced

For apricot filling:

- 1/2 cup (160 g) fruit-sweetened apricot preserves
- 1 tbs (8 g) poppy seeds

Directions:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. To make the dough, place the cashews in a food processor or blender and pulse until you have a "flour." Add in egg, almond flour, salt, baking soda and maple syrup. Blend until all ingredients are well combined and form a dough.
- 2. Spoon the dough onto a piece of parchment paper and begin sprinkling in the coconut flour, 1 tbs at a time. The dough will be sticky to start, but the coconut flour will take care of this. Once the stickiness is gone, roll out the dough between two pieces of parchment paper until it is about 1/4 inch thick. Use a drinking glass or round cookie cutter to cut circles out of the dough. Set the circles aside.
- 3. To make the berry filling combine the raspberries, sugar and lemon juice in a small saucepan over medium heat. Mash the fruit until it is soft and combines well with the sugar. Allow the mixture to simmer for about 8 mins or until it thickens and reduces. To make the apricot filling, combine the preserves with the poppy seeds and stir well.
- 4. Next, assemble the cookies by taking one dough circle and placing a dollop of filling in the center; do not overfill. Fold the circle into thirds, sealing off the edges until a triangular shape is formed. Make sure you pinch the seams closed, or they can reopen while baking. Repeat until all of the dough is used. Place cookies on a parchment-lined baking sheet and bake for 10 mins. Remove from the oven and allow to cool slightly before serving.
