Executive Director's Message - Steven Wendell

A Bright September Day

It's 5:15 am and the alarm goes off as usual to wake Charlene and me for our daily commute to work from our home in Connecticut to Manhattan. We need to be at the Bridgeport Metro North train station to catch the 6:40 express train to Grand Central. If we miss that train, we'll have to take a local train and most likely not get a seat together.

From Grand Central, Charlene walks the 15 blocks south to her JCCA office on 27th Street and I use the underground tunnels to the north exit of Grand Central and walk (when the weather is good) the 20 blocks to my Young Judaea office on the 7th floor of the Hadassah Building on 58th Street. On this sunny and cool early fall day, the walk is both pleasant and great exercise. And everyone I encounter on the crowded streets of Manhattan seems to be sharing in the good mood that the great weather can inspire.

It's Tuesday, September 11, 2001.

By 8:20 that morning I'm settled in my office with my coffee catching up on emails and scheduled tasks for the day in my role as Director of American Programs for National Young Judaea, the (at that time) youth division of Hadassah. A half hour into my workday a colleague comes into my office and asks: "Is Adam OK?" Adam is my son and the colleague, Rob, is a high school friend of Adam from our years in Pittsburgh. My puzzled response to Rob: "Sure, why would you ask?" Rob's responds: "Isn't his train stop for his commute from New Jersey the World Trade Center?" To which I respond: "Yes, why?" And Rob says: "Don't you know what's going on? They say a small plane from Boston hit the North Tower a few minutes ago."

Keep in mind that while we did have technology twenty years ago, instant communication as we know it today was not yet a fine art. So I didn't get news alerts from an app on my phone, and I wasn't tuned into a news channel on my computer. So a "small plane" hitting the World Trade Center at 8:46 am did not immediately catch my attention. Not fully trusting what I heard, I walked to our conference room to check the TV for any news. A half dozen folks had already congregated around the TV. And

as I stood there watching the smoke and fire from the North Tower in amazement, at 9:03 am, live on the TV, we saw the second plane hit the South Tower exploding in a massive fireball.



Now the panic set in. My son, Adam, did indeed commute each morning to his first career job as a recent graduate of NYU Law School at a Wall Street law firm. And the closest train stop to his office was the underground train platforms at the World Trade Center.

Before all the phone and internet service went down, Charlene was able to make contact with Adam and learned that after his wife, Sarah, dropped him off at the train that morning about 8:45 for his short commute under the Hudson River from Jersey City to Manhattan, she called him as he was boarding his train and told him that she just heard something was going on at the World Trade Center and he might want to get off the train a stop before and walk to avoid the problem. Adam exited the train at the Wall Street stop, the one before the World Trade Center. As he came up from the underground station, he saw and heard what he described as: "All hell breaking loose." He turned and ran down the station steps jumping on a departing train headed back to New Jersey. It turned out to be the last train out before they closed all the tunnels and bridges to and from



Between the collapse of the South Tower and North Tower, the FBI informed us that all buildings associated with Jewish institutions needed to be immediately evacuated because of a

"credible threat" that we could be targeted. That morning, Charlene had taken the subway to a meeting at the Jewish National Fund building on 68th Street. I still had spotty cell service and was able to contact Charlene and arrange to meet her on the corner of 58th Street and 5th Avenue. From there, we would walk down to the north tunnel entrance to Grand Central at 48th Street and wait for the Station to reopen. That walk down 5th Avenue was surreal. The only traffic consisted of emergency vehicles heading south with their sirens blaring. And nearly all the pedestrians were heading north, some covered with grey soot looking dazed.

After waiting anxiously at the locked entrance to the North tunnels for what seemed like an eternity, an attendant open the door and I grabbed Charlene's hand and we ran toward the Metro North platforms hoping for a track announcement for a Bridgeport, CT train. We were one of the first people to get on the train. And as we sat there for about an hour, the train filled with people many of whom were bloodied and covered with ash. A first aid area was set up on the platform to treat those needing medical attention. As we sat on the train, underground at Grand Central, with no communication to the outside world, I turned to Charlene and commented: "I'm not so sure this is a good idea to be sitting on this train at this place. Maybe we made the wrong decision." But what alternative did we have?

We finally did leave Grand Central and as the train exited the underground tunnels at 125th Street, our eyes struggled to refocus from the dark tunnel to the bright light of the sun shining against the clear blue sky.

As the magnitude of the destruction and loss of life from the terror attacks of that day, Tuesday, September 11, 2001, began to be fully understood, Charlene and I, and our family realized how lucky we were. Adam didn't talk much about his close encounter. But soon after, when the opportunity presented itself, he took a new job with a smaller law firm in New Jersey. He said he wanted to be closer to home.

Much is written about this year's 20th anniversary of 9/11. A whole generation has grown up post 9/11. I'm not sure Charlene and I could run through those Grand Central tunnels today as fast as we did then... well maybe Charlene still can. It seems a very long time ago. But that day will forever be a significant marker in our lives and the history of our country and the world. My family was fortunate that Tuesday in early September. The families of nearly 3,000 others were not so fortunate. Perhaps a lesson from that day is how fragile even the greatest things man can build really are and how quickly our world can turn to dust.



THE RISING TIDE OPEN WATERS NETWORK

Our Newport News Jewish Community is part of the Rising Tide Consortium of 27 communities in the United States, England, Israel, Canada, and Australia of existing, emerging, and aspiring members.

Mayyim Hayyim, the brainchild of *The Red Tent* author Anita Diamant (in Boston), created this kind of pluralistic Mikveh, making immersions more accessible to men, women, and children, both for traditional use as well as many, many spiritual uses. It is available to the Jewish Community for the affiliated and non-affiliated for traditional purposes as well as celebrating a joyful moment, making a transition, or dealing with a difficult situation.

Carrie Bornstein of Mayyim Hayyim stated, "We need to explain what this Mikveh is, and how it has the potential to change a community... I can see so clearly from my vantage point in Boston, that we are a different city because of Mayyim Hayyim. It fosters a respect and a sense of pluralism in the community - a Jewish identity that has a strong grounding."



Saturday, November 6, 2021 at 7pm Aulcie 2020, 1h 15min

Aulcie tells the story of Aulcie Perry, an African American basketball player, who, after being the last one cut by the New York Knicks, embarked on a career with Maccabi Tel Aviv, where he became an Israeli athletic and cultural superstar. After leading his team to an upset win in the European Championship, Perry converted to Judaism and became an Israeli citizen. Rather than the racism he experienced in the United States, in Israel, he found a place where he was judged by the content of his character and not the color of his skin.

Aulcie's rise to fame was precipitous, and his relationship with supermodel Tami Ben Ami became the subject of relentless media attention. However, chronic knee pain culminated in drug addiction that led to his arrest and imprisonment in the US. Since his release he has committed himself to uplifting those suffering from drug abuse and addiction. Today, he teaches youth basketball and is still warmly received by appreciative fans in his adopted home. This inspiring film tells the story of a remarkable athlete who captured the spirit of a nation, triumphant and victorious against all odds.



Sunday, November 7, 2021 at 2pm When Hitler Stole Pink Rabbit 2019, 1h 59min

In 1933 in Berlin, Anna is only nine years old when her life changes from the ground up. Her father, a harsh critic of the Nazi government, learns that he is on an enemies list and that his passport will be confiscated and, as a result, must flee to Zurich. His family, Anna, her twelve-year-old brother, and her mother, follow him shortly thereafter. Anna must leave everything behind, including her beloved pink rabbit, and face a new life full of challenges and privations abroad. As the wave of antisemitism spreads across Europe, the family travels to France before settling in England.

This is a Holocaust era film that focuses on facing obstacles and gaining hope from connecting with family and holding Jewish values as a means of surviving and ultimately, thriving.


