Executive Director's Message - Steven Wendell

Introducing our returning Jewish Family Services Director

This past May, in this Newsletter space, I noted that the UJC's Family Services Department was evolving from a division of the Tidewater JFS into a full department of the UJCVP and a member of the Network of Jewish Human Service Agencies. The timing of this transition, which was a collaborative decision between the UJCVP and Tidewater JFS, was precipitated by the resignation of Libby Batten, the social worker assigned to the Peninsula through Tidewater for the past decade, to enable her to focus on the health challenges of her spouse. At the critical time of the transition, with the pandemic adding to the need for family services, we were fortunate to welcome Joseph Hendrix aboard as our first director of this new fully UJC department. Unfortunately for us, but an opportunity for Joseph, a sensitive project that he had collaborated on during his MSW studies requires his unexpected and immediate attention causing Joseph to have given us notice of his need to leave our employ at the end of July.

While we are sorry to see Joseph go after only a short, but productive tenure, as sometimes happens, challenging situations can turn into positive opportunities. With her spouse having made very positive progress in his recovery from health issues, Libby Batten has become available to return to the UJC as our director of the newly transitioned UJCVP Jewish Family Services. Although she has been with our community for a decade and her presence is well known to many of us, I want to take this opportunity to reintroduce Libby now as a "new" employee of the UJC and welcome her "home."

Libby holds a BS in Psychology from Campbell University and an MSW from Norfolk State University. Prior to employ as a Clinical Social Worker and Case Manager

for Tidewater JFS in the fall of 2012, Libby was an In-home Counselor for Family Preservation Services in Norfolk and a Therapeutic Day Treatment Counselor for Family Preservation Services in Hampton. Libby also served as a Medical Social Worker for Heartland Home Care and Hospice in Norfolk. Libby's social work career has included counseling and case work services for pre-school children through seniors, providing psychosocial care regarding economic, social, and emotional needs for individuals and families in a wide variety of settings. During her decade of experience with our community, Libby has developed a strong relationship with both individual clients and UJC programs including Grand Club whose participants were nearly as excited to see her return as Libby was excited and thrilled to be back on the UJC Campus.

Libby is looking forward to working again with the UJC staff and volunteers under the leadership of Elaine Abrams, Chair of the newly formed Social Services Committee, in helping shape the direction of our independent Jewish Family Services on the Peninsula.

President's Message - Kelli Caplan



Sometimes, you have an intersection with a person that is unexpected, wonderful and thought provoking. This recently happened to me. I needed to get my picture professionally taken. After asking around, I was told to definitely use a photographer named Alexander Kravets.

I knew a little about his back story, as I had heard bits and pieces of it over the years. Alexander and his family were among the more than 100 Russian Jews that the UJC sponsored in 1990 and 1991 and welcomed to the Peninsula. That's all I knew. That happened several years before I moved to Newport News so my knowledge was very limited.

During my photo shoot with Alexander, we began talking.



I told him of my connection to the UJC and that opened up a dialogue that proved to be both educational and heartwarming. He told me about coming to America, and specifically to Newport News. He had no idea where he was going, and ended up in a city completely foreign to him. From Russia to Virginia, with limited English and small children. He and the others came to escape persecution in Russia.

The UJC welcomed them with open arms, helping them find housing, employment and temples in which to worship.

Alexander and his family settled into their new home. The transition was not always easy, but it proved to be worthwhile. The Virginia Peninsula became their home, and they embraced it. Alexander told me how much he loves living

near the water and how at home he feels in Virginia. He and his wife raised their children here and he started a very successful business from scratch.

What was abundantly clear from our conversation was just how appreciative he was, and still is, of the UJC and his family's sponsor, Carmela Malkin-Kuhn & Adath Jeshurun Synagogue. His connection to Carmela and her late husband, Chris, runs incredibly deep. He could not say enough about them and all they did for him and his family, both in the early days and in later years. A bond was formed, one that means the world to Alexander and his family.

It was incredibly interesting listening to Alexander talk about his experience, and how his family's life was forever changed for the better. He will be the first to tell you he could never imagine being as lucky as he was to land in this community.

Yes, more than 30 years have passed since the Russian families made their way to Virginia. But hearing Alexander's account and immense gratitude made me so proud to be part of the UJC, proud of what we have done in the past, and proud of what we are continuing to do. It drove home to me just how dynamic this organization is, and what a huge lasting impact it has on so many. I left Alexander's studio with a huge smile that day, filled with pride, knowing that the UJC community may be small, but is enormous in heart, and second to none in dedication and commitment to our members.

Thank you, Alexander, for reminding me just how remarkable the UCJVP truly is.

Thursday, September 2nd at 7:30 pm **Syrian Leek Fritters**

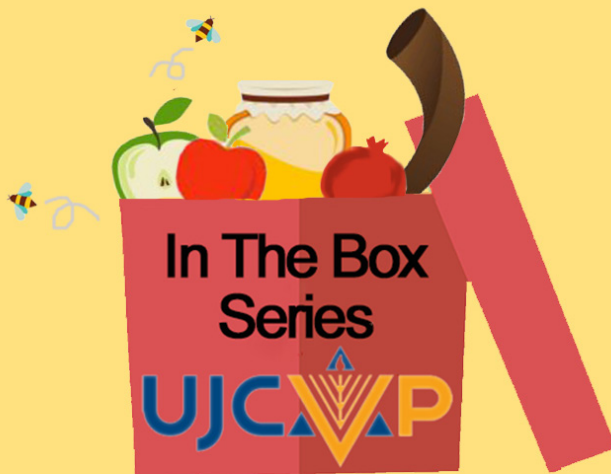
Cooking instructor and caterer, Sylvia Fallas will share her grandmother's recipe for Syrian leek fritters, a specialty for the Jewish new year.

Because... *We're always reaching higher!*

Standing still is moving backwards. The UJCVP is a community that has embraced this notion for decades, understanding that forward momentum is vital to future success and viability. In order to be the best small Jewish community possible, we reach higher, whether it's for early childhood, Jewish Family Service, programming, seniors, education, camp, and so much more. Reaching higher can be exciting and scary at the same time, like when we purchased and installed a brand new ropes course for Camp Chaverim this summer. We had a strong sense that this was the right move in the context of a plan to build a Jewish day camp that will be successful for the coming decades. None of us knew how to manage ropes course activities. We knew there would be a learning curve and a lot of effort by staff and volunteers, and we were right! Before camp started ten staff members and volunteers spent three full days on apparatus and team building training. UJCVP Executive Board Member Mike Stupar, who participated in

this training reports that, "the training was phenomenal. It encouraged me and others to venture beyond our comfort zones. The team building and comradery really exemplified how all of us can reach new heights when we work together." This was enough to get us off to a resounding start knowing that more training will be useful. As camp started, we jumped into the ropes course realm and provided our campers with this transformational opportunity to challenge themselves physically and emotionally, with all of the right safety and encouragement. Ask any of our older campers (ages ten and up) what their favorite part of camp was this summer and many of them will enthusiastically say, "the ropes course!" This community leapt forward and reached higher.

We never take a step forward without your help, and the support of the UJCVP Annual Campaign. As we gear up with plans to implement our 2022 Annual Campaign, we do so with gratitude towards all of you who step up and step forward with us. Because... We can't do it without you!

UJCVP ENDOWMENT

In 2014 our UJCVP Endowment Board of Trustees made the challenging decision to discontinue our partnership with The Tidewater Jewish Foundation, in order to manage and steward our community's legacy assets with an in house perspective. There has been no turning back and no regrets as we grow the assets of the UJCVP as well as our custodial partners, Rodef Sholom Temple, Congregation Emet V'Or, the Jewish Cemetery of The Virginia Peninsula, and the Peninsula Jewish Historical Society. Indeed, since 2014 the UJCVP Endowment total managed assets have increased by 50%!

Funds housed and managed by our Endowment benefit our community in so many ways, and lay the foundation for a legacy that will insure the health of our community for years to come. Yet, even our positive growth does not mean that we are "all set." Besides custodial management, we manage

Donor Advised Funds, Program Specific Funds and Annual Campaign Endowment Funds. What we call our "unrestricted Endowment Fund," resources that can be used at the discretion of the Board of Trustees to fund community projects and needs, is quite small relative to our total asset. Our Unrestricted fund is fueled by bequest giving along with Endowment management fees. Bequest giving to nonprofit agencies continues to be the most significant kind of planned giving in the United States. Leaving a bequest either through a specific amount, specific asset, or percentage of asset, is an excellent way to make magic with your legacy and help fund our unrestricted pool that is so important to the future of our community.

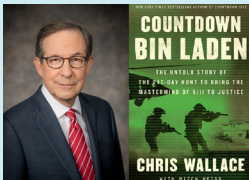

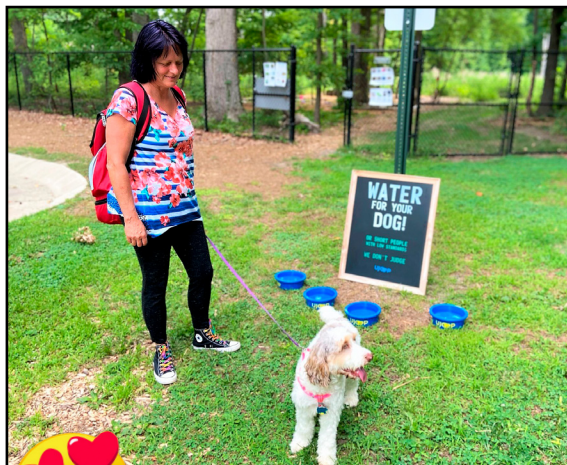

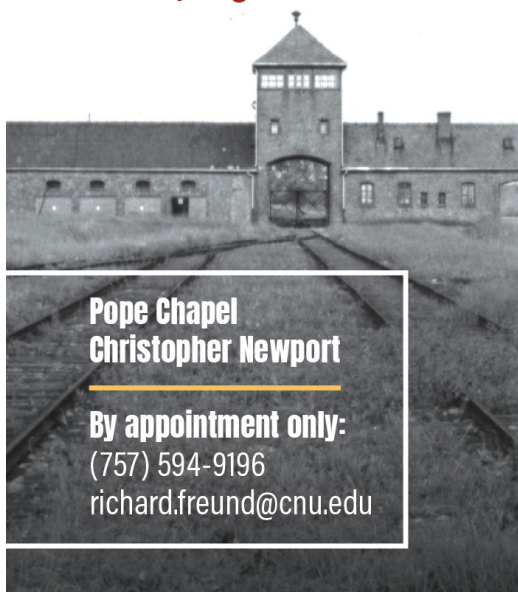

Treat your loved ones to these buttery, super comforting apple oat bars. They will love you for it (even more so than they already do). Vegan and gluten-free!

Ingredients for the Apples:

1 tbsp coconut oil
4 medium apples, peeled, cored & diced
2/3 c brown sugar
juice of 1 lemon
1/2 tsp cinnamon

Ingredients for the Crust:

1 c rolled oats
1 c all-purpose flour (or gluten free 1-to-1 baking flour)
1 c almond meal
1/2 c brown sugar
1/2 tsp cinnamon (optional)
1/4 tsp salt
2/3 c coconut oil, at room temp.

Directions:

1. Grease an 8x8 inch square baking dish (or line it with parchment paper) & pre-heat oven to 375F.
2. To prepare apples, melt coconut oil in skillet. Add apples & brown sugar, cook over medium heat for 10 mins, stirring often. Add lemon juice & cinnamon, continue cooking 3-4 mins, until tender & caramelized. Set aside to cook.
3. To prepare crust, combine oats, flour, almond meal, brown sugar, cinnamon (optional) & salt in med. bowl & mix well. Add coconut oil & work it in, using your hands, to form a crumbly dough.
4. Reserve 1/4 c dough, press remaining dough into baking dish. Add cooked apples & crumble reserved dough on top.
5. Bake for 35-40 mins, until top is golden brown. Let cool completely before cutting.
