





Gary's children were dressed in uniform and off to school. We are prayerful for the schools in Montrouis to keep operating and that the students are protected as they go and come from school.

In the current system to be able to drive on most of the roads outside of Montrouis, you have to purchase a pass from the gang members. These passes allow you through the gang checkpoints. They work most of the time unless you get stopped by a different gang than the pass you hold, the thugs at the checkpoints want the items you have, they think your kidnapping would raise a good ransom or just pure evil.

When we were explained the new process, a truth was revealed to us. The free gift of Jesus Christ, His love and compassion, is what we have to share with Haiti. We share the Gospel with our words and we share His compassion with our actions.

This week we rented two homes for families one had left their community previously due to a turf battle and the other was a widow from a vehicle accident. We are providing food assistance to more than a dozen individuals and families. We are providing 24/7 care for seven elderly and one disabled young adult that has nowhere else to turn in this season of their life. We are helping students attend school and supporting schools that can stay open. We are continuing to partner with the local church to empower the spreading of God's Word.

The current journey is not easy and God has placed us in Montrouis Haiti. The ministry looks different as security and needs change, but we press forward. We covet your prayers for the Nation of Haiti and the ministry of Supply and Multiply.

This happened 55 miles from our city!

"One of our security guards was severely beaten and kidnapped. They took \$4700 worth of food we were planning to distribute in our village and they totally ransacked our place. They took equipment solar from container and every piece of furniture from every structure in the compound. They took our two trucks and everything in our clinic. They have terrorized our village and people have left their homes and run to various other places for safety." (We have removed the city and mission name from the quote for their protection.)

We have attached a video link of a school in Haiti. It is emotionally overwhelming to watch. There is no blood or death, but there is gunfire. We are sharing it with you to help people see the level of unrest in Haiti. A fellow missionary said, "When I saw this the other day, I was trying to guess which neighborhood it was in. And then I got even more sad when I realized there was an entire list of possibilities." Right now in Montrouis Haiti, as you can see by the photos, some of our schools functioning. That is that, as we can not tell you what tomorrow may bring. We are prayerful that the gangs stay at our border, but not in our city. Sadly, this has become the new normal for so many. This is the reality for students and if it is not your current reality, you live in fear that you could be next.
