### <u>RECIPE — Strawberry-Buttermilk</u> <u>Cobbler</u>

5 C. hulled fresh strawberries halved
1 C. + 1 Tbls. Flour (divided)
1/3 C. + 2 Tbls. Sugar (divided)
1/2 C. fine almond flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp fine sea salt
6 Tbls. Cold unsalted butter
3/4 C. whole buttermilk
2 Tbls. Turbinado (darker & less fine) sugar

Whipped Cream or vanilla ice cream



Preheat oven to 375° F. Toss strawberries,
 1 Tbls. flour, 2 Tbls. Sugar in square 9" baking dish. Set aside.

2. Stir together almond flour, baking powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, remaining 1 C. flour mixture. Toss together spelt flour mix and butter. Gradually add buttermilk, mixing with fingers until ingredients are just moistened. Shape dough evenly into 6 (1/2 " thick) patties. Arrange patties evenly on strawberry mixture in

baking dish; sprinkle with turbinado sugar.
Bake in preheated oven until topping is golden brown, 35-40 minutes. Let cool slightly, about 20 minutes. Serve warm with whip or ice cream.

#### According to CBS News, the Postal Service is in need of urgent help as a direct result of the Covid-19

crisis. Based on a number of briefings and warnings this week about a critical fall-off in mail across the country, it has become clear that the Postal Service will not survive the summer

without immediate help from Congress and the White House, and could possible close down by down by June. Every community in America relies on the Postal Service to deliver vital goods and services, including life-saving medications. The lawmakers noted that postal workers delivered more than one billion shipments of prescription drugs last year; ceasing operations during the outbreak could have dire consequences for the health of people around the country.
