Autumn Show

Saturday 14th September at 2pm in Banstead Community Hall

The team that helps set up the shows is fairly small, and if anyone can spare some time on a Friday evening from 7.00pm we would be grateful. Set up for the Autumn show starts at 6.30pm on Friday 13th.

There is a new class (4) open to all. If you do not have enough vegetables, flowers or fruit to make up an entry here is your chance! Details are on the top of page 21 of the schedule but if you have any questions please contact the show secretary.

The Banstead Gardeners Challenge

is for a collection of 3 vegetables to be staged on a tray or board 45 x 60cm (18 x 24 in). A black cloth may be used, and the tray may be painted. No accessories such as onion rings plates etc are allowed, but a garnish of parsley is. Three of the following vegetables must be displayed with the amount in brackets: Carrots (3), cauliflower (2), onions (3) parsnips (3) peas (6 pods), potatoes (3), runner beans (6 pods), tomatoes (6), French beans (6 pods), sweet corn (2), peppers (3), cucumbers (2), courgettes (3) red beet (3) aubergines (2). Each type of vegetable is judged out of a total of 24 points, size, shape and colour 7, condition 7, uniformity 6.

Class 88. Flower arrangers, do not forget to contact the assistant show secretary to obtain the intriguing accessories for this challenge.

Fees and Subscriptions

There is never a good time to raise entry and membership fees, especially after the difficult year in the economy. However, due to the increase in costs this year in running the shows, cost of stationary, hire, judges expenses and sundry, the Committee has decided that the cost of membership will rise to £6 per person, with joint membership will rise to £11. If there is a third adult in the household, the fee will be an extra £5. Children under 16 remain free.

The charge for postal delivery of the Bulletin, will rise from £3 to £5 per year. The rapid rise in stamp prices has made this change necessary.

Entry fees are increased for members and non-members as follows:

Coffee mornings – members £2, non-members £3 Afternoon teas – members £3, non-members £5 Evening lectures – members £2, non-members £5 Shows – members free, non-members £4

Special events – members £5
