This popular event will be accompanied by stands from many local organisations including Banstead Village Residents

Banstead Commons Conservators, the Alpine Society, two groups promoting bonsai trees, the Woodland Trust, the British Trust for Ornithology, and Valley Art.

Desirable Dandelions

This spring has been marked by a plague of dandelions but perhaps they do have a place in the border as can be seen in this photo from Sally Keywood-Gray.

Did you know that the taproot of a dandelion can help to fertilise the soil by pulling calcium and other nutrients from deep in the ground making them available for other plants? The tough, wide-spreading roots can also aid in soil aeration. And don't forget they are highly nutritious, containing potent antioxidants.



Banstead Wildlife Field

On the 12th March, while the crocuses were in full bloom, Broad Leaf Tress Services came in to make over the felled tree into a teaching area and raised bed.









We had an excellent lecture by Jim Arbury from the Royal Horticultural Society at Wisley on fruit growing with an emphasis on pruning. Jim accompanied the talk with some great pictures to demonstrate how to renovate older trees as well. It was well received, and Jim answered many of your questions at the end of the talk.
