### SPECIAL TOWN MEETING CALLED FOR PURCHASE OF A BEACH

The Board of Selectmen have called a Special Town Meeting for Saturday, November 19, to see if residents support a proposed \$500,000 purchase of a beach and five acres of land at Camp Alton.

The Board planned the meeting after it received a petition signed by 58 residents of the town calling for the special meeting to allow the residents to decide the question.

The Trust for Public Lands, which holds an option to purchase the 60-acre Camp Alton on Lake Winnipesaukee for \$2.5 million, has been working with the Cooperative Extension Service 4-H program to develop a plan for use of the property, which is located off Roberts Cove Road in East Alton.

TPL's option expires in December.

The purchase by the town would be contingent on the state providing \$2 million to purchase the remaining 55 acres of the camp, including the existing buildings.

### DR. CARL F. HESSE IS INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT

The SAU 51 Board recently announced the appointment of Dr. Carl F. Hesse as interim superintendent. Formerly the superintendent of the Kingswood Regional School District from 1987 to 1991, Hesse began his duties on September 6 and expects to remain in the position until no later than February 1 while the search for a permanent superintendent continues. He most recently served as interim superintendent for six months in Claremont.

Hesse will oversee the daily operations of the school districts of Alton, Barnstead and Pittsfield and assist the SAU Board in their search for a new superintendent.

"What you have to do is identify the challenges and work on them and make the whole process work smoothly so that the new person who comes in will have the right information to meet the needs of the districts," Hesse said recently.

He replaces Dr. Elaine Brigman who resigned September 1.



### **UNITED ASSOCIATIONS HONOR STONE**



### **HUNTING SEASONS OPEN**

October is one of my favorite months to be outdoors. The temperatures make it a great time to be outside and do some

Small game season opens October 1 for woodcock, ruffed grouse, pheasant, grey squirrel, fox, cottontail rabbit, snowshoe hare, and raccoon. Be sure to check specific regulations in the NH

Migratory game birds, ducks, and geese may be hunted beginning October 6. Ducks in the inland zone may be hunted until the 29th, with a second season from November 19 to December 4. Geese may be hunted October 6 to December 14. Duck numbers are on the rise so the hunting should be good. A flock of 15 Canada Geese have been sighted feeding in a field in Alton.

The muzzle loader deer season starts October 22 and runs

through November 1.

The most exciting part of October for me this year is October 15 to 23 when the moose season runs. Not everyone can participate since it is a lottery system. I was finally chosen this year and have been preparing ever since I received my notice. Only a certain number of hunters are allowed in each "hunting unit". The unit I was assigned to is in the Plymouth area. Since I didn't know that area, my hunting partner, my wife, and I have been scouting there at least one day a week.

We have taken pictures of three different moose, identified various moose by their tracks, found travel zones, found a "dropped" moose antier and had some close encounters with deer and bear. We have talked with foresters, berry pickers, locals and loggers. Now all we have to do is see one within range when the

season opens.

### EDUCATION IN ALTON 1750-1900 PART IV

Reading, writing and arithmetic in one room. During the end of the 1800's, many of the school districts were moved or consolidated and renovated. Fourteen women and one man were hired as teachers. The school terms consisted of a fall and spring term of 14 weeks each. There still weren't any laws concerning school attendance so that many pupils were kept at home to help on the farms.

"In 1894, the Superintendent of the districts was Oliver J.M. Gilman. The other members of the committee were Nathaniel Stevens and Dr. Phineas H. Wheeler."

Finally, it became necessary for all concerned to close some districts and combine some to save money and to increase the educational opportunities for all the children. Gradually, the number of districts were decreased and by the 1890's, there were only 10 school districts.


"The Bennett and the Lang schools were merged with the Village school and George H. Moses came to teach at the Village school. He later distinguished himself by becoming a United States Senator from New Hampshire, serving from 1918 to 1933."

The consolidation of schools continued under the supervision of David H. Morrison, Phineas H. Wheeler, and Darwin Wheeler, members of the Board of Education. They also increased the school term by three or four weeks and more money was appropriated. This was the beginning of an important change in the education of Alton students.

During this time no consideration had been made for the pupils who wanted to go to high school. Children whose parents could afford the expense sent them to either Farmington or Pittsfield. In 1900, Isaac Copp, one of the two teachers employed by the town, became concerned about these pupils and their need for a secondary school. He started a trial school which was recognized by the N.H. State Commissioner of Education and is now known as Alton High School.

When we think back to the education of the children in the early days in Alton, we can understand how proud these citizens of 1896 were of their many changes, particularly the education of their children. In fact, at the Centennial Celebration of Alton in 1896, special programs were held by the school children to celebrate these accomplishments!


