SPECIAL TOWN MEETING TO CONSIDER COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT QUESTION OF TOWN BEACH ON HOLD

A special Town Meeting is scheduled for 1p.m. on Saturday, November 19, to consider a collective bargaining agreement between the Selectmen and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, Local 534. An earlier plan to include a question on the purchase of property at Camp Alton for a town beach has been postponed.

The collective bargaining agreement calls for retroactive pay increases of 10 cents per hour for 1993 and 20 cents per hour for 1994 with a projected raise of 30 cents per hour in 1995. The possibility of merit increases of two to four percent is also planned for 1995. Union members will have to pay 10 percent of the health insurance and accept a health plan with an increased deductible.

The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend the article which requires a majority vote.

The plan for a town beach was sidelined recently when it was announced that an anonymous donor offered to pay one third of the \$2.5 million cost if the state purchased the entire Camp Alton site. Should the state buy the entire parcel, the beach would become a state beach rather than a town beach.

Selectmen then decided to wait until the state makes a decision before taking any action. According to Town Administrator Scott Dunn, the Camp Alton issue can be put to a vote at the 1995 town meeting if necessary.

The November meeting will take place in the Alton Central School Gymnasium. Voters will be required to check in and receive a voting card prior to the meeting.

While in Claremont, Marshall was a lieutenant on the Police Department where he has served for the past 11 years. He is a graduate of Northeastern University in Boston and holds a B.S. degree in criminal justice. He is currently attending Plymouth State College where he is working on a master's degree in business administration.

In addition to his studies, Marshall enjoys being a father and husband and is very involved in the Police Explorer program for youth. He is also an advocate of community policing and a firm believer in having police officers "role up their shirt sleeves and get involved in the neighborhoods".

Marshall and his wife, Karen, have two daughters. Moriah, ine, and Ariel, six.

ALTON HIGH SCHOOL SENIOR HONORED BY NATIONAL MERIT PROGRAM

Dakota S. Benedetto, a senior at Alton High School, has been named a Commended Student in the 1995 National Merit Scholarship Program, according to School Principal George J. Rogers, who will present a Letter of Commendation to her from the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

About 35,000 Commended Students throughout the nation are being honored for their exceptional academic promise. They placed among the top five percent of more than a million students who entered the 1995 Merit Program by taking the 1993 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. Although the qualifying test scores of Commended Students are outstanding, they are slightly below the level required to continue in the competition for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1995.

A Merit Program spokesperson commented, "It is important to acknowledge the attainments of academically talented students and to credit schools for the key role they play in their development. We hope the recognition received by able young men and women who are commended in this rigorous, nationwide competition will encourage them to take advantage of their opportunities for higher education and to diligently pursue their professional goals. The nation will benefit from the full development of this precious intellectual resource."

MIDDLE SCHOOL PROJECT SUPPORTED BY PTCO

The Alton PTCO has voted to support two middle school environmental projects with the purchase of a computer.

In the first project, called Environet, students will be involved in several scientific monitoring projects that include acid rain, roadkill, ozone, and lichen and bioindicators.

The second project is the Merrimack River Watershed Education Project and involves taking data from the Merrymeeting River and networking it to other schools in New England.

The projects are under the direction of science teacher Brian Davidson.

BRAINSTORMING SUCCESSFUL

The first of many Bicentennial organizational planning meetings was held at the Gilman Library last month. Over 200 invitations had been mailed to clubs, associations, organizations, churches, committees and the school. Representatives were invited to participate in a brainstorming meeting to share ideas and help plan the program for Alton's upcoming 200th birthday celebration beginning in January 1996.

Nancy Merrill, chairman of the Bicentennial Committee, welcomed everyone and set the pace for an evening of lively discussion about this special year of celebration. Nineteen representatives were present at this planning meeting.

The Bicentennial Committee is looking for ideas and suggestions for activities throughout 1996. In order for this celebration to be successful and truly a town celebration the six geographical areas of this third largest land area town in New Hampshire needs to come together and work together. Participation, sponsorship of activities or a band or a float are Committee members would like to see a special event held each month during 1996 starting with a special church service or services throughout the town in January of 1996.

The most significant day of celebration will be June 16, 1996, when on this date 200 years ago the petition was signed by Governor I. T. Gilman and Alton officially became a town. It was agreed that the ceremony on June 16 would take place in front of Town Hall with town, state and Federal officials invited to speak. Perhaps presentations of the medallion, mini-histories and a plaque rededicating Town Hall would be appropriate at this time with a parade in the afternoon. It was suggested that descendants of the early families would ride in the parade and replicas of celebration. Also suggested was the idea of inviting a militia activities. A formal ball was suggested by Merrill.

Several projects are underway by the Bicentennial

Committee. A play is being written by Alton High School senior John Herman and Muriel Stinson is chairing a fund raising project - the pewter medallion of Town Hall. Two murals, one of the Bay and one of downtown Alton are underway by artist/teacher Joan Chase. These works of art will be painted on two walls downstairs in Town Hall. Funds for one have been donated by the family of Marilyn Dame.

Other fund raising ideas were tee-shirts, mugs, Christmas ornaments, postcards, thimbles, cookbook, dinners, auction, box lunch sales, big band dance, flea market, and a dinner dance on the Mt. Washington. Perhaps a wooden nickel could be given to everyone as a souvenir.

Bunting to decorate Main Street were suggested. Due to costs, this will be left to each business or organization to decide. The Friends of the Library will be asked about a centennial-type theme for their 1996 calendar and to earmark the week in June as Bicentennial Week. School Enrichment Director Ann Hoopes agreed that the students are an important part of this celebration and will be participating in a variety of projects.

Happy Hobby Doll Club member Maureen Parker inquired if needed as well as workers from many groups in town. The the Committee would be interested in a doll exhibition or a carriage contest. The reply was a resounding yes. Perhaps they would also do a float.

> Virginia Dore suggested a Bicentennial sub-committee be formed with members speaking to the church officials/fellowship groups and organizations about the celebration and ideas discussed at the meeting. She was invited to chair this committee and will have more information at a later date.

Irving Roberts suggested that the Bicentennial Week and Old Home Week activities combine into one week in June. It would combine several areas that year as it is a once in a lifetime event. it would omit duplication of events, and it would reduce expenses for everyone. This is an area that will be discussed at future meetings.

George Stone spoke about the importance of a theme. The Committee had articles in Main Street this past summer asking for suggestions, but received no response. He suggested a theme which would bring the townspeople together from the six areas of town - "Alton - A Sense of Community". Others suggested include "An Historic Past - A Brilliant Future", "A Small Part of the Universe - A Big Part of the World", "Remembering the Past - Planning for the Future", "200 Years Young and Still Growing", "A Town to Remember", and "The Heart of the World". These suggestions will be shared at the next Committee meeting.



TIME TO PUT GAME IN THE FREEZER

With Fall ending and Winter beginning, it is time to think of putting up some stores of food. To the outdoors person it means trying to put game in the freezer. Note the use of the word "trying".

November 2 is the opening of firearms deer season. This year the upper nine management units are closed to the taking of does. Antlered deer only may be taken from November 2-27. Alton is in Unit J2 where the season is November 2-4 for any deer and November 5-27 for antlered deer only.

Area bow hunters are seeing a few deer but not that many. Sneaking deer, deer at too long a range, and "flags" (deer's tails) are all most bow hunters are seeing. A lack of acorns, hit or miss beech nuts, and a bounty of apples this year may attribute to the deer being more dispersed. Or it may be that last winter's snow had a more adverse effect on the herd than was anticipated. I found a deer's head late last winter and a jawbone recently.

At this writing, I am still preparing for my October 15-23 moose hunt. The last four weekends we have been listening to moose bellowing out their mating calls and have found the "hang outs" of two cow moose - one we nicknamed "Tank". She's huge! We've also found the trails and bedding areas of a bull moose and jumped him out of his bed.

Good luck to all hunters as you try to put some meat on the table. Be safe and enjoy.

A HISTORY OF VETERANS DAY

(The following history of Veterans Day is courtesy of the Department of Veteran Affairs)

The observance of Veterans Day goes back to 1921 when an American Soldier - his name "known but to God" - was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. The burial site of this unknown World War I soldier became the personification of dignity and reverence for America's veterans.

Similar ceremonies occurred earlier in England and France, where an unknown soldier was buried in each nation's highest place of honor (in England, Westminster Abbey, in France, the Arc De Triomphe).

These memorial gestures all took place on November 11, giving universal recognition to the celebrated ending of World War I hostilities at 11a.m., November 11, 1918 - the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. The day became known as "Armistice Day".

Armistice Day officially received its name in America in 1926 through a Congressional resolution. It became a national holiday 12 years later by similar Congressional action.

If the idealistic hope had been realized that World War I was "the war to end all wars," November 11 might still be called Armistice Day. But shortly after the holiday was proclaimed. World War II broke out in Europe and shattered that dream.

More than 16 million Americans served during World War II and more than 400,000 died in service during that period. The families and friends of these dead longed for a way to honor their memory - to honor veterans of all wars.

An answer to the dilemma of how to pay tribute to those who had served in this latest great war came in a proposal made by Kansas Congressman Edwin K. Reese. He introduced legislation to change Armistice Day to Veterans Day and make this an occasion to honor those who have served America in all wars.

President Eisenhower, in 1954, signed the bill proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day, and he called for Americans everywhere to rededicate themselves to the cause of peace.

Additional significance was added to Veterans Day in 1958, when two more unidentified American war dead - one from World War II and the other from the Korean Conflict -were brought to Arlington Cemetery from overseas, and interred beside the World War I soldier.

On Memorial Day 1984, an unidentified American war dead from the Vietnam Conflict was interred alongside the other unidentified dead at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

From 1971 to 1975, Veterans Day was observed on the fourth Monday in October in compliance with a 1968 law that changed most national holidays to Mondays.

Believing, however, that the November 11 date held great significance for this country, Congress passed a law in 1975 which returned the holiday to November 11. The law became effective in 1978, the 60th anniversary of the World War I armistice.


