


DOG LICENSE DEADLINE WAS JUNE 30

Dog licenses are due April 1 of each year. There is an additional fine of \$1 per month and forfeit of \$15 for each dog unlicensed as of June 1. (RSA 466:7 and RSA 466:13)

Legislation passed in 1993 increased the fees to \$6.50 for spayed or neutered dogs, \$9 for unspayed or unneutered dogs, and \$2 for dogs owned by someone 65 or older.

Notices have been sent to all dog owners licensed last year but not licensed in 1994 advising that the fine and forfeit will be charged as of July 1. The grace period was extended this year to June 30 due to the changes enacted in 1993 and 1994. On July 1, the owners of all unlicensed dogs will be charged the regular license fee, the additional \$1 per month fine, and the \$15 forfeit.

A current rabies certificate is required for licensing.

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
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APPROACH TO FOUNDATIONS BEGUN IN LIBRARY EXPANSION CAMPAIGN

Twenty-one charitable foundations with an interest in cultural and educational purposes have been approached for support for the Gilman Library expansion effort. And the Gilman Library Trustees report that preliminary advanced solicitation of individuals and organizations locally has experienced some early success. The broad-based effort will begin in August.

The Campaign "Kitchen Cabinet" has enjoyed two heavily involved work sessions and at press time was completing a list of memorial and designated gift projects which will be "priced" and published in Main Street next month. Not all these projects will be memorial in nature. Any can be purchased to honor someone or to salute an organization. Appropriate identification plaques will be placed in the appropriate location in the Library.

The enthusiasm and support is not surprising, according to Campaign Chairman David Countway "when it is realized that a very high 64% of every man, woman, and child in Alton carries a Gilman Library card!" And he points to the 84% mandate of local respondents in the 1993 survey.

One question arises that requires an answer according to the Library Trustees. Because the Town Meeting has allocated funds (\$100,000 over two years), why must individuals and organizations be approached? We, who pay taxes, have in effect already given (about \$.20 per \$1,000 of property valuation). This is normal procedure for library campaigns. Both New London and Bedford have each recently raised over \$500,000 in the private sector on top of sizeable town appropriations, which were bonded. The need is just so much greater than our tax dollars can provide, and this approach allows those who have a special interest in the library and its cultural and educational role in our community to become "plus givers" to help insure the success of the campaign effort.

TROUT REFLECTIONS"



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
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COMMUNITY COOPERATION RESULTS IN WILDFLOWER GARDEN

Remember seeing those stakes at the Alton Traffic Circle? They were arranged there by Guy Giunta of the NH Roadside Development Department to form the outline of a wildflower garden.

Years ago, the Alton Garden Club planted the two stands of lilacs that have been faithfully pruned, mulched, and fertilized. In an effort to have the traffic circle look cared for the Club has succeeded in having the grass areas mowed regularly.

This spring, when Giunta suggested the spot as a wildflower garden, it was apparent that there was not enough time to include the project in his schedule and not enough money for the state to pay for it. The alternative was community cooperation and that's just how it was done.

Alton Road Agent Ken Roberts transported two large piles of mulch, about half of what was needed. Jay Marchand and Dave Ford arranged for Roberts to get the other half from the Wolfeboro landfill.

Bruce Farr, a teacher of agricultural courses at the Governor Wentworth Vocational Education Center in Wolfeboro, brought equipment to till the soil. Loring Carr loaned a roller and the cost of the wildflower seed was shared by the town and the Garden Club.

Students enrolled in the agriculture class spread the mulch, tilled the soil, planted the seed and rolled the area under the direction of Giunta and Roberts. Students involved from Alton are Dan Dore, Fred Elliott, Dan Hillsgrove, and Joshua Sanborn. It was an excellent closure for their classroom studies. They have given back something to their community...a service we greatly appreciate.

When you view our wildflower garden, remember it was done by community cooperation and with pride.

ALTON STUDENTS ARE STATE WINNERS IN EPA EARTH ARTISTS PROGRAM

JESSICA MILLER SELECTED FOR NASA EARTH SCIENCE PROGRAM

Jessica Miller, a geology junior at the University of New Hampshire, will get a satellite's-eye view of Earth this summer as part of NASA's Space Academy program.

She will spend eight weeks at the National Aeronautic and Space Administration's Marshall Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama, working with NASA earth scientists.

The honor student with a 3.2 grade point average will help analyze satellite data on heat islands - cities and other developed areas where pockets of heat build up - to investigate their possible effect on regional and global warming.

The daughter of Cindy Miller, Alton Central School elementary librarian, and Jack Miller, Rochester Junior High School shop teacher, Jessica will receive a \$3,200 stipend, travel expenses, and room and board at the University of Alabama campus in Huntsville.

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
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
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

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BI-CENTENNIAL FOCUS

EDUCATION IN ALTON 1750-1900 PART I

Reading, writing and arithmetic! These three words represent a significant part of all our lives and a very important part of the history of Alton.

The old New England Primer which was published about 1785-1790 states that "He who ne're learns his A,B,C, forever will a blockhead be".

There is very little known and documented about the education of Alton's children prior to 1797. At first, village families employed an elder of the church to teach the children in his home. When there was a mother with sufficient education to teach the basics of reading and arithmetic, she would be asked to teach the neighborhood children. However, few women could read or write and those few who could, had many duties to perform for her family and could not afford the time.

"Eunice Flanders, wife of Thomas, was able to give of her time to the rudimentary education of her children and some of the neighboring children, but this precious time was far too little and infrequent. Classes would be held in the 'west' room and limited to only boys with the exception of two of her daughters. At times there were five boys and at other times only two."

This was not the most satisfactory answer to the needs of the children. "Three of the fathers, Moses Gilman, Jonathan Coffin, and Thomas Flanders realized that other steps would have to be taken to adequately prepare their sons. It was decided to hire a tutor who would board at the various houses of the students and receive lodging and a small salary for his services."

School would be held in the fall and early spring at the farm house where the tutor happened to be boarding. Their


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choice of a tutor was Hezekial Drew Buzzell who had just turned 19.

"Henry March of New Durham, the son of Paul March, Esquire, was a veteran of the Revolution. He moved to Alton, was elected a selectman in 1783. From then on, over the next two decades, there is constant mention of him as a school teacher."

Albert Fisher, in his <u>History of Alton</u>, gives a few scattered notes from the minutes of town meetings proving that the first settlers realized the importance of education. "1797 - The town voted to raise \$133.00 for hiring schooling. 1803 - Voted: that the inhabitants of the town be divided into school districts and each district to build their own school house and tax each person in equal portion of the cost according to his inventory at that time and each district be empowered to collect such taxes."

In 1803, only six years after Alton was incorporated, 15 school districts were defined, increasing to 26 fifty years later. 66 families were residing in town in 1790, but by

1805, this number had nearly tripled to 164.

"The 15 school districts help us realize where the more inhabited areas of town were. Following are the locations of the districts and the number of families living in that district: South Alton (10), Prospect Mountain (13), Stockbridge Corner Road - East (17), Old New Durham Road (13), Alton Bay, including the Village (8), Coffin Ridge (13), Stockbridge Corner Road - West (4), Loop Road - West of Route 28 (4), Old Wolfeboro Road (12), Chestnut Cove Road (9), Gilman Corners (15), Rines Road (15), Route 11D (7), Alton Mountain (15), and West Alton of Route 11A area (6).

By 1808 when District 15 in West Alton completed their building, all the other 14 districts had their school houses. The townspeople were now well on their way to educating the children throughout the countryside of this large town.

SUPPORT GROUP FORMED FOR PARENTS OF CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES

Challenges of the Heart, a support group for parents of children with disabilities in Belknap County, has been formed, according to Sue Roberts of Alton who is the organization's community resource person.

The group meetings are for parents to share ideas and to learn more about educational issues, social development, coping and parenting skills, and Federal and state laws on disability issues.

Roberts encourages parents to participate because "the group will surely encourage, enlighten and educate you in ways that will help you meet the daily life challenges".

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ALTON BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE LOOKING FOR CELEBRATION THEME

On June 16, 1996, Alton will have been an incorporated town for two centuries. Celebrations for the event are shaping up as members of the Bicentennial Committee continue to plan. Their major desire, at this point, is to come up with an appropriate theme to give focus to the many activities that will take place in recognition of that

important birthday.

They invite suggestions and brief wordings for a unifying theme. Unifying because the town by its unusual topography of the bay, steep slopes, streams, and wide ranges of farm land has over the years developed into seven distinct areas or loosely clustered neighborhoods embracing the Village, Alton Bay, West Alton, Alton Mountain, East Alton, South Alton, and the Islands. Along the shores of the Bay alone exist some 18 conclaves totalling 1178 taxpayers, each group with its own "association".

In 1770, the large Alton area started with 38 families. Twenty years later, some 66 heads of families were asked if they wished to incorporate. The answer was a resounding "no". Independence was the cry. By 1796, however, after eight petitions to the state, incorporation (along with state and county benefits) came to pass. About a hundred years later the present Town Hall was built and dedicated, and our centennial was celebrated with fanfare, a parade, and speakers.

The town now takes a sober look at the forthcoming bicentennial and searches for a theme to express the growing sense of community among the geographical areas.

FISH HEADING FOR COLDER WATER

The young ones start moving out on their own now. Any gardener will be glad to hear you are hunting woodchucks, but always ask permission of the landowner first. As I've stated before, woodchuck is very tasty. Flavor it with your favorite barbecue sauce, cook and enjoy.

Be aware. There is a black bear raiding bird feeders in the Birch Hill area of New Durham. This bear is brazen enough to leave greasy paw prints on a co-worker's porch screen door! Residents of the area have taken some good, close-up mug shots of this bear.

July is a good month to practice for the upcoming archery hunting season. Brian's Archery in Rochester has hosted a woodchuck archery hunting contest....now there's a challenge! Farmington Fish and Game Club's Club Pond Archers provide 15 3-D targets to practice on every Thursday evening starting at 5:30p.m. A round costs \$4 for nonmembers and \$3 for members and you can shoot a second round for \$1. A league shoot has been running since May 5. This type of practice is just what the deer hunter needs to be ready in September.

See you out there.
